## Dear Children of God,

Over the last few weeks of Wednesday Lenten services, we have been talking about how Jesus steps on our toes, and how that challenges us to look at the world differently. We have heard how Jesus disrupted the order in the temple, called fisherman who were low in stature during that time, called a tax collector to discipleship and the list goes on.

I think of the ways Jesus steps on our toes, and challenges us to look beyond ourselves and makes us uncomfortable with the world and the situations we live in. And how it is easier for us to ignore reality in the world we live than stretch beyond our comfort zones.

I was talking with one of our members and she was talking about how well we as a congregation had moved to an online presence. I told her I never wanted to be a televangelist and how hard it was for me to make that jump! Jesus clearly pushed me out of my comfort zone. Charles has learned more about video formats, YouTube and Facebook then he probably ever thought he would learn. Luis is learning about phone calling and reaching out in new ways, when he can't be in our neighborhood in person. And Judi, has put together more e-news together than she ever imagined! The staff has learned to cope and adjust and we have moved outside the norm to make this all work. And we have felt God stepping on our toes and pushing us.

The congregation has done the same! You are Zooming, YouTubing, and Facebooking in order to be a part of worship, Bible Studies, gatherings and meetings. And you all have pivoted in amazing ways. Some of you have moved to automatic giving, and the check book has been put in the drawer. You are having automatic draft, text to give, checks sent from your bank account automatically. And we have brought in new folks to our worship because of what we are doing. New members have joined the family since COVID!

This has allowed up to remain in contact. And as we all are beginning to get vaccinated, and we are looking forward to in person worship inside, in the coming months. But Jesus is still pushing us! How will we use this technology and the things we have learned in the future in order to further God's kingdom. That is the question that we are grappling with today as a council and throughout the congregational leadership! If you have ideas, we want to hear them!

God continues to step on our toes. God continues to push us outside our comfort zone! God continues to make God's love known.

Thanks be to God who is still on the loose! Nothing will hold God back! God's love will be made known!

### A STORY OF GENEROSITY


### A Message from your Stewardship Ministry Team

A long time ago there was a young boy who lived in Capernaum, a city along the north-west shore of the Sea of Galilee. No one knows this boy or his name. He was just one of 5000 nameless individuals who happened to be in the presence of Jesus one afternoon along the seashore. Yet even though we do not know his name, this young boy played a pivotal role in what occurred on that day. His generosity made it possible for Jesus to feed those gathered on the shore of the Sea of Galilee from his lunch box that contained five barley loaves and two tilapia. This simple meal, barely enough to feed himself and one other person, enabled Jesus to feed a multitude of individuals and still have food left over.

That young boy could have easily kept his lunch to himself and said, "if I give it away, I will have nothing left for me!" He could have hidden his bread and fish or simply said to those who asked him to share, "No! It's mine and you can't have it!". But he did none of those things. He shared what he had probably realizing it was never enough to feed those 5000 people, but he gave what he had. And that made a difference in the people being fed with a simple meal of bread and fish or going home hungry.

This story illustrates what can happen when we practice generosity. Great things can happen when we choose to share what we have, even if we believe what we possess is too small or insignificant to make a difference. Your gifts to Holy Trinity, no matter the size, makes a difference in the lives of many. When you practice and live out your faith through a life of generosity amazing things can happen.

In the coming year you will hear more about how we can "Live Generously" and how so many of you are already expressing this is so many ways. You will be asked to share what you possess with God so that great miracles can happen. No gift is too small. No gift is too meager. God calls us as we enter a new year to share from our abundance and to "Live Generously". Just think what Jesus did with five barley loaves and two tilapia all made possible by a young boy who generously shared his lunch.

We got some good news last week. When Director of Finance Clint Wasser closed the books on our 2020-2021 fiscal year, he discovered congregational giving was 16% over promised gifts. This can only mean one thing—God does amazing things through you!

Faithful mission support from all of our congregations created this abundance. Thank you.

### Because of you:

- We were able to launch Lutheran Advocacy Ministry of Arizona (LAMA), which is fully engaged in issues of hunger and providing support to older adults in their community.
- We offered additional support to even more seminary students.
- We honored all our commitments to our shared missions and ministries: Lutheran Social Services of Nevada, Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary, four campus ministries, just to give a few examples.
- We continued to share half of our received mission support with the Churchwide Office of the ELCA, which assists our national and global ministries. (Fun fact: a part of our churchwide support comes back to our synod through the ministry of our Director of Evangelical Mission, Pastor Miguel Gomez-Acosta.) We went above and beyond in responding to a need of the Mexican Lutheran Church, our companion church. Last year, they requested help to repair the parsonage outside Mexico City. Damaged by multiple earthquakes, the pastor and his family were unable to live in the house. In partnership with the Northeast Ohio Synod and Churchwide, our synod contributed \$15,000 towards the repairs. Ministry can now continue in this location.

Because of you, all this and so much more was made manifest. Because of your faithfulness and generosity, new possibilities were created. Because of you, we are equipped to communicate Jesus and connect the people of the Grand Canyon Synod.

Thank you for your continued generosity in 2021-2022, so we can be church together, better together for the sake of the gospel.






