Preface

The first official Rules Book for shows facilitated by the Miniature Horse Association of Nova Scotia (MHANS) was developed by Kim Horton and adopted in 2007. It was founded on Rules documented by the:

- 'American Miniature Horse Registry' established by the American Shetland Pony Club,
- 'American Miniature Horse Association'
- Input from the MHANS membership

In the 5 years since its inception, MHANS has adopted revisions and customized rules in accordance with the wishes of a majority of membership. These changes were archived in the Minutes of various monthly meetings through June 2012.

This edition incorporates these revisions and as well provides explicit class numbering criteria of use to Show Secretaries as well as in compilation of high point awards; a basic glossary and appendices featuring application forms and safety requirements.

Section 1 – Adoption

The following rules were adopted by the Miniature Horse Association of Nova Scotia (hereinafter referred to MHANS) in 2007 and revised in 2012. These rules shall be applied to all shows.

These approved rules shall be observed by everyone connected in any way with the exhibiting, setting up, stewarding, or judging of MHANS approved shows.

Section 2 ~ Show Committee Responsibilities

A show committee will be established to organize and set up each show, with strict adherence to these rules. At least one member of the show committee must be a member of MHANS. The President (or alternate) may be an ex-officio member of the show committee. Safety will be paramount in the organizing of all shows. The committee will be responsible for all activities related to the show such as (but not limited to):

- Engaging a suitable show location
- Engaging a judge, ring steward, announcer, show secretary and ring crew
- Establishing a show schedule and time (average class time is 15 minutes per class)
 - The mandatory classes (as outlined in Part 8 of this document)
 - Other classes
 - How many classes
 - The order of the classes
- Establishing the prize schedule eg:
 - Will there be ribbons only (eg: Ribbons 1st through 6th place)
 - Will there be prizes and or prize money for classes
- Will there be High Point/Reserve High Point awards/prizes for the show
 - Which classes will count towards the high point/reserve awards (points accumulation must be fair to all competitors)
- Fundraising for all expenses for the show
 - Issuing receipts if required
- Establishing a safety procedures document (see Appendix C) which must include:
 - Address of facility
 - Emergency Contact information
 - A veterinarian name and number
 - o Procedures in case of emergency
 - o Barn rules (if applicable)
 - o Other information as deemed necessary by the Show Committee
- Obtaining all necessary equipment for the show eg:

- o Jumps (MHANS owns one set)
- o PA system (MHANS owns)
- o Cones, pylons, stop watches, bridge, ramp,
- All advertising for the show
 - o Developing, printing, distributing all show lists, entry forms etc.
- Coordinating and maintaining all necessary paperwork eg:
 - Receiving all entry forms, ensuring all entries are accurate and complete and paid in full
 - o Checking that all entrants have a signed waiver on file.
 - Compiling the information into class lists for each class with the necessary columns for the show secretary to record the placings and points for each class. Preparing copies of this for the Show Secretary and others that may require (eg: whipper in or gatekeeper)
 - Developing Judges Cards for the Judge
 - Tabulating and compiling the completed class lists for the show high point/reserve awards (if applicable)
 - Submitting these completed show documents to the MHANS executive for compilation of year end high point awards
- Developing a budget, income and expense statement for the show and submitting same to the MHANS Treasurer
 - All shows must be funded completely by the show committee (no show shall run in the negative)
 - o 1/3 of the class entry fees is to be paid back to the MHANS General Account
 - All show number fees are to be paid back to the MHANS General Account
- The show committee shall be responsible for the overall running of the show

Section 3 – Eligibility to Exhibit in MHANS Shows

A. All exhibitors must be current, paid up members of the Miniature Horse Association of Nova Scotia (see Appendix A – Membership Application).

B. All entrants must provide proof of liability insurance.

- A valid membership in the Nova Scotia Equestrian Federation will provide the necessary insurance. The Nova Scotia Equestrian Federation Number must be recorded on the show entry form.
- Failure to record the number or provide a copy of the membership card will automatically disqualify entrants from exhibiting.
- Those with farm or individual insurance policies, must supply a letter

from the insurance company specifying that the insurance provides liability insurance for shows.

- C. Every horse and handler pair must have a show number. This show number is valid for the full show season at all of MHANS shows. The show number application (Appendix B) must be accompanied with a legible copy of the horse's registration papers.
- **D.** All horses must be registered and a copy of the horses' registration certificate must accompany the show number application form. Some recognized registering bodies are:
 - American Miniature Horse Association (AMHA)
 - American Miniature Horse Registry (AMHR)
 - World Class Registry
- E. For the horses that have registrations pending:
 A photocopy of the Application for the horse's registration from the registering organization must accompany the show number application form (Appendix B) or a photocopy of the original papers must accompany the show number application form.
- F Horses shown under a false identity will be automatically and immediately disqualified by the ring Steward under direction of the show officials.
- G. MHANS shall recognize two divisions of miniature horses. A miniature horse measuring 34" and under shall be considered in the Under Division (A- Division). A miniature horse measuring over 34" shall be considered in the Over Division (B-Division). No horse, regardless of parentage, which measures over 38" shall be allowed to show as a miniature horse.
- **H.** Horses requiring a measurement at a show, must be measured on a hard, level surface, preferably concrete or paved, by a Steward and witnessed by a member of the Horse Show Committee or the subcommittee of MHANS who is sponsoring the show.

Section 4 – Standard of Perfection of the Miniature Horse

The standard of perfection shall be the guidelines used in judging the confirmation of halter classes.

A. General Impression: A small, sound, well-balanced horse which gives the impression of strength, agility and alertness. The disposition should be eager and friendly, not skittish.

- B. Size: The American Miniature Horse must measure not more than 34 inches at the base of the last hair on the mane for Under Division (A-division), and not more than 38 inches for Over Division (B-Division). Since the breed objective is the smallest possible perfect horse, preference in judging shall be given to the smallest, all other factors being equal. In no case shall a smaller horse be placed over a larger horse with better conformation. Priority in judging shall be in this order:
 - 1. Soundness
 - 2. Balance, and conformity to the standard of perfection
 - 3. Size
- **C. Head:** In proportion to the body; neither excessively long nor short. The eyes should be large, alert, and prominent with no discrimination in color. The ears, open toward the front and carried erect. The teeth should show no signs of parrot mouth or undershot jaw.
- **D. Neck:** Strong and muscular, proportionate to body and the type of horse represented.
- **E. Body:** Well-muscled with good bone and substance, well sprung ribs, level topline, as nearly as possible of equal height in withers and rump, fore and hind quarters well angulated, so that the horse in movement shows a smooth gait.
- F. Legs: Straight, clean and sound.
- **G. Hooves:** Round and compact, trimmed as short as practical for an unshod horse, and in good condition.
- **H.** Color: Any color, eye color and/or marking pattern is equally acceptable.
- **I.** Throat-Latch: Clean and well defined, allowing ample flexion at the poll.
- **J. Shoulder:** Long, sloping and well-angulated, allowing a free swinging stride and alert head/neck carriage. Well muscled forearm.
- **K. Hindquarters:** Long, well-muscled hip, thigh and gaskin. The highest point of the croup is the same height as the withers. Tail-set neither excessively high nor low, but smoothly rounding off the rump.
- L. Dwarfism, complete loss of sight in either eye, unsoundness; cryptorchidism in aged stallions is not acceptable.
- M. Horses shall show with full mane and tail (no full roach). Mane and tail length shall be left to the decision and discretion of the exhibitor. Thinning, pulling,

shortening, etc., of a mane and tail is permissible.

Section 5 – Age Criteria

- **A.** "Youth" an individual who has not attained eighteen (18) years of age as of December 31st of the current competition year (example: For 2007 a youth must not have attained 18 by December 31, 2006).
 - I) Youth 16 & 17 may opt to show in adult, ladies or gentlemen classes instead of youth classes with signed consent from their parents or guardian. But they will not be permitted to show in both youth and adult classes at the same show.
 - II) Youth under 16 will not be permitted to show a stallion.
 - III) Youth 16 & 17 will be permitted to show stallions but only in adult classes. Stallions will not be permitted in youth classes.
 - III) All Youth must wear a helmet that meets current standards for equipment designed and manufactured for use while driving a horse as established by the American Society of Testing and Materials (ASTM).
 - IV) All Youth under 13 years of age must have a header or an attendant
- **B.** Ladies may be 16 years and older.
- **C.** Gentlemen may be 16 years and older.
- **D.** Adults may be 16 years and older.
- **E.** Golden Age must be 55 years old or older.
- **F.** A miniature horse is considered to be one year old on January 1st following the actual foaling date (eg: a horse born in July 2006 will be considered 1 year old on January 1, 2007).

