



GRATEFUL. The Prince of Peace church building has played a vital role in the spiritual and communal life of our family. It has served as a sacred space for our family to worship, pray, and seek spiritual guidance. The physical presence of


THRIVING. Prince of Peace is a vibrant parish. With 44 new families, 14 marriages, one of which was at the Easter Vigil, and 41 baptisms in 2023-2024, the parish family is growing. This year, 26 children received First Communion, 31 young adults were Confirmed in the faith, and 8 adults completed the O.C.I.A. program. Fr. Paul officiated at 9 funerals giving comfort to the grieving.


Prince of Peace is a young parish with 826 members from infant to age 20: 1.175 members ages 20-60; and 538 members ages 60+.

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





KCHS subsidy, building loan interest, annual staff raises, and other cost of living increases. The average weekly budget has been increased to \$18,500 for the 2024-2025 fiscal year. Meet Leeta Joslyn



Once again, God has blessed our parish with an amazing human to help lead our youth to Him. Leeta Joslyn, who joined the Prince of Peace staff this past summer, is doing big things with our youth programs. In addition to Edge for middle schoolers, and Life Teen for high school students, Leeta has organized "POP in Thursdays", a high school homework study group, as well as Bible studies for youth outside of our parish's regular youth programming. Leeta assists Fr. Paul and Jeremy Nore with the Confirmation program, and is also currently fundraising to help defray the cost for high school seniors to go to SEEK in Salt Lake City, Utah this coming January. Additionally, she coordinates a monthly social for young adults in our parish. Leeta brings energy, enthusiasm, and love of the Catholic faith to everything she does, and her faith journey is as amazing as she is. She has graciously agreed to share her story, in her own words:

I grew up in St. Louis, Missouri, in a wonderful Catholic family. My parents always made sure I made it to Mass, and I knew I was so loved. While I believed in God, it wasn't until I attended a non-denominational Christian sports camp in fourth grade that I learned about having a personal relationship with Him. I had never heard of this concept before, and was drawn into the zeal for the Lord that I found in the counselors and community at this camp. At the time, I had never seen a Catholic community with as much excitement for God as these people had, so I made up my mind at a young age that I wanted to be Protestant when I went to college. There was nothing (to my knowledge) that was so important in the Catholic Church that I couldn't find in a different denomination.

When I went to college, that's exactly what I did. I left the Catholic Church without a second thought. I met some fantastic friends and grew a lot in my time outside of the Church, but I was also building up a kingdom of my own. I refused to look into Catholic beliefs, because I was fearful that I might find truth within it and have to tear down what I had built. For two years, I pushed away the nagging feeling in my soul that I needed to look deeper. My parents begged me to ask questions and seek truth, but I continued to ignore it, holding on to the life I had built for myself with a white-knuckled grip.

Easter weekend 2022, I went to Indiana to visit my sister, Lizzy, where she was a FOCUS missionary at the time. I went with her to the Easter Vigil Mass. This was my first time ever going to Mass and not receiving the Eucharist. As I watched Lizzy and her teammates approach the altar, a wave of nausea overcame me. I ran to the bathroom and had a panic attack. I got sick multiple times and sobbed. I knew that stepping away from the Catholic Church meant I was rejecting the most beautiful gift that Jesus was offering me freely in the Eucharist. With all of my heart, I wanted to run back home to Him, but my pride and fear wouldn't let me.

Despite the continual nagging feeling that I needed to do something about this encounter, I went back to my daily life as a Protestant, holding onto the good things that I had in my community, and trying to convince myself that this was where God wanted me. For almost another year, I held onto this pride.

I had been dating a Protestant for almost two years, and we were preparing to get engaged in January of 2023. We had plans to move to Kansas City that summer and get married in the Protestant church. My parents were heartbroken about my decision, but I was determined to go through with that marriage and to hold onto the life I had built for myself. However, God had bigger plans for me.

While visiting my family one weekend that January, we argued about Sola Scriptura, Sacred Tradition, and Sacred Scripture: our usual points of contention. Typically, I would just brush off all the points they made and go about my day. This time though, my heart was open just a little bit to hearing the truth, and that was enough for God. All He needs is a little bit to give us everything in return.

That whole weekend, I tried to fight my heart. The questions my parents asked me rolled around in my head, and nothing I could tell myself was powerful enough to drown them out. I went without food or sleep for three days, trying to ignore the now-resounding voice urging me to seek truth. I woke up on the third day (God loves to work in three's!), sat straight up in bed, unable to fight it anymore, and knew that I needed to come back to the Church. I was tired of running.

The sheer peace that came with listening to God's voice was enough to assure me that this was exactly what needed to happen. Despite the very real possibility that I would lose a lot, I had never been more sure of something or more at peace about God's desire for me. Making this decision caused me to lose so much: the man I thought I would marry, many friends, and the grand plan I had for the rest of my life. The walls of my kingdom came crashing down. It was extremely painful to be rejected so quickly, by so many people I loved. However, that hurt paled in comparison to the peace that came with being in full communion with Jesus again.

Every single day, I thank God for tearing down the walls of my heart and bringing me home to His Church. What a blessing it is that no matter how many times we reject Him, He still wants us! This is a kind of love that I don't understand. I couldn't earn it, and I surely don't feel like I deserve it. However, our God loves His children. He leaves the 99 to go looking for that one little lost sheep *because He loves us. We are worth it to Him.*

I am definitely not perfect in my walk with the Lord and never will be, but the free gift of Jesus Christ, Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity in the Eucharist draws me back again and again. He doesn't want just "okay" for us. He wants full communion...to give us everything. He offers Himself to each one of us every day as a gift in the Mass, where Heaven and Earth collide. Life continues to change, and I will continue to fall. But the truth remains that life is lived abundantly at the altar, where Jesus' perfect love is made present. He is worth losing everything for.


