Gentlemen:

We, of the Waco A.A. Group, have been working with the alcoholic patients at the local Veterans' Administration Center. Results of our contacts with some of these men have been very gratifying, but we have also had some disappointing experiences. We believe that we now have a better plan of counseling with these men, because the interest of the Administrative Staff has been aroused. The Clinical Director is cooperating to the fullest extent of his authority, and the Social Service Department is deeply interested in what follow-through therapy can be given to these men by A.A. after they have been released from the Hospital. The last contact these patients have with the Hospital as they are being released is with the Social Service worker; and the Head of that Department would like to have a complete list of all the A.A. Groups, so she can give this information to the patients who have manifested an interest in A.A.. She would, also, like to have some material to give to the families so that they might better understand the problems of the patient. Perhaps the pamphlet to the wives would be the best in this instance. They have agreed that this information will only be given to those patients who are purely alcoholics and that this list will never leave the Head of the Department's desk.

We know that this is against the usual procedure in this type of work, but since the interest is so great at the Hospital, we thought, perhaps, an exception might be made in this case. We would like your opinion and any help you might give us through the experience you have gained in handling problems of this nature. Please let us hear from you at your earliest convenience.

Many thanks for your recent letter enclosing check for \$2.50.

Thanks also for sending us a copy of "The A-B-C's of A. A.". There's a lot of interesting material in it, both from an AA standpoint and perhaps the standpoint of one who might be interested in the general subject of alcoholism. In our experience, not all alcoholics are interested in research or educational aspects of the problem, but when they come to AA they all want to know how to get well! Here's every good wish that it will serve well its purpose, to help the sick alcoholic recover if he wishes.

Here's a small suggestion for a preamble: I know quite a few groups who use the few paragraphs appearing in italics, titled "Alcoholics Anonymous", just above the editorial in THE AA GRAPEVINE. Seems to give a lot of information in a very few words, and you could, of course, change the last paragraph to give your local group address. That's just one idea - I have no doubt there are dozens of other good ones. Maybe it would be a good idea to have those who lead the meeting use different ones for a while until you hit on the right combination - the one everyone in the group seems to like best. In California, many of the groups open with a reading of the Twelve Steps. Here in New York we seem to be inclined toward very short introductions.

Something else just occurred to me - the Grapevine is conducting a page filled with questions and answers about meetings. Why doesn't someone write a letter, asking for suggested preambles - they might be willing to run several which would be helpful to the group.

As to radio broadcasts, there really has been quite a lot of good experience with radio broadcasts. We have noticed one thing in this office - a radio broadcast has never brought in nearly so many inquiries as a magazine article. Many of them, such as "Cavalcade of America" were extremely well done, but just didn't seem to provoke much response from alcoholics, or even their families. For some unexplainable reason, the written word seems more effective from our standpoint than radio messages, although they may have a very great effect indirectly.

The series which we mentioned, <sup>originating with Station WWJ in Detroit, were not discontinued because they were unsatisfactory, but rather because they had been on the air for a long period of time, and had been heard in almost every section of the country.</sup> We heard good and bad reports about these broadcasts, but most of them were very good. Like everything else, some AA Groups liked them, others didn't. Whenever they were used, we always suggested that the subject be discussed among all the AA Groups who might be affected, because there really was considerable difference of opinion as to their value and desirability. The whole public relations policy of AA rests on the theory of attraction rather than promotion. Most AA's want to avoid anything which might appear to be sensational, and of course, AA as a whole has a deep feeling about the preservation of anonymity. We have never had prepared radio scripts, just as we have never had prepared newspaper releases. These things are usually

Several of our members are out of town quiet a bit and if you could possibly spare us at least two extry Directors for these members to use it will be highly appreciated.


We are incloseing check for \$30.00 to take care of the first half of the 1950 year of our member ship the balance of \$30.00 we will mail at a later date.

We were happy to receive your inquiry about the history date of the "Central Group" in Waco, TX.

The Central Office received the following letter on 11/22/1954 from Dale H.U. Group Secretary:  
"...We wish to apply for affiliation with the national Headquarters of A.A... Our group will be called "Central Group of A.A.". We have at present a very active small group of about 25 recovered alcoholics with an average of 5 years of sobriety. We have about 10 new members with 20 to 60 days and about 10 others who want to try again after some trouble. About 75% of our group are former members of the "Heart of Texas group" and four are charter members and founders of the "Heart of Texas Group". We would like very much to grow and to take the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. We know we can do better by national affiliation."

