I have taken it from the Learning Network newsletter, although you can find it in other Methodist publications. You might want to turn the page and look at it before reading on.

It is a fact that the Methodist Church is shrinking. The question is whether we have fulfilled God's purpose for us, in which case closing up and moving on is the right thing to do, or whether there is work yet to do for which Methodism is uniquely placed. If, like me, you think the later is the case then you may wish to take inspiration from the picture.

Methodism is an odd organisation. By origin we're Anglican, as can be seen in many of our formal services. But necessity forced Methodism to evolve in a different direction. We have Local Preachers, because ministers couldn't and can't take all the services. Some of those were women pretty much from the start, and we recognised women's ministry 50 years ago.


Our organisation balances lay and ministerial authority. Lay folk run the church and are responsible for many things that in other churches are only controlled by the clergy. However, they do not dominate the organisation.

Of course, this is all irrelevant if it does not contribute to the primary functions of a church; spreading the word and worshipping God. Back to the diagram! What does this say to us and where is it peculiarly Methodist.

TFT finished just before the end of the school term, having played at the Lower School Fair.


Messy Church met and looked at picnics and where we like to have them.

BRAIN TUMOUR RESEARCH

A report on our visit to a centre of excellence where research into a cure for Glioblastoma brain tumours is underway.

On 10th July my daughter Emma, my sister in law, Sue and I were invited to the Brain Tumour Research centre of excellence at Queen Mary University of London to find out how our fundraising is helping support scientists leading the way in research into Glioblastoma GBS brain tumours.

We were given the opportunity to tour the labs at Queen Mary University of London, led by principal investigator Professor Silvia Marino. We spoke to scientists about their work to find a cure for the disease and placed 11 tiles on the Wall of Hope in Pete's memory.



What an amazing day! I didn't know what to expect but I wasn't expecting to be in such an amazing building with such incredible scientists, celebrating our fundraising efforts, and sharing the same sense of loss with so many other families.

To date we have raised in excess of £42,000. This allowed us to add 11 tiles in memory of Pete on the wall of hope. For every £2740 raised a tile can be placed on

the wall of hope.

It was a privilege hearing from the researchers and the incredible work that they do, how far they have come and some of the thinking behind what they do. Being present in that inspirational building where this all takes place felt monumental.

Seeing the wall of hope makes you realise how many lives are touched and affected by this awful disease and knowing some of the pain those families are feeling.

We enjoyed tea and cakes during the presentation as we sat in the neuron pod (see picture below).

It was an opportunity to take time to reflect, consider and "be" in the environment of the work that will take us closer to a cure from this dreadful disease.



It allowed us as a family to focus on Pete, our journey, and give credit to our fundraising and hope on what we want to achieve by it. It was a very worthwhile day which has provided some sense of healing, knowledge and a feeling of community as those affected are collectively gathered under one amazing roof. with those who are organising the funding for the research, BTR, and those who are enabling progress to achieve our motives, to find a cure.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank you all

for taking Brain Tumour Research as your chosen charity this year and for supporting our efforts to make a difference to those who suffer from a brain tumour and their families living with the loss.
