

Winter Wonderland Scavenger Hunt Instructions


- Find each of the items on the following list. Snap a photo of the item.

- Those who've successfully documented all items by the deadline will be entered into the drawing on January 31st, 2021.




Item list:

1. Animal footprints (i.e.: in the snow or mud).

Any kind counts, but here are some you might see:











2. A female holly tree (with red berries) AND a male holly tree (no berries).

Did you know that a female holly tree needs to be within 200 yards of a male holly tree to have berries?

3. A bird's nest (or a squirrel's nest) in a tree.

Bird nests are easier to spot in winter. Here are some you might see:

4. A chicken.	
Did you know that chickens 'talk' to their babies before they are hatched, and that the chicks inside the eggs peep back?	
5. A vegetable growing (it can be growing inside a greenhouse or a pot).	
Holly Hill Farm grows healthy vegetables specifically to donate to 3 local food pantries. This is important since many food pantries have mostly canned food for the families who rely on them.	
6. A duck, goose or swan swimming in the water.	
Mute swans are beautiful but they are not native to America.	
7. An acorn, a pinecone PLUS one other type of wild nut.	
Acorn (oak tree) Hickory nuts Pinecone (conifers)	
8. A goat.	
The goats at Holly Hill Farm are called Nigerian Dwarf Goats. They are an American breed derived from West African dwarf goats.	
9. Two different types of seaweed on the beach.	
10. A Sicilian donkey.	
11. A compost pile.	
Holly Hill Farm collects food scraps from local businesses and saves over 1,000 lbs of from the public waste system every single week.	

The land that Holly Hill Farm is on has been farmed since at least the 17 th century. In the early years, oxen were used instead of tractors!	
13. A pony.	
14. Moss AND lichen. Lichen Moss	
15. A rock shaped like something else, for example a heart, an egg, a baseball or a kidney bean.	
15. A piece of driftwood on the sand.
