He Just Wants Peace

I've been using a little story for the last 25 years or so to try and illustrate the language barrier most folks have between them and their horse and why they need a translator (professional horseman).

Let's say you have a job that you have to go to every day, you can't get out of it, you can't call in sick, your boss is short tempered and he only speaks Chinese (assuming that you don't). So every day you get to work and he blurts something out to you in Chinese that you don't understand. And when you don't respond, he raises his voice and he yells at you in Chinese the thing that you don't understand. He starts pushing you and screaming at you in Chinese and eventually starts whacking you with a stick. Maybe he ties you up and ties your chin to your chest and makes you walk around in a way that hurts - all the while yelling at you the thing you don't understand.

You have zero idea what he wants but you become frantic. You just start doing things. Anything. Frantically. Hoping something gets him to back off. Nothing works. He screams, he yells, he pushes, pokes prods and whacks and finally gives up in frustration and goes off mumbling in Chinese obviously what a dumb employee you are.

And you have to go back tomorrow. And the next day. And the next.....

And then one day you get to work - neurotic and frightened for the repeat of the day that won't end, and there's a stranger there.

The boss comes in and barks at you in Chinese.

And the stranger says "I speak Chinese. He wants you to sweep out the back room."

A flood of relief washes over you. You can't grab the broom quickly enough. You are so happy to sweep the back room, as a matter of fact, at this very moment you love sweeping back rooms - and your boss is quiet. You've done what he wanted. What all the fuss was about.

That's life for so many horses. The person doesn't speak their language and they'll never learn ours. The person asks in a way they don't understand to do a thing they've never done. When it doesn't work, out come the whips and bits and spurs. Tie the mouth shut and tie it back to their chest. Poke a spur here, whip a shoulder, whip a hip.....and on and on and on. And they still never get what they want. As a matter of fact it gets worse and worse and worse until the horse is labelled hopeless and moved on down the trail so they can begin doing what has never worked with the next one.

Then there are the smart ones who hire a translator. They don't know what they don't know, but they know that they don't know. And all the crazy goes away and it gets peaceful, and here's the HUGE rub. The translator doesn't just tell the horse what the person wants, BUT the translator can teach the person what the horse NEEDS. The translator helps them find a common language together. He helps them become partners.

If you're frustrated, I promise it's so much harder for your horse.

If I go down in history for saying one thing only, it's that when things are not going well, your horse doesn't want to be that way. He doesn't want to fight. He doesn't want to be bad or naughty or "have an attitude." He just wants to know what you want. He just wants you to be clear. He doesn't mind the work. The average domestic horse living in a 50 acre field will walk 26 miles a day - a full marathon - just living and eating. He doesn't mind the work.

He just wants peace. - - - So, for the love of horses, if it's going south, go find an interpreter. Just for a little while. And listen - first to them, and then as you learn how, to your horse. You'll be absolutely amazed what a horse will cheerfully do for you when they just understand.

STATE OF THE STABLE

Can you believe it - this is our 28th year helping folks since August of 1998. I thank all of you who have helped and supported us with donations and by volunteering over the past years - Thank you. All our riders who attend our classes and have experienced the improvement Equine Assisted Activities has given them are why we do this and a big thank you to all of you. Stable Influence Charity Programs is the successful Equine Assisted Activities and Therapy program due to all your support.

Program - Summer session August 2025, we had 4 riders scheduled to ride, but, due to the extreme heat and 2 riders having vacations, only 2 riders were able to ride only 2 of 4 times. We are only riding in New River now. In September we saw 2 riders for Tuesdays. Saturday riders waited for cooler temps, which added 4 more to our roster. The smallest roster we've had ever. The heat these past couple of years is a major factor. Later in the fall we added 2 more riders. Both tried to ride at other programs, but were denied or it just wasn't a good fit. We have such amazing horses and volunteers, we were able to help them. We then had 3 riders on Tuesdays and 5 on Saturdays. Truly one of our biggest challenges is having enough volunteers to keep everyone safe. This has been a challenge for the past several years.

We pretty much stayed at this level for the entire year. Since we started our program in August 1998 we have served over 481 riders. Heat was a big challenge August last summer and is again this summer. But, June/July we only lost 1 ride due to extreme heat. Riding very late was the key. Rain and wind during the winter and spring caused adjustments in scheduling but we didn't lose a lot of rides due to weather. Additionally, the big spike in everyday costs - groceries and gas - also contributed to less riders being able to participate. In September, we will begin again to offer riding at our New River site on Tuesday afternoons and Saturday mornings. Volunteers are needed to help out or we just cannot make it happen.