Section 6 – Officials

- **A.** All show officials should dress in correct attire. Judges, Stewards and management are representing MHANS and should dress as such (logos, monograms, etc. are not considered correct attire).
- **B.** All show officials shall run the show in a fair and prudent manner using caution to not show favoritism among the competitors.
- C. For safety reasons in any class where the exhibitor does not have control of their horse, the Judge or Steward are required to excuse the exhibitor. An exhibitor cannot protest this action.
- D. Safety of the exhibitors and spectators is to be of the utmost importance in all aspects of the show.
- E. A class that is deemed too large to show safely in the arena to be judged all at

once shall be split. The portion split for subsequent judging will be asked to await their turn outside the ring.

Section 7 – Artificial Appliances and Irritants

- **A.** Any horse showing evidence of the use of ginger or other irritants to produce a higher tail carriage than normal shall be disqualified by the judge.
- **B.** Switches, artificial tails (except in Park Harness where they are optional),or manes and high spoon cruppers are prohibited.
- C. No horse having had surgery for purely cosmetic purposes will be permitted to show. (example: ear trimming, ear wiring, docked tails, etc.)
- **D.** Ribbons, braids, all decorative appurtenances and stallion tack in halter conformation classes are not allowed unless otherwise specified in MHANS official class description. Bits are allowed on stallions.
- **E.** Shod horses are not allowed on the show grounds. No pads, wedges, chains, or ankle boots are allowed to be used on the grounds of a MHANS show.

Exceptions to the rule:

- 1. Draft harness classes may be shown with light plate shoes or draft type shoes, with toe and heel caulks.
- 2. Roadster classes only, un-weighted bell type boots are optional.
- 3. Roman Chariot event classes may be shown with light plate shoes.
- 4. Appropriate protective leg gear is allowed in Hunter and Jumper classes.

Section 8 – Year End High Point Criteria

As part of the sanctioning of the shows will be the tabulations of high point awards for presentation during the year end banquet of MHANS.

The following class list is the minimum class list and **must** be offered at all MHANS Shows. Additional classes may be offered at the show committee's discretion but must follow the rules outlined in this document.

- Stallions 3 years and Older Halter Class
- Mares 3 years and Older Halter Class
- Geldings 3 years and Older Halter Class
- Yearling & 2 year old Stallions, Mares and Geldings (combined) Halter Class
- Youth Pleasure Driving
- Youth Cones Course Driving
- Youth Roadster Driving
- Youth Barrels Driving Class

- Youth Poles Driving Class
- Adult Pleasure Driving Under Division (A Division)
- Adult Pleasure Driving Over Division (B Division)
- Adult Cones Course Driving -Under Division (A Division)
- Adult Cones Course Driving Over Division (B Division)
- Adult Roadster Driving Under Division (A Division)
- Adult Roadster Driving Over Division (B Division)
- Adult Barrels Driving Class -Under Division (A Division)
- Adult Barrels Driving Class Over Division (B Division)
- Adult Poles Driving Class Under Division (A Division)
- Adult Poles Driving Class Over Division (B Division)
- Novice Handler (can be Pleasure Driving or one or more of the other classes)
- Green Horse (can be Pleasure Driving or one or more of the other classes)

The above list of classes will be used to tabulate the high points for the year end banquet. The points will be accumulated by the number of entrants in each class and the placings as per the following table.

There shall be nine year-end high point awards:

- 1. **The Halter Horse of The Year** ~ shall be the horse, regardless of sex, who has accumulated the most points at the MHANS Sanctioned Shows in any of the following conformation halter classes:
 - Stallions 3 years and Older
 - Mares 3 years and Older
 - Geldings 3 years and Older
 - Yearling & 2 year old Stallions, Mares and Geldings (combined)

Rationale: This will recognize the horse that places most consistently, with regard to conformation, at all the shows. One of MHANS objectives is: to promote any idea, development or activity that shall be for the betterment of miniature horses in Nova Scotia. Therefore, we should be promoting the horses that best define the conformation of the breed

- 2. The Youth Handler Performance Horse of The Year ~ shall be the horse and handler combination that has accumulated the most points in the MHANS sanctioned shows in the following performance classes:
 - Youth Pleasure Driving
 - Youth Roadster Driving

Rationale: These classes represent a variety of driving styles and abilities. Emphasis will be on the handler (to demonstrate versatility in executing the different classes); as well as the horse (to perform within the acceptable standards for each of the classes).

- 3. The Adult Handler Performance Horse of The Year A Division ~ shall be the horse and handler combination that has accumulated the most points in the MHANS sanctioned shows in the following performance classes:
 - Adult Pleasure Driving A Division
 - Adult Roadster Driving A Division

Rationale: These classes represent a variety of driving styles and abilities. Emphasis will be on the handler (to demonstrate versatility in executing the different classes); as well as the horse (to perform within the acceptable standards for each of the classes).

- 4. The Adult Handler Performance Horse of The Year 'B' Division ~ shall be the horse and handler combination that has accumulated the most points in the MHANS sanctioned shows in the following performance classes:
 - Adult Pleasure Driving B Division
 - Adult Roadster Driving B Division

Rationale: These classes represent a variety of driving styles and abilities. Emphasis will be on the handler (to demonstrate versatility in executing the different classes); as well as the horse (to perform within the acceptable standards for each of the classes).

- 5. The Youth Handler Gymkhana Horse of The Year ~ shall be the horse and handler combination that has accumulated the most points in the MHANS sanctioned shows in the following timed events:
 - Youth Cones Course Driving Class
 - Youth Barrels Driving Class
 - Youth Poles Driving Class

Rationale: With all three classes being timed events, these classes represent a balance between speed and accuracy. Emphasis will be on: the handler to demonstrate control as well as discipline in handling their horse.

- 6. The Adult Handler Gymkhana Horse of The Year -'A' Division ~ shall be the horse and handler combination that has accumulated the most points in the MHANS sanctioned shows in the following timed events:
 - · Adult Cones Course Driving Class 'A' Division

- · Adult Barrels Driving Class 'A' Division
- · Adult Poles Driving Class 'A' Division

Rationale: With all three classes being timed events, these classes represent a balance between speed and accuracy. Emphasis will be on: the handler to demonstrate control as well as discipline in handling their horse.

- 7. **The Adult Handler Gymkhana Horse of The Year 'B' Division** ~ shall be the horse and handler combination that has accumulated the most points in the MHANS sanctioned shows in the following timed events:
 - · Adult Cones Course Driving Class 'B' Division
 - · Adult Barrels Driving Class 'B' Division
 - Adult Poles Driving Class 'B' Division

Rationale: With all three classes being timed events, these classes represent a balance between speed and accuracy. Emphasis will be on: the handler to demonstrate control as well as discipline in handling their horse.

8. **The Green Horse** ~ shall be the horse and handler combination that has accumulated the most points in the MHANS sanctioned shows in all Green classes.

Rationale: Green horse classes give the horse who has not shown before an opportunity to get used to the show ring and surroundings. These classes give the experienced handler an opportunity to prepare their show prospects for competition.

9. **The Novice Handler** ~ shall be the horse and handler combination that accumulated the most points in the MHANS sanctioned shows in all Novice Classes and or classes that the novice handler can compete in (excluding line class).

Rationale: Novice Handler classes give the handler who has not shown before an opportunity to get used to the show ring and surroundings.

Section 9 – Ring Procedure

- A. Dress: It is the tradition of the show ring that handlers and drivers be correctly attired for their classes. T-shirts, shorts, open toed shoes or sandals, clothes with logos or monograms are not correct attire and will not be allowed in the show ring. Horse and handler must look their best. No farm, individual or horses names may be displayed on exhibitor (exception: Draft Classes) Hats, gloves, or apron may be worn, except when in formal attire where the aforementioned is mandatory. No strapless dresses in any driving class. Formal wear should not be worn before 5 p.m. unless stake classes are held in the afternoon session.
- B. A horse must be handled and shown through an entire class by the same person.

