Dear Moon Lake Neighbors,

Spring is in full swing across the Indian River Lakes, with the return of birdsong, budding trees, and the promise of another season on the water. Whether you're already enjoying the longer days or planning time on the lake soon, we're excited to share what's happening—and how you can be part of it.

The Indian River Lakes Conservancy has now helped protect 2,759 acres of shoreline, wetlands, and forests for future generations.

This year, we're focused on stewardship, expanding access, and working closely with communities like Moon Lake to better understand conservation priorities and connect residents with the tools and resources needed to protect these cherished waters.

Here are a few highlights:

- Caring for Trails and Preserves Year-Round From the scenic cliffs and waters of Red Lake Preserve to the peaceful trails at Ferrone Woods and the accessible trails at Redwood Hill Preserve, our public preserves offer something for everyone. Grand Lake Reserve invites hikers and birders into the heart of a rich wetland complex, while Baker Woods Preserve offers trails perfect for exploring with children or simply taking in the quiet beauty of the forest. Volunteers play a vital role in maintaining these special places, and we welcome anyone interested in joining our stewardship team throughout the year.
- Listening to Lake Communities We're launching a community survey, funded by the Land Trust Alliance, to hear directly from people who live on and love these lakes. Your input will help guide our efforts around shoreline protection, water quality, and lake health.
- Protecting Wildlife Across the Region The Indian River Lakes are part of the Algonquin to Adirondacks (A2A) Corridor, an international conservation effort linking the Adirondacks to Ontario's Algonquin Park. We're proud to partner with the A2A Collaborative on projects that support resilient ecosystems and wildlife movement.
- Inspiring the Next Generation From our WHIRL Teen Environmental Program to the Elizabeth May Duvall Nature Grows Kids Camp, we're nurturing the next generation of conservation-minded leaders through hands-on learning and exploration.

Easy ways YOU can impact the quality of the lake including phosphorus levels.

Raise lawn mower blade to three inches.

- Vegetative barriers at the lakefront grow ground covers or wildflowers on slopes.
  - Many soaps may contain phosphorus or surfactants. Choose a biodegradable and ecofriendly shampoo, soap, and detergent.
  - Place barley straw bales in the water by your docks to help control algae.
    - Maintain your septic system pump every 2-3 years.
      - Request septic dye for self testing, email us at moonlakepreservationcouncil@gmail.com



### 2024 CSLAP Water Testing Reports are here!

Trophic state indicates a waterbody's biological productivity. Moon Lake is Eutrophic. Each circle on the graph shows an observation, with colors for oligotrophic (green), mesotrophic (yellow), and eutrophic (red) conditions. Key metrics for the lake are Phosphorus and Chlorophyll.


Over the past decade, levels have not changed while levels have decreased slightly since testing began 32 years ago!

#### What is Phosphorus and why is it important

- Phosphorus is a trace element that is essential to plant growth.
- Small amounts of phosphorus cause phytoplankton and algae in the lake to bloom.
- When algae dies, oxygen is decreased, causing more phosphorus to be released from decayed algae, causing more algae to bloom, depleting the oxygen – a spiral of lake degeneration. This is called eutrophication.



Moon Lake is our cherished natural resource. Like many lakes across New York State, it faces growing challenges from nutrient pollution, invasive species, and harmful algal blooms (HABs) that threaten water quality and long-term sustainability.

In partnership with SUNY College of Environmental Science and Forestry (ESF), a comprehensive evaluation has been conducted to explore long-term solutions that could protect and restore Moon Lake's water quality. Each solution varies in complexity, cost, and impact—but all share a common goal: to reduce nutrient pollution and preserve the health of Moon Lake for generations to come.

#### Algaecide (EarthTec)

Slows algae/cyanobacteria growth Requires NYSDEC permit & certified applicator

### Alum Treatment (Aluminum Sulfate)

Binds phosphorus in lake sediments Applied every 3 years; prevents HABs, not future runoff

### Dredging (Under Study)

Removes nutrient-rich sediment Needs mapping, sampling, access planning

# Mechanical Harvesting (Eco-Harvester)

Pulls weeds + algae by root \$102K equipment, 1.5 acres/hour efficiency

#### Phytoremediation

Aquatic plants absorb phosphorus Requires planting, harvesting, and maintenance

#### Riparian Buffers

Native shoreline plants filter runoff Reduce erosion, nutrients, and improve habitat

# Selective Herbicide (Aquakleen)

Targets invasive Eurasian Milfoil Cost-effective, minimal impact on native plants

### Septic System Replacement

Replace ~40 aging systems; major source of phosphorus Cluster systems may lower homeowner costs

### Ultrasonic Buoys (LG Sonic)

Blocks algae growth with sound waves Solar-powered; treatment + real-time monitoring

We put out a call for winter stories, with a short deadline, our neighbor Ed D. kindly shared one that we think you'll enjoy and find helpful!

Some educational information on Moon Lake ice fishing that may help folks with curiosity about ice fishing on our little slice of heaven.

The New York winter of 2024 was not the ideal year for us die hard ice fisherman looking to cure the winter blues. The warm winter made it impossible to fish on many of the NY lakes, however Moon Lake did have a few weeks in January that had "safe ice". 4 inches is considered safe for all walkers. Given that it's shallow it's one of the first lakes to freeze and believe me when I say it's memorizing when that first black ice forms. It's like walking on water ...ice cleats are a must! Black ice is the strongest ice vs "honey combed ice" which can be dangerous. In fact one rare occurrence was on our neighbor Red Lake in the end of December roughly 15 years ago. The temperature dropped so quickly the water froze 2 to 3 inches thick by morning. The result was catastrophic to hundreds of small panfish, literally frozen in the ice probably due to oxygen depletion....not to speak of the view. I wish I had my smart phone then!

Easy access, easy walking ,no crowds and plenty of action with tip ups or just jigging. Great for kids and those new to the sport.

Probably the best part of the ice fishing on Moon Lake is that it gives our family and friends a memory that lasts forever.
