However, do we ever budget our time? After all, it may be possible to get more money, but time is a strictly limited commodity. Have you ever considered keeping a diary record of just how you spend your time? This is not a thing most of us would want to try, but if we keep a private record, just for us, may be we could learn something. Keeping it private means we can be completely honest, so that



if you feel you have no time for yourself, but then discover you are wasting time while putting off tasks you don't want to do (like editing Contact), you could spend that time better for yourself.

We might also consider when we do things best. Are you an owl or a lark? You may have noticed that I'm an owl. Perhaps there are some things you should do in your "prime" time and others that are best done at other times. Anyone who has ever run a conference knows that nobody want the spot just after lunch when many of the attendees just want to sleep. You will notice the more clued speakers put in activities, questions and answers and so on to prevent this.

Michel Quoist wrote a whole meditation about time in one of his books (they were popular in the 60s and 70s). He talks about not having time for things, putting them off until it's too late.

Lord God, you only gave us so much time. Help us to use it well, for ourselves, for others and for you.

REVIEW OF THE MONTH

Tina led the last service for the old year with a reflection on the Wise Men. The first Sunday of the new year came with snow. It was impossible to tell what it was going to be like on the roads, so Claudia led this service, our Covenant Service, from Dunstable over Zoom. We had a reasonable attendance, considering the weather, with some others on Zoom. As an aside, we need to work out how best to do that when most of the words are on the screen, for those using phones or tablets at home. The 12th of January was led by the Worship Group.

We had a United Service for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. This was led by St. Mary's with a Methodist preacher, Roger Owers. It was hosted by the Life Church in the Parish Hall, which was cosy with the good attendance from the three churches. Unfortunately services out of our building are not streamed or Zoomed at present.

As we said last month, 626 Club attendance before Christmas was averaging about 20. We had 4 children on the waiting list who turned 6 before Christmas so it seemed like there was plenty of space to bring them all in in January. Having a group start together works well for the youngest ones. We invited them to our 2nd meeting in January, and our attendance that evening was 30! In the next couple of days, Tina had 5 more requests for people to go on the waiting list, but it will probably be September before there are spaces.