- Should an additional handler be required due to physical limitation or emergency, approval must be obtained from the Show Steward.
- C. Names of horses being exhibited will not be made known to the Judge prior to the class. Exhibitors will be issued a number for each horse and handler combination to be displayed on the back of the handler or on the vehicle in a clearly visible position whenever the horse is in the ring. This number will stand for the entire show season for that horse and handler combination.
- D. Conduct designed to distract a horse or otherwise interfere with the showing of another exhibitor's horse will not be tolerated by the show management. Offenders will be asked to leave the show area. If the offender is also an exhibitor, he or she will be excused from the ring and barred from personally showing during that show. His or her horses, however, may compete.

E. Class Splits:

- 1. Depending on the size of the arena and the number of entrants in a class it may be necessary to split the class into sections. The splits shall be determined by the show management and must be announced before the judging of the class commences. The first group will proceed into the ring to start the class, the remaining exhibitors will remain OUTSIDE the ring, on standby, until they are called into the ring to exhibit.
- 2. The horses selected from each split shall return to the ring and the horses shall show (as if a new class) for the final placing.
- F. For safety reasons an unruly horse may be excused from the ring by the Judge, Ring Steward, or Show Steward. An exhibitor cannot protest this action.
- G. For safety reasons an unruly horse may be excused from the show grounds, or barred from showing by the MHANS Show Committee. An exhibitor cannot protest this action. No refunds will be granted.
- H. Horses that appear unsound shall be excused from the ring by the Judge, Ring Steward, or Show Steward. An exhibitor cannot protest this action. No refunds will be granted.
- I. Youth under age 16 will not be permitted to show a stallion.

Section 10 – Halter Division

- **A.** The standard of perfection shall be the guidelines used in judging the confirmation of halter classes.
- **B**. Horses to be shown in halter at a walk and trot. The Judge must ask for the horse to walk past them and then trot away. The Judge must also ask for the horse to trot

- away and make an L-turn to enable the Judge to view the movement of the horse from the side.
- C. Halter Ring Pattern - All horses are to enter the ring at a walk counter-clockwise on a loose lead to a designated point marked by a cone approximately 20 feet from the gate and then proceed at a trot past judge(s) (to be viewed from the side in motion). Judging will begin at the cone. Line up horses head to tail along the rail. From line-up, walk to judge(s) and trot back into the end of line. Either side of the arena may be used. (see diagram.) Second looks from judge(s) to be from head to tail line-up on rail (see diagram).
- **D**. The horse is to be shown to its best advantage. It is preferred that the horse stands square. The Judge at his or her discretion may ask to have the horse stand square, which means all four feet are flat on the ground and at least one front and one rear cannon bone perpendicular to the ground.
- **E**. Horses may be clipped or shown in full coat.
- **F**. Horses may be shown with or without polished hooves.
- **G**. Horses must be serviceably sound, in good condition, and well-groomed. Transmissible weakness and unsoundness to be penalized.
- **H**. No whips and/or crops are allowed in halter classes.
- I. The bitting of stallions is permitted, but no stallion tack is allowed.
- **J**. In halter division any type halter is permissible.
- **K**. Thinning, pulling, shortening etc., of a mane and tail is permissible. The mane and tail length shall be left to the decision of the exhibitor.
- L. Changing the coat color of a horse is not permitted but highlighting the mane and tail, eyes, ears, muzzle, etc., is permissible.
- **M**. Judged on priority of:
 - a) Conformation
 - b) Quality
 - c) Presence
 - d) Way of going
 - e) Type
- **N.** Halter Class Descriptions:
 - 1) **Individual Classes -** for Stallions, Mares, Geldings, Foals, may be held in

- each age category.
- 2) **Broodmare -** may have current foal at side (wet).
- 3) **Get-of-Sire** is three offspring, any age, any sex, by the same stallion. The sire is not shown. More than one set of Get may be entered at the same show. Single or combined ownership of the get is allowed. The entry is made in the name of the sire. Judged 100% on conformation and uniformity.
- 4) **Produce-of-Dam** is two offspring, any age, any sex, out of the same dam. The dam is not required to show. Judged 100% on conformation and uniformity.
- 5) **Mare and Foal** class shall be a mare and her current year foal. Judged 100% on conformation and uniformity.
- **O.** In all group classes (Eg: Get-of-Sire, Produce-of-Dam, Mare and Foal, Herd of Four, etc.) horses shall be judged standing still. These horses are never asked to move.
- P. Youth Halter: All youth classes may be split, 7 years and under, 8-12 years, and 13-17 years; or 12 years and under, and 13-17 years. Open to miniature mare or gelding, any age, shown by a youth. Youth will not be permitted to show a stallion in Youth Halter classes. To be judged on breed, character, conformation, performance, quality, and manners. The exhibitor is to have complete control of the horse throughout the class. Spotters are permitted, but are there only for a safety factor and must stand back from the child and horse two paces.
- Q. Championship and Reserve Championship Class shall include first and second place winners from the appropriate classes. In no case shall a second place horse place over the horse who placed first (Eg: 1: Stallion winner was "A" and second the place was "B". As the two horses move to the championship class, "B" can never receive a higher placing than "A". The Champion must be selected from the first place winners. The remaining first place winners and the second place winners will then be eligible for the Reserve Champion. No points are awarded for the Championship and Reserve Championship Class.
- **R.** The numbering of the halter classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34") Examples:

Division A Mare 3 years and older - the class number shall be **123A Division B** Mares 3 years and older - the class number shall be **123B**

Section 11 – Driving Division General Rules

- A. **Guidance:** The driving division was founded for the purpose of developing and furthering the art and sport of driving for pleasure. A complete knowledge of and compliance with the rules are essential.
- B. The only person to handle the reins, under penalty of elimination, is the driver. No change of driver is permitted during any class.
- C. Youth under 13 competing must have an attendant in the vehicle or a header. The youth must be in full control of the horse without assistance. (The attendant and header are there for safety)
- D. **Dress Code:** Headers, Drivers and their passengers should be dressed appropriately. Dress in the show ring is to complement the overall appearance of the unit, not take away from the appearance. Whip should be carried in the hand or cart.
 - 1. Hats, and apron may be worn. Horses are being shown, not the driver.
 - 2. No strapless dresses in any driving class.
 - 3. No sandals or open toed shoes to be worn by driver or header.
 - 4. No T-shirts or shorts.
 - 5. No farm, individual, or animal names may be displayed. Exception: Draft harness classes.
 - 6. Youth are required to wear a helmet that meets ASTM (American Society of Testing and Materials) Standards.
- E. Horses must be 3 years old and serviceably sound to drive in any driving class where there is a cart hooked to the horse (exception may be ground driving where there is no cart hooked to the horse).

- F. Boots, wraps, etc. of any description are prohibited. Roadster classes un-weighted bell type boots are optional.
- G. Driving whips must be of suitable style, and the tip of the lash must not reach past the shoulder of the horse.
- H. Stake classes will be placed 1st thru 6th place. A horse must have entered, been shown and been judged in a qualifying class in order to participate in the corresponding stake class.
 - Example: To show in the Roadster Stake the horse must show in another roadster class, and cannot qualify by showing in a pleasure class.
- I. Roman Chariot event is an optional class. To be judged as a costume driving class, not a race.

J. Cross Entering:

- 1. Pleasure horses cannot cross-enter into Country Pleasure or Park Divisions at the same show.
- 2. Country Pleasure horses cannot cross-enter into Pleasure or Park Divisions at the same show.
- 3. Park horses cannot cross-enter into Pleasure or Country Pleasure at the same show.
- 4. Once a horse has been shown in a driving class (other than a Novice Driving Class) they cannot cross back over to show in a Novice Class.

K. Safety:

- 1. All persons involved in driving drivers, grooms, competition officials, spectators, etc., should place safety first.
- 2. Horses should never be left unattended while hitched to a vehicle.
- 3. A driver should never allow passengers to enter a vehicle until the driver is seated with reins in hand and driver must never dismount while passengers are in the vehicle.
- 4. Headers or an attendant (must be 16 years old or older) are required in all youth driving classes. Headers are to enter the ring when the line-up is called, may assist in setting up the animal and then step back two paces where they are to remain (except in an emergency), until the Judge's card is turned in. Note: Judges are cautioned that this rule in no way negates the requirement in youth classes that animals must display good manners, stand quietly in the line-up and back readily in Pleasure and Country Pleasure classes.
- 5. A Judge or Show Steward may excuse from competition an unsafe vehicle, unsafe equipment, unsafe hitching of horses or an unruly horse.
- 6. All rules of the road should be observed unless officials direct otherwise.
- 7. Excessively large classes may be divided by management or Judge, as conditions warrant.

