

Sexually Inappropriate Behaviors in Dementia: A Guide for Patients & Families

Some people living with dementia may display sexually inappropriate behaviors. These behaviors can be confusing, distressing, or embarrassing for caregivers and families. It is important to understand that these behaviors are usually not intentional. They are often related to changes in the brain, loss of inhibition, confusion, or unmet needs. With understanding and practical strategies, caregivers can respond in a way that protects dignity and safety.

Examples of Behaviors Caregivers May

See

- Making inappropriate sexual comments
- Touching others inappropriately
- Public disrobing
- Increased sexual talk or gestures
- Misinterpreting relationships (e.g., confusing caregiver for a partner)
- Viewing or seeking inappropriate materials

Why These Behaviors Occur

- Loss of social judgment or inhibition
- Confusion about relationships or surroundings
- Frontal lobe changes affecting behavior control
- Unmet needs such as boredom, loneliness, or need for comfort
- Medication side effects
- Physical discomfort (e.g., itching, pain) mistaken as sexual behavior

Helpful Ways to Respond

Stay Calm and Avoid Shame

- Respond calmly without scolding or shaming
- Remember the behavior is caused by the illness, not intent

Set Clear, Simple Boundaries

- Use clear and respectful statements such as “That’s not appropriate”
- Redirect to a more appropriate behavior

Redirect Attention

- Change the subject or activity
- Offer a task, snack, or walk
- Engage in a familiar, calming activity

Protect Privacy and Dignity

- Ensure clothing is comfortable and secure
- Provide private space when appropriate
- Maintain dignity for both the individual and others

Identify Triggers

- Observe when behaviors occur
- Look for patterns such as boredom, fatigue, or overstimulation
- Address unmet needs when possible

When to Seek Medical Advice

- If behaviors are frequent or escalating
- If safety of the individual or others is at risk
- If there are sudden changes in behavior
- If medications may be contributing
- If behaviors cause significant distress for caregivers

Tips for Caregivers

- Do not take the behavior personally
- Seek support from healthcare providers or support groups
- Ensure caregiver safety and boundaries
- Consider professional caregiving support if needed
- Take breaks to avoid burnout
