Hi all,

If you look at a lectionary you will see we are in Ordinary Time. Ordinary Time is what any Sunday is called if it isn't linked to something specific, like Advent, Christmas or Easter. A lot of the year is Ordinary Time. This isn't surprising. There are only so many special times in the Church year.

We live our lives mostly in ordinary time, We are not going through things that are exceptionally good, or particularly bad, things are just ordinary. But is that really true? In many ways each day presents the extraordinary to us, if we allow ourselves to be aware of it.

We can look at the world and see the wonders of creation. We can study the sky, look at the stars. All these things are ordinary, and yet definitely extraordinary. A good start is to let ourselves be aware of this as we move around in our daily lives.

But don't stop there. What about the extraordinary that comes from the people around us, friends, neighbours, family, even strangers. Isn't it extraordinary how we receive help, kindness, support from people around us? And yes, I know that it is not always the case, but see how often it is. See how often someone gives a friendly word, or goes the extra mile for us, and helps us or cheers us. comforts us or cries with us.

And let us not stop there. How often does a word come into our mind, or a feeling? How often do we feel God, present with us in good times and bad, more often noticed when things are going wrong and we need help, but there in the ordinary times when we look and are prepared to acknowledge it,

CHURCH PROJECT 2025 – RNLI

Our church project for this year is the RNLI – the Royal National Lifeboat Institution – which was 200 years old last year. Although some RNLI crew are paid, most are volunteers, including the beach lifeguards – and it is our donations which provide the funds for equipment and training. The equipment includes the boats, both inshore and offshore. These days, equipment also includes drones equipped with speakers, to hover over water users and tell them when they are in danger – because they are in the wrong area, or because the sea is getting rougher. Clive and I watched a lifeguard training session on Crantock beach a couple of years ago, where a group of lifeguards were being trained with the drones.

We are an inland village, but many residents holiday on the coast, or visit it for the day. Every time you use a lifeguarded beach, you are protected by the RNLI. If you have to be rescued from the sea within British coastal waters, for whatever reason, it will almost certainly be the RNLI who rescue you! So far this year, we have raised over £150, including the money raised at the Pancake Parlour in March. Our coffee mornings each month also raise money for this project.

HARLINGTON MESSY CHURCH

Then at 5.30 pm we have tea. By the way, the past celebrations are still on YouTube, as are the fully recorded sessions we did in lockdown.

Messy Church is always on the third Saturday. If you can help at any of these, please let Clive or Tina know so that we can arrange things most efficiently. If you stay to the end you get tea!

DAVID GOODWIN

Dear Friends,

In January 1960 the Luton Methodist Circuit Plan listed a 'David Goodwin' as the organist at Marsh Road Methodist Church, Leagrave. I am very grateful to them for having given me the opportunity, a few years prior to that, to start playing occasionally in church under the guidance of their then organist. I was also very fortunate to go to Luton Grammar School where there was a pipe organ that had been donated in memory of one of the pupils who died in the second world war. This was used every day for morning assemblies and there was always a hymn or two. It was mainly played by pupils on a rota accompanying some 600 pupils and staff. It was quite challenging as it was in a fairly critical atmosphere.

Meanwhile, in church in those days there were always two services every Sunday and a choir practice on a Friday evening. I also had weekly organ lessons from the organist at The Square, Dunstable. My lovely parents paid for these although I still cannot imagine how they could afford to do so. This all started before I had a car so I would cycle from home in Leagrave to school in New Bedford Road every weekday then, two or three days a week, cycle on to Dunstable after school to practise and to have an organ lesson at The Square. 'My chains fell off' had a different significance in those days!

It has been a great joy over all these years to accompany services in various local churches. However, health issues have recently made this very problematic. I am now completely deaf in one ear and have only 30% hearing in the other because of something called a vestibular schwannoma. I would be completely lost without hearing aids but these only partially restore hearing especially in the church environment. It is therefore with



sadness that I feel that I can no longer continue to accompany services. I would like to thank you all for your encouragement and support over the years.