- 8. Stallions are not permitted in youth driving classes.
- 9. All driving horses shall show on the rail at all times except while passing. The Judge is to take this into consideration while judging and horses shown off the rail shall be penalized.
- 10. Exhibitor numbers may be worn on the back of the exhibitor or attached to the back of cart in an easily visible position for Pleasure Driving, Country Pleasure Driving, and Park divisions, and must be worn on the back of the exhibitor in the Roadster division.
- 11. It is permissible for a driver to talk to a horse in a subdued tone of voice, although a driver should strive to control the horse's movement with a minimum of vocal aids. Talking loud, whistling, or shouting at a horse is not acceptable.
- 12. No entry may leave the ring after judging has begun without the permission of the Judge or Ring Steward.
- 13. During the class, minor adjustments to harness may be made upon permission from the Judge. A groom may assist with the adjustment without penalty. The time out shall be clocked and the adjustment or repair is not to exceed 5 minutes. Only one time out per class per entry is allowed and must not exceed the 5 minutes allowed. After the class has begun no groom may enter the ring without permission of the Judge.
- 14. The Judge will ask the horses to reverse on the diagonal for safety reasons. The Judge may ask for a reverse on the diagonal at a walk or collected trot.
- 15. All driving horses must be at least 3 years of age to drive in any driving class where there is a cart hooked to the horse (exception may be ground driving where there is no cart hooked to the horse).

L. **Division of Classes**

- 1. Classes in all divisions of pleasure driving competition may be offered for singles, pairs, tandem, unicorns, four-in-hand etc.
- 2. Classes may be offered for:
 - a. Open no age restriction on drivers, all sexes. Note: All driving horses must be 3 years and older. Open classes can be divided by height within each division.
 - b. Adults open to drivers 16 years and older
 - c. Ladies must be 16 years and older
 - d. Gentlemen must be 16 years and older
 - e. Youth exhibitors who have not reached their 18th birthday by December 31st of the current year. Youth 16 & 17 may opt to show in Adult driving classes with signed permission from their parent or guardian. Youth showing as an adult will not be permitted to show as a youth in the same show.
 - f. Green Horse: the horse must be their first year/season showing (they may have shown in a halter or in-hand class in prior years). For safety reasons, Green horses are to be shown by experienced handlers.
 - g. Novice Handler it is the handler's first year showing, they are deemed to

- be inexperienced in showing. They must show an experienced horse for safety reasons.
- 3. A class that is deemed too large to show safely in the arena to be judged all at once shall be split. The portion split for subsequent judging will be asked to await their turn outside the ring.

Section 11(A) – Pleasure Driving

A. General

- 1. Boots, wraps, etc. of any description are prohibited.
- 2. Driving whips, if used, must be of suitable style, and the tip of the lash must not reach past the shoulder of the horse.
- 3. All pleasure driving vehicles must be of the two wheel type and have a basket for single and tandem. Pairs, unicorns, four in hand etc. must be shown in a 4 wheeled vehicle. Undue noise created by a vehicle will be a reason to excuse the entry from the ring.
- 4. Harness in the Pleasure Division must be of the light type with breast collars. No full hames allowed. Round or square blinders are permissible in pleasure driving classes. Side or over-checks are required. When shown, the horse must have blinders and the check must be hooked. No other appliances may be used on a driving horse other than the harness. (Example: no fly nets on the ears, face, or body).
- 5. Martingales may or may not be used.
- 6. Check bits may be used but are not required.
- 7. Braids, matching the stable colors, one in the foretop and one immediately back of the bridle path as seen on the larger pleasure driving horses is optional.
- 8. Attire for showing pleasure horses shall be of the type described in the general driving rules. Formal wear should not be worn before 5 p.m. unless stake classes are held in an afternoon performance session. No strapless tops allowed.

B. Ring Procedure:

Pleasure driving horses are to enter the ring counter-clockwise (to the right) at a pleasure trot. To be shown both ways of the arena at a walk, pleasure trot, and extended trot. To stand quietly and to rein back. To be judged 60% on performance, manners and way of going, 30% on the condition, fit and appropriateness of harness and vehicle; and 10% on neatness, appropriateness of attire, and overall impression. Excessive speed will be penalized.

- a. **Walk:** A free, regular and forward moving 4- beat gait. The horse should walk energetically, but calmly, with even and determined pace.
- b. **Pleasure Trot:** The horse should maintain forward impulsion while showing submission to the bit. The trot is slower and more collected, but the

horse should indicate willingness to be driven on the bit while maintaining a steady cadence.

- c. **Extended Trot:** This is a clear, but not excessive, increase in gait and length of stride. The horse goes forward freely, engaging the hind legs with good hock action, on a taut but light rein, the position balanced and unconstrained.
- C. The numbering of the Pleasure Driving classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")
 Examples:

Section 11(B) – Country Pleasure Driving

A. General

- 1. Country Pleasure driving is to be shown in a two wheel cart for single and tandem. Pairs, unicorns, four in hand etc. must be shown in a 4 wheeled vehicle. Bike tires or wooden wheels are permissible.
- 2. Harness in the Country Pleasure Division must be of the light type. Breast collars or light collars are permissible, but no full hames allowed. Breeching is optional. Side or overchecks are required. When shown, the horse must have blinders (round or square) and the check must be hooked. No other appliances may be used on a driving horse other than the harness. (Example: no fly nets on the ears, face, or body).
- 3. Martingales may or may not be used.
- 4. Check bits may be used but are not required
- B. **Ring Procedure:** Country Pleasure Driving horses are to enter the ring counterclockwise (to the right) at a country pleasure trot. To be shown both ways of the arena at a walk, country pleasure trot and an extended trot. To stand quietly and to rein back. To be judged 60% on performance, manners and way of going, 30% on the condition, fit and appropriateness of harness and vehicle, and 10% on neatness, appropriateness of attire and overall impression. Over checks and side checks should be slightly loose, not snug. The head set should appear natural for the horse. Excessive knee action and speed to be penalized.
 - a. Walk: A free, regular and forward moving four beat gait. The horse should walk energetically, but calmly, with an even and determined gait.
 - b. Country Pleasure Trot: A balanced, easy moving, relaxed two beat gait demonstrating forward movement.
 - c. Extended Trot: A clear increase in gait and length of stride. The horse should move freely on a taut, but light rein, while maintaining a balanced gait and forward movement. Excessive knee action and speed shall be penalized.
- C. The numbering of the Country Pleasure Driving classes shall be consistent

through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:

• When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 11(C) – Draft Harness Horses

- A. Classes: In the draft harness division classes may be offered for singles, pairs, tandem, unicorns, four-, six and eight-in-hand.
- B. Horses must be shown hitched to a suitable 4 wheeled vehicle, except that of a 2 wheeled cart may be used for single or tandem.
- C. All horses must be harnessed with heavy harness (collar with full hames and breeching). The wagon and/or harness may display the owner's name, advertising, logo, monograms etc.
- D. Horses to be shown both ways of the ring at a natural walk and trot. Horses to stand quietly and back readily; will be worked in a figure eight, and "gee and haw". Docking is optional. Tandem and unicorn are to be worked at Judge's discretion. Headers (16 years of age and older) may be used for safety.
- E. Draft driving classes may be divided in the same fashions in the pleasure driving division.
- F. In the draft harness division braiding of tails and manes in the style used by the larger heavy harness breeds may be used. Shoeing and bits similar to the type used by the larger heavy harness breeds are permissible.
- G. The numbering of the Draft Harness Driving classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:

When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 11(D) – Fine Harness Horses

- Classes may be offered for pairs, tandems, unicorns, four-in-hand, six-in-hand, or A.
- B. Gait Requirements: Hitches are to enter the show ring at a trot going counter-clockwise (to the right). The horses should be judged showing two gaits, a trot and a flat footed walk, working both ways of the arena. Horses are to stand quietly and rein back at the discretion of the Judge.
- C. Horses must be harnessed in fine harness with breast collar or full collar (no full hames or breeching) and shown to an appropriate vehicle. Tandem classes: whip length to be long enough to touch the front horse.
- The numbering of the Fine Harness Driving classes shall be consistent through-out D. all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 11(E) – Park Harness Horses

- A. General: The horse is to give a brilliant performance with style, presence, finish, balance and cadence. Park horse to be neatly trimmed, well groomed, braided (same as USA Equestrian braid) with one braid in the foretop and one immediately back of the bridle path. Tail braces and false tails are optional. To be judged on brilliant performance, presence, quality, manners and conformation. Cross entries with the same horse are prohibited between the Park Harness, Pleasure and Country Pleasure Divisions at the same show.
- B. Gait requirements: Park horses are to enter the show ring at a trot going counter-clockwise (to the right) and be shown both ways of the ring at a walk and

park trot. Park horses are not asked to back.

