Hi all,

Tina was unwell at the start of the year, and we decided that one of the things she needed to do was to take more regular exercise. For other reasons she got a watch, and one thing it does is count steps. Tina has joined the step counters.



You will therefore see her walking around

the village rather more than you used to. You may wonder about the way she is walking. Quite often, she will walk around all the closes, or take the long way round when going somewhere. For a step counter, the target to aim for is a number of steps, not a destination.

You will not often see me walking with her. I like to take the shortest route between two points, at least when going round the village. I like a planned route that uses the minimum distance.

Which is more important, the journey or the destination? In truth, this depends on the purpose of the journey. If you are going to see someone, then the destination is important, if you are visiting an area of beauty, then the journey itself may be more important.

We often use journeying as a metaphor in life. Of course the big danger with metaphors is that we push them too far. If life is our journey can we separate out the destination from the way we attain it? There are some people who set themselves a worldly destination and go all out to achieve it. It may be

wealth, fame, status, power or similar target. Those people are likely to miss the value of the journey. People who have achieved instant fame may well have missed out on the benefits of the struggle.

What about us? I feel we cannot achieve what we would see as our heavenly destination without an earthly journey with Christ. We need to learn from him, just as Cleopas and his friend learnt on their journey to Emmaus (I regret that the Bible records that there was a conversation but only gives the most cursory summary of what was said).

Journeying with Christ also requires us to share his concerns for our fellows, those who follow Christ and those who do not. The parable of the sheep and the goats says that clearly.

NEW MINISTER

By now you will know that it is Claudia's intention to leave at the end of this church year, so we will have a new minister from September 2026. Rev. Patrick, our superintendent minister, will be leaving at the same time, and the opportunity is being taken to do some rearrangement. In view of the reducing membership of the circuit, only one replacement minister is being sought. This means that over two years the circuit will have lost two ministers. The new minister will be the superintendent, but will be in charge of the Square, Aley Green and us.

The way this works is that a circuit profile is prepared saying what our circuit is like. This is a short, summary document. This has been done. Supers are appointed first, and there will be a visit to the circuit, probably on 8th November, for a candidate to have a look at us and for us to see them. If this is a match then this goes forward to Stationing Committee and Conference for approval. Otherwise we will have other rounds before that happens.

We will have a new super appointed for September 2026.
