Can you tell us a little about yourself and how you got involved in DYC?



We started bringing our kids to the Summer Program in 2014, when our daughter was six and our son was four. That year my husband moved from industry to a university and so had his summers off. We had been weekenders in Acidalia for the previous four years, but now he and the kids got to stay for the entire summer while I went to the New York on the bus every week. Both kids learned to swim at the pool, and got to know a lot of other kids in the area, while we met lots of parents. Then in 2018 we bought a house in Callicoon and moved here full-time. I guess we were on the grounds an awful lot, because in 2022 the board asked me to join, which I was glad to do. I was raised in a family that valued public service so I was grateful for the opportunity to help.

What is your favorite DYC memory?

The DYC has been such an integral part of our life here that it's hard to think of one thing. I really loved line dancing, and I hope we can bring that back. No matter how tired I was after a full day, going down to dance with April and all the other people was so invigorating. Line dancing is so much fun. One summer we did a "flash mob dance" at the Tractor Parade and people who hadn't come to the Youth Center dance joined in.

What is your vision for the Center?

We are incredibly fortunate to have the DYC in town. It's more than just the terrific facilities, it's a meeting place for the entire community. I've met so many people who either just discovered it or tell me their memories of the place, how they had their birthday parties and their weddings there, proms and memorial services. Other community organizations use the hall and the pavilion for their meetings and their parties, and I'd like to see more of that. The Tractor Parade and the River Race are bigger than ever, and our holiday parties continue to bring new families down. I want to do more, both for kids and for adults. We have an amazing kitchen and we're talking about cooking classes and community meals. The pickleball community is growing, and with the new courts I'm excited to host tournaments. I'd love to see the beer league come back and play softball, and have other sports like ultimate frisbee. The DYC belongs to the community, and anything is possible.