- 1. Park Walk: An animated walk is required. The motion should be brisk and vigorous with the horse showing animation and brilliance.
- 2. Park Trot: Extremely animated, cadenced trot, with impulsion and power. The trot is bold and brilliant with knees and hocks snapping high in expansive and dramatic style, creating an illusion of lightness with high-stepping action. Excessive speed shall be penalized.
- C. Harness: Harness should be of the type used to show in the Pleasure Division. Martingales are optional.
- D. Vehicle: Park harness horses are shown to a viceroy or a two wheeled vehicle.
- E. The numbering of the Park Harness Driving classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 11(F) – Roadster

- A. General: The roadster horse may be of any type, any color of attractive appearance, balanced in conformation, and with manners which make a safe risk in the ring. Horses shall be serviceably sound.
- B. Gait Requirements: The principal gait for the roadster is the trot. Horses shall be asked to trot at three different speeds; the slow jog trot, the faster road gait, and at full extended "drive on" trot. Horses must not be asked to rein back.
- C. Judging Procedure: Roadsters must enter the ring clockwise (to the left) at a jog trot; then show at the road gait, jog trot and turn counter clockwise at the jog trot, show at the road gait, and trot at speed. At all speeds, horses should work in form. Breaks should not be penalized in a horse that demonstrated three distinct trots over a horse that has not demonstrated gait distinction. Horses should be shown on the rail at all times except when passing. Showing off the rail shall be penalized. Performance at all three gaits should be strongly considered. When horses are lined up, the driver shall not leave the vehicle except for necessary adjustments. Headers are allowed in roadster classes.
- D. Harness: Harness shall be appropriate to the vehicle. Martingales are optional. Harness must have blinders and either side check or over-check. The check must be used. Harness must be of the light type with breast collar.
- E. Vehicles (See figure): Bike (a two-wheeled cart with stirrups and no basket). Road bikes with tire guards ("closed wheel/arch") are mandatory.
- F. Attire: Exhibitors are required to wear stable colors, cap and jacket to match, of the type found on the trotting tracks of America. A helmet may be worn instead of a cap.
- G. Braids, matching the stable colors, one in the foretop and one immediately back of the bridle path as seen on the larger roadster horses is optional.
- H. The exhibitor number must be worn on the exhibitor's back. An optional supplementary number can be placed on the shafts.

- I. Un-weighted bell type boots are optional in roadster classes.
- J. Judging to be on performance, speed, quality and manners (IN THAT ORDER).

Closed Wheel (The wheels have a bar on the outside to prevent another wheel from accidentally getting caught between the wheel and cart)



Open Wheel (The wheel is open and there is space between the wheel and frame where a tire may get stuck)



- K. The numbering of the Roadster classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 11(G) - Ground Driving

A. General

- 1. Harness in the ground driving division may be of the light type. Breast collars or light collars are permissible, as well as collars and full hames. Breeching is optional. Side or overchecks are required. When shown, the horse must have blinders (round or square) and the check must be hooked. No other appliances may be used on a driving horse other than the harness. (Example: no fly nets on the ears, face, or body).
- 2. Martingales may or may not be used.
- 3. Check bits may be used but are not required
- 4. Any age horse may enter ground driving class.
- 5. This class is also open to Novice Horses as well as Green Drivers.
- B. Ring Procedure: Ground Driving horses are to enter the ring counterclockwise (to the right) at a walk. At the Judges or Ring Stewards cue line up in the center of the ring. To stand quietly and to rein back. The judge may ask each exhibitor to perform a number of obstacles at either a walk or trot. Examples are: figure 8, back an L, trotting poles, weave pylons, straddle pylons (for pairs one horse on each side of the pylons). To be judged 75% on performance, manners and way of going, 15% on the condition, fit and appropriateness of harness; 10% on neatness, appropriateness of attire and overall impression. Over checks and side checks should be slightly loose, not snug. The head set should appear natural for the horse.
 - a. Walk: A free, regular and forward moving four beat gait. The horse

should walk energetically, but calmly, with an even and determined gait. b. Trot: A balanced, easy moving, relaxed two beat gait demonstrating forward movement.

- C. The numbering of the Ground Driving classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 12 – Obstacle Halter/Driving

A. General:

Obstacle Halter and Obstacle Driving are not to be confused with Obstacle Points. The difference being that in Obstacle Halter and Obstacle Driving the class is judged on manners and way of going. Obstacle Points are judged on speed and accumulation of points (see section under Gymkhana).

- 1. Classes: In obstacle driving division classes may be offered for singles, pairs, tandem, unicorn, 4 in hand.
- 2. The obstacle course must be posted at the Show Office not less than two hours prior to the class.
- 3. Horses must be at least one year old for halter obstacle and three years old for obstacle driving.
- 4. A horse can only be shown by one exhibitor per class.
- 5. All obstacles must be numbered on the course in order of sequence.
- 6. Classes will be judged 100% on the manner of horse's performance through the course.
- 7. There is a sixty second time limit to complete each obstacle. After time is used, the exhibitor will be directed to the next obstacle. Refusals of three (3) obstacles shall be cause for disqualification.
- 8. Cantering is penalized in obstacle driving.
- 9. Obstacle requirements:
 - 1. Must be a minimum of 3 and maximum of 8 obstacles.
 - 2. Tires and stair steps are prohibited.
 - 3. Jumps are prohibited.
- 10. In shows where more than one obstacle class is offered at least three of the obstacles must be different or the manner of performance through obstacles must be varied for the class.
- 11. Edible treats to encourage an animal to perform one of the obstacles are not allowed.
- 12. All obstacles should be safe for exhibitors as well as for horses.
- 13. Off course will result in elimination from the class and no points, ribbons or awards will be presented. Off course is defined as:
 - 1. Taking an obstacle in the wrong direction.
 - 2. Negotiating an obstacle from the wrong side.

- 3. Skipping an obstacle unless directed by the Judge.
- 4. Negotiating obstacles in the wrong sequence.
- 5. No physically moving, or coercing the horse by touching. It is to be the Judge's discretion to disqualify. Attendants 16 years of age and older, may be allowed in the ring during Youth Halter Obstacle for safety purposes only. Attendants must not interfere with or influence individual's or equine's performance.
- 6. Miniature leaving the obstacle course.
- 14. Driving obstacle horses shall be shown in a suitable two-wheeled cart with or without a basket in single and tandem. Pairs, unicorns, four in hand etc. must be shown in a 4 wheeled vehicle.
- 15. The numbering of the Obstacle classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

<u>Section 13 – Gymkhana In-hand/Driving Division:</u>

A. General:

These are all timed events. They represent a balance between speed and accuracy. Emphasis will be on the handler to demonstrate control as well as discipline in handling their horse. When entering these classes, safety must be paramount.

1. **Barrels**: Participants can show in a roadster or driving cart for the Driving Classes. In the in-hand classes the horses are shown with a suitable halter and lead chain. It is a timed event; timed on the horse's nose. Judged on speed, completing of pattern and maintenance of gait. Contestants are to complete a clover leaf pattern with the fastest time winning. Gait required is the trot for the driving classes!

Time Penalties: break in gait - 5 seconds for each occurrence; knocking/running over pylon - 10 seconds; knocking down a ball 5 seconds. Disqualification: off pattern, crossing start/finish line, major gait break. Proper attire: NO OPEN TOED SHOES

2. **Poles**: Participants can show in a roadster or driving cart for the Driving Classes. In the in-hand classes the horses are shown with a suitable halter and lead chain. It is a timed event; timed on the horse's nose. Judged on speed, completing of pattern and maintenance of gait. Contestants are to race to the end of the arena, weave in and out the poles/pylons and race to the finish line. Gait required is the trot for the driving classes!