Our new riders achieved their goals and moved on. That is - TRULY - what we want. It does cause us to want to add new riders and the volunteers to support them. Rider fees are based on only absolute essential costs. The costs to provide service was \$85/ride (\$510/session) this year. We raised our fees to \$70/ride (\$420/Session). Bridging the gap with donations was a HUGE help. Of course, more riders and volunteers will help the bottom line. Costs that figure into rider fees are for our horses feed, supplements, hoof trimming and vet. Even if we have fewer riders, these costs don't change. Liability insurance remained the same, but auto and medical insurance increased. Our instructor receives a small salary - sometimes. We are getting closer to paying off the loan for the new car. We are totally dependant on donations for bareback pads, equipment repairs, vehicle maintenance and program t-shirts, which are costs not included in rider cost calculations.

Riders seek out our services for many reasons and choose to either stay and ride or graduate. It is exciting when some reach their goals, but then they move on - as they should. A couple of riders achieved their goals this past year. It's always sad to say Good-Bye to riders. We receive calls from people in Mesa and west Phoenix area and with the distance, they do not come out. Others feel they don't have the funding and want to ride for free. Some riders look to maintain physical fitness and others simply enjoy riding, so continue for the good exercise. We have some funds put aside for scholarships from the Lisa Wintermantel Memorial Ridership Award, but, although offered, haven't had any requests this past year. We will award scholarships based on rider participation. Two of our riders travel from Mesa, others from Surprise, mid-Phoenix and even south Phoenix each week to ride. Also, a few volunteers travel far to help our riders. Although we do not have East Valley or Southwest Valley locations, we do continue to get calls for riding.

FY25 scheduled 45 weeks of riding with 246.5 half-hour riding lessons - which was 100 less than last year. We provided 232.5 lessons this year compared to 271.5 last year. Our schedule had space for more riders, but our volunteer support didn't allow adding riders. We made up 70 missed rides from rider or weather cancellations. There were 47.5 no-shows from rider cancellations, 24 weather related lost rides and a few due to no volunteer support on class day. As usual, heat, rain and wind caused most of our canceled classes. For summer 2025, 4 riders participated in classes in New River. But, summer heat caused us to lose over 50% of those potential rides. For August 2026, we have 3 riders continuing to ride, providing the heat isn't too bad. Continuing education for our instructors and volunteers is paid for privately. Craig, thank goodness, continues to donate vehicle, shed and ramp maintenance. This year he helped each week at many of our classes. Our classes Tuesday or Wednesday afternoons and on Saturday mornings in New River will begin again mid-September.

Volunteers: 9 registered volunteers helped out each week, 7 short term. 1,918 since 1998.
2,595 hours of volunteer time were given this year 289 less than last year. 127,591 since 1998.
Horses gave 107.25 hours this year. 10,892.5 Horse hours by 63 horses since 1998.

Our biggest challenge these past few years is having enough volunteers to do class. People call and inquire. They say they want to help and after explaining what is needed, they make an appointment to come. Unfortunately, 9 out of 10 never follow through. On-the-job training for volunteers to learn what to do with the horses and our specialized group of riders is required. We must do things differently for our special riders for their, the horses and the volunteer's safety. Then, consistency is the key to learn and practice how to make a safe arena for everyone.

Horses - Our herd remained - ha ha ha - stable this past year. Summer heat, again this year, has cut into time to exercise horses. Liber-T is 33 now and is showing her age. Exercising her to keep her fit and limber. She still loves helping her riders and her movement remains good and active giving riders more trunk mobility. She's the first to help riders ready to be independent. She especially enjoys the little ones and often gives them cuddles. She is very careful as riders learn to lead and play games while they are on the ground. She is amazing at letting me know when a rider is ready to move on and "do it right" helping them become a better horseman whether a client or volunteer. Dakota is now 25 and offers riders opportunities to learn to regulate their energy as she is quite responsive. Her very wide back and quiet movement, offers riders a lot of support with less core movement than Liber-T does. She helps riders improve muscle tone due to a weak trunk with her quieter movement. Spirit who we believe is 24 now is doing well. She is still improving her ground games in the arena. In the pen, she's pretty good - HMMM. Her shorter stride and a more narrow barrel than either Liber-T or Dakota helps riders with tight hips and allows for a smooth ride. With exercise, she is learning to stretch her stride, making her gait smoother. And then there is Gracie. Still in training due to limited time by me to give her attention. Keeping the other 3 horses fit and doing class 2 days a week limits my time with her. But, each time she gets ridden, she understands more. Thank you to Lisa who rides her occasionally. I hope to get her going more. She has such a wide back it is quite a stretch, but her movement is very much like Liber-T's and I hope she'll be able to help when Liber-T needs to truly retire. AHHH - So many horses, so little time.

