Professional Development Committee: Recent Successes

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, ACOA's ability to host in-person events was severely limited by concerns for officers and our community's safety. However, now that we're back to (relatively) normal, the Professional Development (PD) Committee is excited to offer ACOA members new opportunities. The PD Committee was thrilled to kick off 2023 with several events to enhance the growth and professional experience of Atlanta-area Officers.

In January, officers had the opportunity to take a professional portrait in their PHS uniforms at CDC's Portrait Studio. Professional photos give officers the ability to showcase their professionalism, particularly when it comes to submitting job applications and networking. Making a good impression and appearing professional are important for both in-person and online interactions. We were happy to have forty-five officers participate in the winter portrait session and we are hoping to offer another portrait session to Atlanta-area officers this fall after promotions are announced.

The ACOA PD Committee hosted a lunch and learn on opportunities for clinical practice hours and the related policies. This event was an opportunity for officers to gather in person and virtually to learn more about the USPHS requirements to maintain their clinical expertise and ensure that licensed health professionals have the competency and skills to perform well within their job and engage in clinical practice during a public health emergency. CAPT Nicholas Gaffga shared information about how to obtain clinical practice hours with the CDC's Occupational Health Clinic and LT Cashmere Miller provided an overview of the USPHS Clinical Practice Hours Policy and shared information about opportunities to obtain clinical hours within the Atlanta VA Medical Center. Officers had an opportunity to ask questions and engage in-person and online with 38 attendees.

In April, ACOA's PD Committee hosted another in-person and virtual lunch and learn about the USPHS documentary. This exciting event had 64 attendees. We heard from COA Executive Director, Jacqueline Rychnovsky, and learned about the latest initiatives National COA is making to afford Officers access to various benefits. Chris Schueler then gave us a sneak peek at what the production of the USPHS Documentary was like and whom he interviewed. Mr. Schueler also provided great insights about how the documentary, and smaller segments of it, can be shared with legislators and local community members. We are looking forward to viewing the documentary soon and hope to offer Atlanta-area officers an opportunity to attend a showing in-person later this year!



Atlanta-Area Officers Promote Public Health in Gwinnett County as School Gets Back in Session

On Saturday, July 15, 2023, the Atlanta Commissioned Officers Association participated in a Prevention through Active Community Engagement (PACE) event in conjunction with Gwinnett-Newton-Rockdale (GNR) Public Health and the Lawrenceville-Duluth Alumni Chapter (LDAC) of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. Created in 2013, PACE is a chartered advisory group of the Office of the Surgeon General which leverages the expertise of Commissioned Corps officers to provide education about the benefits of prevention in their local communities.

Approximately 1500 children, adolescents, and adults attended this back-to-school event, which is one of the largest in the Atlanta metro area. Thirteen USPHS officers participated in the event, promoting the Commissioned Corps and providing public health materials and handwashing demonstrations to those in attendance. PACE-approved presentation topics included proper handwashing, healthy eating habits, proper dental care, safety in the sun, and mental health. GNR Public Health provided resources on similar topics and contact information for residents seeking care and assistance. They also provided giveaways for those who attended our tent.

The event was successful with outreach to community members in Gwinnett County and surrounding areas. Members of LDAC and others in attendance expressed their gratitude for ACOA's participation and welcomed us back for next year.

USPHS ACOA Provides 6,353 Meals for Families

Food insecurity impacts individuals and families across the United States. Food insecurity refers to USDA's measure of lack of access, at times, to enough food for an active, healthy life for all household members. These households may also have a limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate foods. According to a recent report, 1 in 9 people in Georgia are food insecure. In Georgia hunger is widespread and impacts some of our most vulnerable populations at alarming rates. Thirteen percent of children and 8% of seniors are considered food insecure. As the holiday season approaches, efforts across the country hope for more volunteers and donations to continue to help feed families in need. USPHS Officers are taking action to assist in this effort. Helping and serving communities in need is not only the mission of the USPHS, but part of who we are as officers.

On Saturday, September 23rd, seven USPHS Officers from CDC, BOP, and FDA volunteered at the Atlanta Community Food Bank-Hunger Action Center. Collectively, USPHS Officers CAPT Darrlyn Cornelius-Averhart, LCDR Arin Williams, LCDR Jeffrey Walker, CDR James Dixon, CDR Johanna Gilstrap, LT Arlene Page, and LT Alexis Roberts, and civilian Mr. Haines, rolled up their sleeves and helped sort through food and other goods to help alleviate hunger in the metro Atlanta community. Many of the goods that officers sorted were donations received by the Atlanta Community Food Bank from grocery stores, and drug store retailers including Publix, Walmart, Kroger, and CVS.

The officers spent the morning checking food expiration dates, sorting goods, and using palette jacks to bring goods into the warehouse for sorting. Officers worked alongside several other volunteers, many of whom were teenagers from a local church. Officers immediately stepped into mentorship roles helping the teens sort the goods according to guidelines. The 7,624 lbs. of goods handled by the volunteer team equates to 6,353 meals provided to metro Atlanta families. The collaborative effort of ACOA and Atlanta Community Food Bank-Hunger Action Center serves as both an example and reminder of USPHS promoting the spirit of engagement, connectedness, and community dedication among USPHS officers.

<u>FORMAT:</u>

- Submit as an email attachment
- Word format using Calibri, font size 10 (no exceptions)
- Title of article: Century Gothic, font size 14, italic and bold
- Body of article: Calibri, 10 point font
- Review articles for spelling, grammar, sentence flow and variety, truth in numbers, and etc.
- Limit articles to 1,000 words or less
- Include your rank, name, and credentials (if you have them)
- Email or preferred contact information
- Clearance approval by OP/DIVI (if applicable)

Each submitter will receive an email confirming receipt of the article; this is not an acceptance of your article.

<u>PHOTOS:</u>

Submission of photos is encouraged; action photos are preferred. All photos accompanying submissions must be in jpeg file format and attached to the same email submission (*please do not embed photo in word document*); provide a suggested caption, if a caption is desired. Caption sizes should be limited and are subject to editing by COA.