Time Penalties: knocking/running over pylon - 10 seconds; knocking down a ball 5 seconds. Disqualification: off pattern, crossing start/finish line. Proper attire: NO OPEN TOED SHOES.

3. **Cones Course**: Participants can show in a roadster or driving cart for the Driving Classes. In the in-hand classes the horses are shown with a suitable halter and lead chain. It is a timed event; timed on the horse's nose. Judged on speed, completion of course and maintenance of gait. There will be a series of 20 'gates' that you have to proceed through. A 'gate' consists of two cones with the number of the 'gate' placed in front of the cone located to the right. The course is to be completed in number order keeping the number to the right as you proceed through. You may be required to proceed through the same 'gate' more than once - as the back of the gate may also be numbered. The object is to complete the numbered 'gates' without breaking stride in the shortest recorded time.

Time Penalties: break in gait - 5 seconds for each occurrence; knocking/running over pylon - 10 seconds; knocking down a ball 5 seconds. Disqualification: off pattern, crossing start/finish line, major gait break. Proper attire: NO OPEN TOED SHOES

- B. The numbering of the Gymkhana division shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be

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Section 14 Hunter/Jumper Divisions:

Jumper & Hunter Class set-up Guidelines:

- 1. Jumps for Jumpers will be made of 1-1 1/2" schedule 40 PVC piping or other suitable lightweight material with jump cups.
- 2. All jumps must be a minimum of 5 feet wide, with a minimum of 16 feet between jumps, with the exception of an in and out. In and outs should be set approximately 12 feet apart.
- 3. Jumps 32 inches or more in height must have a second rail added. All post and rail jumps must have a ground pole.
- 4. Uprights to be a maximum of 48 inches in height. No jumps, including jump-offs to exceed 44 inches. Any decorations or jump wings must not protrude more than 24 inches from the uprights.
- 5. The courses for jumper classes must be posted at least two hours prior to the scheduled time of the class. Course diagrams must show, with arrows, the direction each obstacle must be taken, and markers or a line must indicate the start and finish of the course.
- 6. The minimum age for a horse to enter jumper class is 3 years old.
- 7. Jumpers may show with braided manes and tails in the manner of their larger counterparts.
- 8. Judge(s) and Steward shall walk the Jumper course with designer and exhibitors prior to the start of class.
- 9. All jumps used in performance classes must be collapsible.
- 10. Minimum of 4 obstacles with a maximum of 8 jumps.

Jumper General Guidelines:

1. Jumpers are scored on **accuracy and speed**, based on faults incurred between the starting line and the finishing line. Exhibitors may go over jumps with horses. Whips are permitted and exhibitors' type of footwear is optional. Front leg wraps and/or boots are optional. Circling once upon entering the ring and once upon leaving the ring is permissible, but not after crossing the starting line.

- 2. Scoring. In SCORING jumpers, an in and out is to be considered as two jumps. Jumpers are to be scored on a mathematical basis and penalty faults include knockdowns, refusals, and elimination as follows:
 - i. Knockdowns 4 second penalty faults (An obstacle is considered knocked down when in jumping an obstacle, a horse or handler, by contact, lowers the established height of the fence in any way.)
 - ii. Refusals Each refusal is 3 second penalty faults (Stopping at an obstacle without knocking it down and without backing, followed by jumping from a standstill is not penalized. However, if the halt continues or if the horse backs even a single step, side steps, or circles to retake the fence, a refusal is incurred).
 - iii. Circling after crossing the starting line 3 second penalty faults. Circling -Any form of circle or circles whereby the horse crosses its original track between two consecutive obstacles or stops advancing toward or turns away from the next fence except to retake an obstacle after a disobedience.
 - iv. Crossing your own path (as in circling between fences, not as in retaking a fence from a refusal) 3 second penalty faults. A horse that has been penalized for circling cannot then be penalized again for crossing its own path at the same obstacle.
 - v. Causes for elimination:
 - a. 3 refusals
 - b. Off course
 - c. Fall of horse and/or exhibitor
 - d. Failure to pass through the start and/or finish cones and/or knocking such cones over.
- 3. The numbering of the Jumper classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Hunter Class Set -up Guidelines (see Jumper/Hunter Class Set-up Guidelines above)

Hunter – General Guidelines:

- 1. Hunters are to be judged on style, manners, and way of going, with preference given to those horses who cover the course at an even pace, with free flowing strides, as in a brisk trot or canter, but must maintain the same gait throughout the entire course. Circling once upon entering the ring and once upon leaving the ring is permissible. Charging fences, or not maintaining the same gait throughout the entire class should be penalized. Upon completion of the entire class over jumps, finalists will be trotted past the Judge(s) for soundness check. Any unsound horse will be eliminated. Horses shall not be required to re-jump the course.
- 2. Obstacles should simulate those found in hunting, such as natural post and rail, brush, stone wall, white board gate, hedge, oxer, etc.
- 3. Causes for elimination in Hunter classes:
 - a. Three (3) refusals
 - b. Off Course
 - c. Crossing your own path (as in circling between fences, not as in retaking a fence from a refusal or when following a course design).
 - d. Fall of horse or exhibitor
 - e. Jumping of obstacle by exhibitor

- f. Carrying a whip
- g. An unsound horse
- 4. Major faults to be scored:
 - a. Knockdowns
 - b. Touches
 - c. Refusals
 - d. Bucking or Kicking
 - e. Spooking or shying
 - f. Wringing of tail
 - g. Showing an obstacle to horses
 - h. Not maintaining an even pace
- 5. The numbering of the Hunter classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 15 – Liberty Division

- A. General: Liberty is demonstrating the natural beauty of the miniature horse. Horses are to be judged on style, grace, animation, gaits, presence, and ease of catching. The liberty horse is expected to perform at both a canter and a trot.
- B. It is the Steward's responsibility to time Liberty classes and to be in possession of a stopwatch. The Steward should be in the same location as the Judge(s) to adjudicate the class. Timing will begin when the halter is dropped, not when the music starts, and the show announcer will announce TIME when the 1½ minutes performance time has ended to signal the exhibitor that they can begin the catch. Continue to time the catch. When the 2 minute catch time has elapsed, the show announcer will announce TIME to signal the end of the catch if the animal has not been caught. If the catch is not completed in the 2 minute allotted time frame, the exhibitor is disqualified.
- C. Only the exhibitor and one assistant will be allowed in the arena with horse. Whips and shaker bottles are allowed, but touching the horse with aids or hands before the catch will result in disqualification.
- D. Only the exhibitor can touch the horse during the catch. The horse must be caught and haltered by the exhibitor within 2 minutes or be disqualified. The assistant may not touch the horse at any time.
- E. Music is required.
- F. No deliberate interference with the horse from outside the ring. Announcement is to be made prior to the class to specify that no outside assistance is allowed.
- G. All horses entered in the Liberty class must be at least one year old.
- H. Exhibitors and assistants should wear appropriate, tasteful attire. A safe costume or theme outfit is allowed for exhibitors and assistants only. The horse must be shown natural, no costume, no glitter, no ribbons.
- I. If the entered horse falls during its performance the entry is disqualified.
- J. Entry will be disqualified if the horse leaves the ring during competition or catch time.
- K. The numbering of the Liberty classes shall be consistent through-out all shows.

The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:

• When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 16 – Costume Division

- A. General: Costume classes are to be judged 75% on originality of costume and 25% on presentation.
- B. To be shown at a walk both ways of the arena and lined up in the middle of the arena for final judging.
- C. Costume entries may be led, ridden, or driven and may utilize one or more handlers, horses and/or other animals. For safety reasons, attendants 16 years of age and older may be allowed in the ring during Youth Costume. Attendants must not interfere or influence an individual's or equine's performance.

- D. Costumes must be considered safe.
- E. The numbering of the Costume classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 17 – Roman Chariot Division

- A. General: This class is intended as a display of horsemanship, with a team of horses hitched to a Roman style chariot, with emphasis on the authenticity of the chariot, harness and driver's apparel. There were several different types used for chariots in that era, such as fighting vehicles, racing, parades and transportation for royalty. Any of these themes may be used as a re-enactment of this era.
- B. The origin of parading of horses before a race or competition was said to have started with the chariot horses at the time. Therefore, at the discretion of show

management and allotment of time, entries may be permitted to parade their horses and rigs in the arena before the beginning of the class. Banners, flags and capes, representing stables, sponsors, etc. may be displayed and carried by the drivers at this time. All entries may parade at this time at a collected trot only, for the audience to inspect. The entries will exit the arena, shed their over robes, banners, flags, etc. and will be ready for competition. No flags or banners are allowed in or around the arena at the time of competition.