In 1970 the "Twelve Step Group" merged with the "Central Group" and some of the members of the "Heart of Texas Group" joined the new formation.

We hope you will find this information helpful. Please let us know if we can be of further assistance.

of surrender. We surrendered ourselves to victory." The newspaper concluded the account by listing the postoffice boxes of the groups for those desiring information.

**Pleasant Growing Pains.** — Among the activities of the Memphis, Tenn., Group are the appointment of a member as Central Secretary and club room director as a full time job in answering inquiries and requests as well as club room activities, organization of two small affiliated groups, an A.A. breakfast on the mezzanine at Britling's cafeteria on Sunday mornings at 9:15 and continued growth of the Wednesday night question and answer meetings for new members. One of the two new groups is carrying on separate activities under the name of the Overton Park Group, meeting weekly at the Overton Park golf club house on Monday nights at 8. Memphis A.A.s are happy over being chosen hosts to the Southeastern Conference of A.A. at Memphis on October 16, 17 and 18, 1947.

**Plan Vancouver Home.** — Plans for a clubhouse for A.A.s in Vancouver, now numbering more than 300, have readied the stage of a draft proposal in writing, detailing recommendations for site, size, management and upkeep, which has been circulated with an architect's drawing for consideration by a committee of the Kerrisdale Group. The proposal is to obtain a clubhouse on the outskirts of the city, which can also serve as a "first-aid hostel" for those needing medical care to be provided by physicians included in A.A. At present the city's numerous groups are making shift by using private homes and rented public halls. With Christmas approaching there have been extra social events, including a dance given in honor of women who were patient with their once-bibulous husbands.

**Near Supply Source.** — Since June the Omaha, Nebr., Group has had a "skid row" Group going right across the street from Omaha's famous Hobo Park. For another dramatic act they had an artist make a seven-foot, well dressed domino-masked man to peddle a booklet on "in the lobby of theatres showing "March of 7 Problem Drinkers" and late showings of "Weekend." About 1,500 pamphlets were put in circulation and phone calls at the club kept members hopping. Then, *The A.A. Grapevine* correspondent goes on, "outstate members . . . organizing their own local groups and this needs a hand. Even if all of us didn't war do 12th Step work, we'd be in it up to the brows." The Group celebrated its fourth annual Fall Festival with a banquet at the Elks club more than 100 hearing talks by Judge Tinley and a member of the Foundation New York. Present were members from North Platte, Grand Island, Blair, Auburn and Mont, Nebr., and Council Bluffs, Ia. For than two years two members met regularly North Platte and remote control members been driving the 600-mile round trip to a Omaha meetings. Now they have organized Western Nebraska Group with 10 members North Platte, Kearney and surrounding towns. At Grand Island a six-man Group was organized by an Omaha member. Recently 25 Omaha A.A.s drove to Lincoln to meet with a new group. Just to keep things bubbling more than champagne at the Alamo club, Omaha, an experiment is being made with a set of recordings, 18 sides, which explain basic principles to prospects seeking information during the day when no member is present. The data recorded is being mimeographed in pamphlet form, pocket size, for 12th Step purposes.

**Doctors Approve A.A.** — Toward gaining support and confidence of physicians in Tarrant county, Texas, a member of the Ft. Worth Group spoke to about 40 doctors in the county medical association in the Texas hotel in Ft. Worth recently. The doctors gave a spontaneous and approving reception to the explanation and offered their help in attending patients whenever called on.

**Wide Awake at Waco.** — A beautiful three-story old building, formerly a convent, has been leased by the Waco, Tex., group and wives and members are redecorating the part to be occupied by A.A. Organized about a year ago, the Group now numbers about 40 members and includes in its accomplishments the establishment of a group in the Veterans Hospital nearby. The veterans' meetings are attended by 15 members regularly and continuously as patients are entered into and released from the hospital. All of these men have been committed for alcoholism. The hospital psychiatrists determine which are eligible to enter A.A. meetings in the hospital, based on ability to accept A.A. and respond to help offered.