Horse board and care happen monthly no matter what. We have 4 horses to support. The Hudson's support most of Liber-T's costs. We are slowly catching up on past board. Thank you to the Hudson's who have supported Liber-T and cover the horse care costs as we get caught up.

Hay purchase once a year is done when prices are lowest and we can keep the hay quality consistent - AND - we only have to fuss with it one time a year. At this writing, I haven't checked out hay prices, but believe costs have gone down a bit from last year. Our Hay Fundraiser is ongoing and we do ask everyone to help by purchasing just 1 bale of hay for \$25. Board for horses covers hay and grain costs. It does not cover the cost for hoof trimming every 7 weeks for \$200, special supplements for our aging herd, vet work or the equine dentist. Please consider making a donation to help purchase hay, grain or support supplements to keep all the horses fat and sassy - well not too sassy.

If you want to adopt one of our horses our Adopt a Horse program is available. Monthly donation of \$300 - or \$3,600 for a full year. For a small fee, you can come out and exercise one of our horses. Your gifts, of course, are tax deductible.

Facebook - Saturday is when you can keep up on what our riders are doing. "Like", "Follow" and post to our Stable Influence Charity Programs page. With permission, I post pictures of our riders' successes. Just for grins and giggles, watch for sunsets, wild life and other fun stuff happening each week. Add a story, share with your friends, family and folks who may benefit from our services or who may want to help out. Spread the word - that's our best advertisement. A few Birthday Fundraisers through FB gave us some donations. So - Ask your FB followers to donate, to sponsor a rider or horse, or just because. I bet some would buy a bale of hay if asked.

Rider Stats: We helped 8 riders in weekly classes this year which was 6 less than last year. 3 - Autism, 1 each cerebral palsy, down syndrome, Lennox Gausteau, muscle weakness, Niemann Pick Type C, stroke. However, most all of our riders have multiple challenges. Rider ages: under 5 - 1, 6-10 3, 21-30 1, 31-59 1, 60+ 2.

Riding in New River offers multiple opportunities for our riders as we have trail rides, a big sand hill and obstacles not available in a standard riding arena. Riders enjoy the challenge of riding or ground work with our many obstacles, like ground poles, a tire pedestal, cones and row of logs.

Staffing - Chris Hudson continues as the Head Riding Instructor, Executive Director and wearer of all hats. Chris is our Program Board President, Kathy Wilke is our Vice President and Craig is our Secretary/Treasurer. Chris supervises and plans all the classes. We plan to continue offering our services as long as we can. But, our horses and staff are getting old and many ask when will we retire. Not sure at this point. Availability to exercise horses or take a lesson are open on other mornings and afternoons. Chris does the horse care (with Craig's help) and exercises all horses. Volunteers, if you aren't looking for lessons, you can make a small donation and come play with our horses to improve your skills. Riding lessons are available by appointment.

Donations - We thank all of you who donated this past year. We had a some new donors join us and so very much appreciate supporters who have been helping every year. When you, our supporters, spread the word we can increase our donor roster. We received donations from American Family Insurance, Karen Dorian friends, Malena Family, Marie Shadden, Smith Family, Three Bars Feed & Tack, Wolfe Family and VGM Associates to name a few. Seeking new donors - It's what non-profits must do to survive. Thank you to ALL listed in our Donation Section - we truly appreciate your generous gifts.