C. Specifications:

- 1. Drivers must be 16 years old or older.
- 2. A driver may talk to his horse(s) as long as it does not interfere with other horses.
- 3. Manners and safety are of utmost importance in this class. Judge may disqualify any entry that is deemed unsafe or unruly.
- 4. Horses in the team must show in the same gait (not one trotting and the other cantering or walking).
- 5. Horses may be light shod.
- 6. Whips of appropriate size are permissible, no bullwhips, etc.
- 7. Open bridles are permissible, side or over checks are permitted.
- 8. Open to 38" and under, class may be divided 34" and Under and 34" to 38" if four (4) entries of each division are entered.
- 9. Headers are encouraged.

D. Chariot:

- 1. Chariot must be safe. Chariot deemed unsafe by Show Management, Steward, or Judge may be disqualified from showing.
- 2. Chariots should resemble the Roman chariots and attire should resemble the Roman era and will be judged accordingly.
- 3. No weapons allowed on the chariots, drivers or horses.
- 4. Chariots and harness may have logos, farm names or sponsor names displayed.
- 5. Only four (4) chariots may be in the ring at one time and must stay well spaced and on the rail.
- 6. Judge may bring in the top qualifying chariots, four(4) at a time for final workout.

Ring Procedure:

1. Horses are to enter the ring counter clockwise (to the right) at a collected trot. To be shown both ways of the arena at a collected trot, slow canter, hand gallop and walk. Horses to reverse at a walk on the diagonal. Must stand quietly, are not required to back. To be judged 50% on manners and performance and 50% on fit and appropriateness of vehicle and harness, overall appearance.

- a. Walk: A free, regular and forward moving four beat gait. Horses must appear calm and well mannered.
- b. Collected trot: Horses to give an airy appearance while also showing that they have perfect manners, good mouths and are under control at all times.
- c. Slow Canter: Horses must demonstrate a slow canter in unison, be calm and light mouthed. Racy appearance will be penalized.
- d. Hand Gallop: Horses must do a hand gallop in unison, not at full speed or racing or giving the appearance of being out of control. Manners are dominant at this gait and unruly horses or unsafe driving will result in disqualification. Horses must be called to a walk after a hand gallop and line up for final inspection. Header in at this time.

E. Single Roman Chariot:

- 1. Chariot to be pulled by a single horse with class requirements and judging to be the same as the Roman Chariot hitch team specifications.
- 2. Drivers to be 13 years old and older.
- F. The numbering of the Roman Chariot classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
- When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")

Section 18 – Versatility Division

- The horse will be shown as a driving horse, shown in halter, and shown as a A. hunter, in that order. Once the horses come into their lineup, grooms/headers are allowed in. Before competitors are allowed their 2 minute un-tacking and grooming prep, it shall be announced that: HORSES ARE TO REMAIN IN THE SAME ORDER FOR THE REST OF THE CLASS AS THEY GO ON THE RAIL, BOTH FOR THE HALTER AND HUNTER PORTIONS. At the end of the two minute period, grooms shall leave the arena with the carts and all tack, and horses are then asked to follow the direction of the Ring Steward as they line up for inspection at halter. When their halter inspections are completed, they again follow the Ring Steward in the same order and proceed to the hunter course. The hunter requirements for judging, faults, elimination, and fences are to meet the same requirements as specified under the Hunter Division, Section 14 above. There shall be 2 to 4 fences. When all have completed the hunter course, they must trot for soundness before the Judges. Horses do not leave the arena between divisions. All three divisions count equally. Horses must complete all three divisions, without disqualification, to be eligible for a ribbon.
- B. Open to Pleasure, Country Pleasure, and Park horses.
- C. The numbering of the Versatility classes shall be consistent through-out all shows. The numbering sequence below is to be used for class lists with the following exceptions:
 - When dividing the classes into over and under divisions; the number is to be followed by an 'A' for under division (horses 34" and under) and 'B' for Over Division (horses over 34")



Section 20 ~ Showmanship Division


- A. Below are points on which showmanship classes are to be judged. Only the handler is judged. The horse is merely a prop to show the showmanship ability of the handler. Management must choose and post the showmanship patterns.
- B. Appearance of exhibitor: 10 points clothes and person neat and clean. Suitable clothes: hats, boots, long sleeve shirts and gloves are required.
- C. Appearance of horse: . 40 points conformation not to be a factor.
 - a. Conditioning 15 Points
 - b. Grooming of horse 15 points
 - c. Trimming 5 points
 - d. Tack 5 points

- D. Showing horse in ring: 50 points. The Judge will use one of the following three ring patterns in judging this class. Judge will discuss the selected pattern with contestants prior to class. The selected pattern must be posted two hours before the start of the class.
 - 1. Leading: 15 points Enter ring leading animal at an alert walk in a counter-clockwise direction. Walk on the animal's left side, holding the lead shank in the right hand near the halter. The remaining portion of the lead is held neatly and safely in the left hand. Animals should lead readily at a walk. After the Judge has lined up the class in front of spectators, he or she will call on each exhibitor individually to move his or her horse individually. When moving a horse, be sure that the Judge gets a clear, unobstructed view of the horse's action. Allow the horse sufficient lead to move freely the required distance, stop, and turn to the right around the horse. Exhibitors should perform the showmanship pattern as directed by the Judge or Ring Steward.
 - 2. Posing: 15 points When posing your horse, stand toward the front facing the horse, but always in a position where you can keep your eye on the Judge. Pose your miniature with his feet squarely under him. Do most of your showing with the lead strap. Never touch or kick the horse's leg into position. Do not crowd the exhibitor next to you when in a side-by side position, or in front of or behind you when lined up head to tail. When the Judge is observing other animals, let yours stand if posed reasonably well. Be natural. Over showing, undue fussing, and maneuvering are objectionable.
 - 3. Poise, alertness, and merits: 20 points Keep alert and be aware of the position of the Judge at all times. Do not be distracted by persons or things outside the ring. Show the animal at all times. Be courteous and sportsmanlike at all times. Recognize quickly and correct faults of your horse. Respond quickly to requests from Judges and officials. Keep showing until the entire class has been placed and excused from the ring. A Judge may ask an exhibitor questions (Example: exhibitor number, horse's age, body parts of horse, etc.) At his/her discretion a Judge may ask an exhibitor for an additional test after completion of one of the three set patterns. Exhibitor must be on the opposite half of the horse from the Judge. When the Judge is in position 1 then the exhibitor should be in position 1, when the Judge is in position 2 then the exhibitor should be in position 2, etc.
- E. The half system will be used in exhibiting your horse. Exhibitor must be on the opposite half of the horse from the Judge. When the Judge is in position 1 then the exhibitor should be in position 1, when the Judge is in position 2 then the exhibitor should be in position 2 etc.






Pattern # 2

Walk toward the Judge in a straight line. Stop ½ way between the line-up and the Judge and do a 360 degree pivot and stop. All pivots are to be to the right. Continue at a walk (in a straight line) toward the Judge. Stop and set up your horse. Upon acknowledgement from the Judge, do a 180 degree pivot. Trot in a straight line, past the line-up and stop. Do a 180 degree pivot. Walk the horse forward to the exact spot in the line-up (where you were when you started the pattern) and set up horse.

Walk (in a straight line) to the Judge, Stop and set up your horse. Upon acknowledgement from the Judge, do a 180 degree pivot. All pivots are to be to the right. Do a 180 degree pivot. Walk the horse forward to the exact spot in the line-up (where you were when you started the pattern) and set up your horse.

Glossary of Definitions

Break Is a change in gait eg: from a trot to a canter or a trot to a walk.

Breast collar A padded strap running around the chest from side to side. Used

for light work

Breeching A strap around the horse's rump allowing it to set back and slow a

vehicle, usually hooked to the shafts or pole of the vehicle

Canter Is a controlled, three-beat gait performed by a horse. It is a natural

gait possessed by all horses, faster than most horses' trot but slower

than the gallop. Used during chariot driving.

