However, since re-opening after the Covid lockdown we have been losing over £1000 a month. We therefore plan an orderly closure before our financial resources run dry.

#### **REFLECTION**

#### Micah 6: 6 – 8 – What does the Lord require?

Do you ever wonder how a preacher chooses their hymns – or wonder why a particular hymn suddenly becomes very popular? Over the nearly 40 years I have been preaching, my requirements for hymns have often been confounded by the lack of a hymn or worship song that precisely mirrors what I want to say.

Last week, Geoff asked Clive and I to review his service, as part of the circuit's continuing development for Local Preachers. We liked the service, but the reviewing process requires more than "we liked it". One of the questions is "Comment on the way the service was put together", in a section which asks about balance – singing, silence, prayers, etc. We had noticed that 3 of Geoff's hymns came from the Justice and Peace section of Singing the Faith, but we were not sure that the final hymn, "Show me how to stand for justice" (713), was quite the right hymn – although we both like the hymn. Geoff said he thought it was exactly the right hymn! One of the virtues of Methodism is that our preachers are not exactly alike, and as their hymnology will reflect their particular way of thinking, we will get to sing many different hymns.

It has been said, many times, that Methodism sings its theology, including in the preface to Singing the Faith, but I wonder sometimes how true this is, or perhaps, more accurately, whether our changing hymnology sufficiently reflects our changing priorities in society. (Although, in fairness, that is also mentioned in the preface to Singing the Faith)

Take the subject of justice, for example. A subject that has been around in the Bible since the very beginning, in broad terms. The Ten Commandments have to do with justice, and on and off all through the Old Testament, the subject comes up. My text is one of the most famous – God's people are to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with our God. But has that been in our hymnology?

Clive and I possess three generations of Methodist hymnbooks. Working backwards, there is Singing the Faith, authorised in 2010, Hymns and Psalms, authorised in 1983, and The Methodist Hymnbook, authorised in 1933.

In Singing the Faith, the section called Justice and Peace is a sub-section of God's Enduring Purposes. It contains 30 hymns, and lists 7 more, to be found outside the section, which may be appropriate. If one looks at the tex-

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tual reference section towards the back of the music edition – which I suspect does not appear in the words only copy – for the Micah text, there are 7 hymns which reference these verses, including 4 which might be appropriate from outside the section.

Bearing in mind that the subject of the section is justice and peace, we might find, if we went through them carefully, that for many of the hymns, the subject is peace – "Make me a channel of your peace", no. 707, for example. It talks about many roots of lack of peace, but justice is not one of them. There is no hymn by Charles Wesley in the whole section.

In Hymns and Psalms, there is also a sub-section called Justice and Peace, in the main section God's World – the Social Order. It contains 16 hymns, including one which specifically references this passage – "What does the Lord require, for praise and offering". If you want to look at it, there are copies of Hymns and Psalms in the cupboard in the passage, it is no. 414 – it does not appear in Singing the Faith. The section does include a Charles Wesley – "All glory to God in the sky, and peace upon earth be restored!" (his exclamation mark!) Again, many of the hymns in the section focus on peace, rather than justice. 3 hymns outside the section are referenced in the textual index – but only 4 hymns altogether are referenced to this particular passage.

There are overlaps between the sections in Hymns and Psalms and Singing the Faith – almost all of them written in the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

In The Methodist Hymn Book, there is no mention of justice at all. The almost relevant sub-section is Trustfulness and Peace in the Christian Life section. There are 38 hymns in the section, and 25 additional hymns that might fit. The 3 hymns that reference Micah 6: 6 – 8 are not in the Trustfulness and Peace section – which doesn't surprise me – and are not among the additional hymns either. One, a Charles Wesley, is in Repentance and Forgiveness, one is a harvest hymn, and the third, no. 897, "What service shall we render thee" is in the section National and Social Service: Citizenship and Service, along with "I vow to thee, my country". I don't think I have ever sung it, never mind used it in a service.

Next time you are thinking about the hymns used in a service, consider – are there hymns covering your concerns available to the preacher? How do the hymns fit into the service? How do they add to your feeling of worship?
