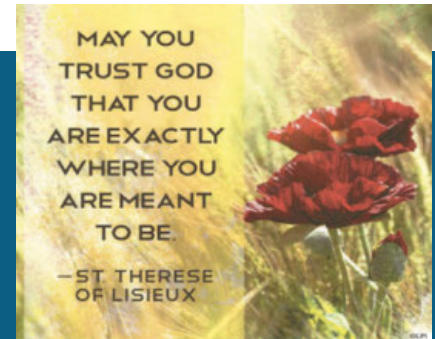

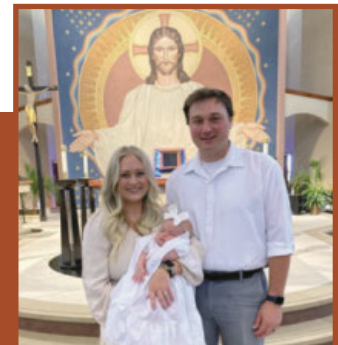

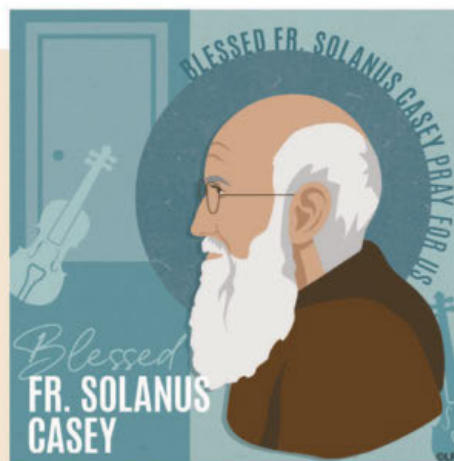

Saint of the week

A bulletin reflection by Fr. Paul Turner; The Adoration

Adoration before the Blessed Sacrament draws the worshiper into spiritual communion with God. Whether done on one's own time or at a scheduled service, adoration of the Eucharistic presence of Christ fosters our devotion for participation in the Mass.

Jesus instituted the Eucharist for our eating and drinking. Sharing communion at Mass brings us nourishment, healing, and sustenance. There is no substitute for participation in the Eucharist; adoration should enhance it, not replace it.

Catholics reserve leftover communion breads in a tabernacle. The primary purpose for this custom is to have the Body of Christ ready for the dying at any time. The tabernacle also provides communion for the sick or those unable to come to Mass. Because it houses the sacramental Body of Christ, it serves as a place for adoration.

Adoration may be private or public. When adoring the Blessed Sacrament in private, Catholics usually go to any church, where the communion hosts are kept inside the tabernacle. They say whatever prayers they wish. Public adoration may take place in the context of a brief service (traditionally called "Benediction" although that only refers to the blessing which concludes it) or over a more extended period of time. The Blessed Sacrament is usually presented for adoration outside the tabernacle on an altar or a stand.

Extended periods of adoration used to be common. They filled the void for people who were not receiving communion frequently. However, in the twentieth century, the church urged people to more frequent communion and has forbidden exposition during Mass. However, during the mass the faithful find the Eucharistic prayers and the prayers leading up to receiving the Eucharist a time that may inspire them to adore the Lord. This seems especially true as they process to receive the Eucharist and boldly say Amen after the priest or ministers says, "The Body of Christ".

Participation in the Eucharist at Mass accomplishes spiritual communion more perfectly and renders simultaneous adoration unnecessary. Prolonged periods of adoration may happen in church where a large number of the faithful are gathering and when the bishop has given his approval. If Mass is celebrated, the Blessed Sacrament should be returned to the tabernacle.

Whether the Blessed Sacrament is inside or outside the tabernacle, adoration may invite us into prayer and prepare us for the Eucharist.

Eucharistic Revival: The Year of the Parish:

Prince of Peace offers Eucharistic Adoration Thursdays starting at 8 am to 11 pm and Friday's 8 am to 5 pm. During Lent it is available from Thursday at 8 am to Friday at 5 pm.

On the eve of the first Friday of each month, there will be Benediction and adoration, (the first Thursday of the Month, from 5:30 pm to 6 pm). There will be Liturgy of the Hours or other prayers offered during this time of adoration.

The Benediction ceremony has four parts: exposition, adoration, benediction, and reposicion. During exposition, the minister (priest or deacon) goes to the

tabernacle and removes a large host reserved there. Placing it in a monstrance (a windowed liturgical vessel that displays the host), the minister sets the object of our devotion on the altar. The period of adoration may be lengthy. Prayers, Scripture readings, songs, homily, and silence may fill the time. At the close of this period, the priest or a deacon blesses the assembly with the monstrance and says a concluding prayer. This blessing is the benediction from which the service derives its name. If a communion minister is presiding, he or she does not give a blessing. Finally, the minister removes the Blessed Sacrament from the monstrance and places it back in the tabernacle, an action called "reposicion."

Benediction enhances our devotion to the Eucharist and whets our appetite for the Mass. The main reason we have Eucharistic bread is to consume it with the cup in communion with one another and with Christ. However, it may also serve as an object of praise.

The weekly collection humbly expresses the community's faith. The silent routine accompanies the spirit of selflessness that unites believers. Whether your gift is large or small, the collection expresses what we have in common, a desire to share.

In the Mass, the collection occurs at the beginning of the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Its placement is significant. It is not an admission fee to get into the building. It is part of the heart off the Mass. Every Mass celebrates the sacrifice of Christ on the cross. That sacrifice unfolds before our eyes as the gifts we bring. The bread and wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ and offered to God.

This sacrificial action begins when we carry bread and wine to the altar during the preparation of the gifts. With them we bring our gifts for the poor. This procession moves through the community because these gifts come from us and represent us. They represent our offering to God, and our communion with God. Just as the Body and Blood of Christ bring heavenly nourishment to our community, so the collection brings material aid.

That material aid is no small matter. Your church depends on your gift. Parishes receive money like beggars, not like clerks. People give not to receive a product; they give to make a gift.

The charity that underlies the collection results from faith. We believe that what we have comes from God, and we know it was given for the enjoyment of all. A habit of giving comes from a heart that has learned the satisfactions of generosity. A habit of giving offers us peace that we are doing our part to make the world a better, more generous place.

The Scriptures recommend a tithe—giving 10 percent of what we earn to charities. By giving from what we receive, we share God's love with the world.