Check bit is a second bit that is attached to the over/side check.

Collar A padded loop fitting closely around the horse's neck, pointed at

the top to fit the crest of the neck. The collar allows the horse to

push against the harness with his shoulders or chest.

Collected Trot: Horses give an airy appearance while also showing that they have

perfect manners, good mouths and are under control at all times.

Used during chariot driving.

Country Pleasure Trot: A balanced, easy moving, relaxed two beat gait demonstrating

forward movement. Used during Country Pleasure Driving.

Croup the topline of the hindquarters, beginning at the hip, extending

proximate to the sacral vertebrae and stopping at the dock of the

tail; sometimes called "rump"

Cryptorchidism The absence of one or both <u>testes</u> from the <u>scrotum</u>

Extended Trot: This is a clear, but not excessive, increase in gait and length of

stride. The horse goes forward freely, engaging the hind legs with

good hock action, on a taut but light rein, the position balanced and unconstrained. **Used during Pleasure Driving**

Gate:

Two pylons set apart (wide enough for each cart to proceed through) with the number of the gate placed on the ground in front of the pylon to the right (as you proceed through the gate). Small balls are to be placed on top of each pylon.

Gee

Voice commands telling the horse to turn to the right.

Green Horse

Refers to a horse who is in their first year of showing in driving classes. They may have shown before in line classes or in-hand classes. They must be shown by an experienced handler.

Ground Driving

also called long-lining, teaches a horse to move forward with a person walking behind it. It is also used to develop specific types of muscling as well as to instill certain behaviors. Ground driving work incorporates both mental and muscular development. Advocates of these methods maintain that the additional time on the ground allows the horse to advance more quickly or with better manners once in the harness.

Gymkhana

an <u>equestrian</u> event consisting of speed pattern racing and timed games.

Hand Gallop:

Is a controlled gallop used to show a horse's ground-covering stride. It is faster, more ground-covering than the canter, and the three-beat canter changes to a four-beat gait. It is the fastest gait of the horse. The horse must be in full control and must not give the appearance of a horse out of control. **Used during chariot driving.**

Hames

two metal or wooden strips, placed over the collar. The hames take the full force of the pull, padded by the collar

Haw

Voice commands telling the horse to turn to the left.

Jog Trot

is a slow, relaxed trot lacking the suspension of a working trot and with shorter strides. The head of the horse is carried low while the hindquarters are engaged and underneath the horse, and there is less impulsive than in a dressage-style collected trot. **Used during Roadster Driving.**

Martingale

any of several designs of <u>tack</u> that are used on <u>horses</u> to control head carriage. Martingales may be seen in a wide variety of <u>equestrian</u> disciplines, both riding and <u>driving</u>. The two most common types of martingale, the standing and the running, are used to control the horse's head height, and to prevent the horse from throwing its head to high.

A standing martingale (tye down) runs from the girth up between the horse's legs and attaches to the back of the noseband.

A running martingale consists of a strap which is attached to the girth and passes between the horse's front legs before dividing into two pieces. At the end of each of these straps is a small metal ring through which the reins pass. It is held in the correct position by a neck strap or breastplate. It is adjusted so that each of the "forks" has about an inch of slack when the horse holds its head in the normal position. When the horse raises its head above the desired point, the running martingale adds leverage through the reins to the bit on the bars of the horse's mouth. The leverage created by this pressure encourages the horse to lower its head.

Novice Handler

A person in their first year of showing.

Over check

(sometimes called a bearing rein) is a piece of horse tack that runs from the middle terret on a driving saddle on the horse's back, over the head, it splits at the bridge of his nose and goes down to each side of the bit.. It pulls the bit up in the horse's mouth preventing him from lowering his head beyond a fixed point. A variation is a side check. The over/side check is often a necessary piece of safety equipment for certain types of harness and is an aid to the driver in keeping a horse's head properly positioned. If a horse lowers its head too far when in harness, particularly if moving quickly, it can catch the bridle on the shafts of the carriage or wagon, risking an accident. Properly adjusted and when used for a limited period of time, an over/side check does not significantly impede the motion of the horse or cause discomfort.

Park Trot:

Extremely animated, cadenced trot, with impulsion and power. The trot is bold and brilliant with knees and hocks snapping high in expansive and dramatic style, creating an illusion of lightness with high-stepping action. Excessive speed shall be penalized. **Used during Park Harness Driving.**

Park Walk:

An animated walk is required. The motion should be brisk and vigorous with the horse showing animation and brilliance. **Used during Park Harness Driving.**

Parrot Mouth or **Brachygnathism**, refers to uneven alignment of the upper and lower <u>teeth</u>. In serious cases, the upper teeth protrude beyond the lower teeth.

Pleasure Trot:

The horse should maintain forward impulsion while showing submission to the bit. The trot is slower and more collected, but the horse should indicate willingness to be driven on the bit while maintaining a steady cadence. **Used during Pleasure Driving.**

Poll

at the beginning of the neck, immediately behind the ears,

Ring Steward

is an individual who works in the center of an arena at a horse show and carries out many duties to assist the judge and other officials. The duties of a ring steward are:

- summoning the class;
- keeping the show running smoothly and listening to the judge.
- The Ring Steward does not help to judge the class in any way;
- policing the ring by being alert to safety issues and watching the horses, riders or drivers;
- passing communications from the judge to the announcer to call for specific gaits in a class, for the line up, etc.;
- transmitting the judges' cards to the scorers or the announcer;
- restraining an unruly horse, helping a rider or driver that is in trouble, etc.;
- working with ring crew for each class set up;
- pinning ribbons or distributing ribbons to winners;
- supporting the steward(s) in identifying questionable equipment and attire

Road Gait

Is slower than a working trot, but faster than a jog trot. Used during Roadster Driving.

Roach

to completely shave (or remove) the entire mane of a horse

Show Steward

is an individual tasked with the responsibility of interpreting and enforcing the rules of the organization that sanctions the horse show

Side check a variation to the over check. It runs from a point on the horse's

back, passes beside the ears through loops at the top of the bridle

cheek pieces down to the bit.

Slow Canter: Is a controlled, three-beat gait that usually is a bit faster than the

average trot, but slower than the gallop but slower than a regular

canter. Used during chariot driving.

Throat-Latch the point at which the windpipe meets the head at the underside of

the jaw

Trot at Speed (Drive on) The horse's head is collected, the stride is at maximum length, and

the step is high and animated. The hind leg in a diagonal pair may begin to hit the ground before the front. Unlike the extended trot, the neck is not round but is extended out. **Used during Roadster**

Driving.

Trot Definitions:

Walk: A free, regular and forward moving 4- beat gait. The horse should

walk energetically, but calmly, with even and determined pace.

Park Walk: An animated walk is required. The motion should be brisk and

vigorous with the horse showing animation and brilliance. Used

during Park Harness Driving.

Whipper In An individual who works at the gate of the arena. They are tasked

with opening and closing the gate; assisting the individuals in and out of the class; and calling the individuals who are scheduled to show in the next class into the line up. They may also be called the

gatekeeper.

Wither The point just above the tops of the shoulder blades, seen best with

horse standing square and head slightly lowered; the height of the

horse is measured at the withers.



It is mandatory that you have control of your horse at all times.

Horses must be sound and handlers must have control of their horse at all times. In unfortunate situations problems do arise. In these situations please use discretion and abide by the following - if applicable:

If you are in the ring and encounter difficulty with your horse, move to the center of the ring and inform the ring steward that you are having difficulty. Depending on the situation, you may:

- sit in the middle of the ring until the class is over
- get out of your cart, and hold your horse by the head until the class is over
- the judge may stop all horses on the rail while you remove the horse from the ring.

If someone is encountering difficulty in the ring that looks like things may get dangerous or out of control, the announcer may announce that everyone is to stop their horse on the rail, and (depending on the situation):

- get out of the cart and hold your horse by the head
- move to the center of the ring
- remove the cart from your horse
- leave the ring when it is safe

If a horse becomes loose in the ring:

- DO NOT CHASE IT
- allow it to have the outside of the ring (everyone stay in the center)

BARN RULES

- No smoking in the barn
- Do not hitch your cart to your horse while in the barn
- Keep the aisle clear
- Sweep up after yourself
- Keep your stall clean

ALWAYS ERR ON THE SIDE OF CAUTION!