Our riders face extra financing challenges just for day-to-day living, so rider fees are as low as possible. Insurance and government programs usually do not support Equine Assisted Activities. The benefit our riders receive is so appreciated, their

families struggle to have them ride. Consistency is why I believe new riders come to us each year and previous riders return. We must be doing something right as some of our riders have been with us for nearly 30 years. One I've worked with for 39 years. It works. Most riders see improvements the very first ride. Some come to achieve particular goals and some come just because they love to ride and we can make it happen for them - hence the long-time riders we have. They love to ride, but cannot ride elsewhere due to their challenges.

Fundraising - A non-profit must "always" fund raise to bridge the difference between what it costs to operate and what our riders pay for services. If the funding isn't available, we don't buy it. We have always been very careful with spending. Total operating costs are not covered by our rider fees. We offer a discount to our riders who pay in advance. A few riders, however, choose to pay the full cost for their riding and we are so very grateful for their support and confidence. Donations must bridge the difference.

We are approved as an Arizona Qualifying Charitable Organization for 2026. Donations made to us can result in a dollar for dollar reduction on your AZ State Tax return. Use QCO Code 22306 on Form 321 for that tax dollar reduction on your AZ State Taxes. Up to \$506 for a single person and \$1,009 for a couple is available. We also have our "Buy a Bale of Hay" Fundraiser ongoing. Some fundraising ideas could be - a wine tasting or a painting party. Anyone can set up a simple fundraiser. Got "Spare Change" - we'll take it. A scholarship fundraiser would be good to support the riders on scholarships. Usually, several riders ask for funding assistance each year. Little events like a dinner with friends, a t-shirt raffle or a car wash can really help. We appreciate the continued support of regular donors and want them to know they are appreciated to allow us to keep doing.

Fundraising and donations brought in \$22,237 which was \$13,450 more than last year. The extra was due to a very generous \$10,000 donation from VGM Associates. General costs are going up and we must keep asking for donations to keep everything working well. We are always working to secure donations as fundraising is a critical need for all non-profits.

Vehicle repair expenses were up a bit. Insurance, both auto and medical, increased. Hay costs last year were slightly lower, but don't know what it will be going forward. Other expenses inched up, but remained pretty stable.

New Car Fundraiser. When our Elantra at 311,000 miles. We had to finance a new car and chose a KIA Soul. We are seeking donations to pay for it and set a goal of \$26,000. We have \$4,550 yet to go.

"Buy a Bale of Hay" - Just ask folks you know to donate \$10 to support our horses - Or \$25 to purchase a bale of hay, - only the cost of a large pizza. If you encourage 5 friends to join in - - and - they ask 5 friends - - - and so on we could make it happen. Although it doesn't sound like much, this would give us all we need to support our horses. The best ways to donate are through Zelle (using stableinfi@aol.com e-mail) . Our Pay Pal Donor Button also works, but PayPal takes 3% of your donation. Better yet, send your Horse Care gift directly to us. Thank you to those who donated to our Buy a Bale of Hay fundraiser. It's a start. Often folks ONLY NEED TO BE ASKED. Donations have come from various companies simply because their employees asked. Does your company offer funding or grants? You don't know if you don't ask.

Our usual fundraising needs each year are: Insurance \$1,000, PATH Membership \$650, Continuing Education for our instructor, \$500, our 4 horses require board, feed, vet and hoof trimming to the tune of around \$14,000. Our instructor works more than the small salary gives for her time. Instructor compensation has not increased since 2000, in fact we have dropped her compensation since our Mesa location closed. She puts over 50 hours a week into the program with teaching, office administration, fundraising, horse care and exercise. Office and utility expenses never go away. We have \$4,550 remaining to pay off the new car. We used the Hudson's personal dually pick-up truck for necessary horse transport. Craig continues to donate time to keep everything running well..

Cooking for Kids

Liber-T's Goopy Tortilla S'Mores

1 (10 ounce) package large marshmallows, frozen
1 (13.5 ounce) package graham crackers, crumbled

1 (12 ounce) bag semisweet chocolate chips
8 (10 inch) flour tortillas

Cut frozen marshmallows into smaller pieces. Layer graham crackers, marshmallow pieces, and chocolate chips on 4 tortillas, leaving a 1-inch border; top with remaining 4 tortillas.

Heat a lightly oiled griddle over medium heat. Add filled tortillas; cook until marshmallows and chocolate chips melted, about 2 minutes per side. Cool 1 minute; cut each tortilla into 4 wedges.

Note Substitute teddy bear-shaped graham snacks (such as Teddy Grahams) for the graham crackers if desired.
