Do you look forward to birthdays? Children often can't wait. When ours were young, we used to say they were wishing their lives away. As we get older birthdays may cease to be so exciting. The ones we really celebrate we may face with both anticipation and dread.

Pentecost is often said to be the birthday of the church. How do we face that? For the disciples who didn't know what was going to happen, or when, it was a matter of patient and fearful waiting for



something, anything. For them it came as an amazing thing. The effect was to overwhelm their fear and cause them to rush into the streets to tell everyone their news, the good news of Jesus.

Of course, for us, the anniversary is as different as a birthday is from the actual birth. We celebrate, sort of. There used, when Whit Monday was a bank holiday, to be big tent meetings on that day, particularly at Cliff College. I used to go with my parents from wherever we were in the country. I'm told that special trains were run on this line up to Sheffield, stopping at all the stations to pick up people. They were certainly big meetings.

How can we celebrate now? How can we remember the coming of the Holy Spirit on what were ordinary men and women like us? I believe the Holy Spirit still comes to us to empower us to do the tasks that God wants us to do. How can we show this to the world?

Pentecost is an English (from the Greek) name for the Jewish festival of Shavuot. It occurs 50 days (hence pente) from the first day of Passover (inclusive counting). Shavuot means week and it is also known in English as the Feast of Weeks (seven weeks or a week of weeks after Passover). Shavuot was a festival celebrating the wheat harvest. On this festival day, the Disciples received the Holy Spirit, and the name Pentecost has been appropriated by the Christian church. Anglicans and Methodists tended in the past to use the term Whitsun, although this has increasingly gone out of fashion since 1972 when the Bank Holiday was moved from Whit Monday to the last Monday in May. Particularly in the North of England you will still see Whit processions, but the evangelical Whit Monday meetings changed date.

LOCAL PREACHERS CELEBRATION SERVICE 28th APRIL

After some debate following the death of Stephen Parkinson it was decided to continue with this service. Come and support the Local Preachers and Worship Leaders in the Circuit on this occasion.

REFLECTION

Acts Chapter 1 verses 10 and 11a: They were looking intently up into the sky as he was going, when suddenly two men dressed in white stood beside them. "Men of Galilee," they said, "why do you stand here looking into the sky?"

One festival we don't make much of is Ascension Day. I suspect that this is, in part at least, because it happens on a Thursday when people are at work. If you went to a church school, something may have been said, but it largely passes the rest of us by.

Should it? Is there something for us to learn in the story of Jesus' Ascension? In good Methodist fashion, can I suggest three things?

The first is that Jesus was going to go away some time. Jesus was not going to be physically present on earth for ever. While it would have been a miracle and no doubt have ensured many followers, that isn't the way God works, and would mean Jesus had taken the temptation he rejected at the start of his ministry, to use miracles to convert the crowd.

The second thought is that when things happen, it's no good us just standing there staring. And if we've been told to do something, in this case to wait in Jerusalem, then you need to do it.

The third thing is that Jesus expects us to carry on and to get on with things, not on our own, but with the Holy Spirit as our companion. While the disciples were told to wait for a while it was ten days, not ten years.

For us the big difficulty is always going to be knowing what we are supposed to be doing. The disciples had the consolation of having been told directly, we need greater discernment bringing together the Bible, our traditions, our situation and current circumstance and putting these with what we think God is saying to us. Sometimes this is something just for us, other times it requires a whole community.

So on 9th May we may care to remember the Ascension and think, "Are we just standing here?"

Prayer

Lord God, let us hear you as you speak to us, and be willing to do what you want. Let us not stand staring but follow your will and take action.

Amen
