Our Mission Statement:


To actively work to preserve and protect the water quality of the lake.

A message from our IRLC partners!

IRLC is gearing up for another exciting year. This year we are more focused than ever before on protecting water quality on our lakes.

This year's Water Quality Conference will be held on June 7th. Highlights include presentations on grant funding to improve water quality, microplastics in our water, the danger of eutrophication of our lakes, and more! Tickets can be purchased at www.indianriverlakes.org/waterquality2024.

We have updated our website and are currently in the process of developing a web page devoted to each lake, describing its uniqueness, history, and challenges etc. We will need help from representatives of each lake in developing this information. Ways You Can Improve Water Quality and Decrease Phosphorus in the Lake

Raise lawn mower blade to three inches.

- Vegetative barriers at the lakefront grow ground covers or wildflowers on slopes.
 - Many soaps may contain phosphorus or surfactants. Choose a biodegradable and ecofriendly shampoo, soap, and detergent.
 - Place barley straw bales in the water by your docks to help control algae.
- Maintain your septic system pump every 2-3 years. Request septic dye for self testing, email us at moonlakepreservationcouncil@gmail.com

Considering updating your Septic system? Read below on one of our residents journey with the Septic Replacement Program offered by Jefferson County/NYS:

Hi Moon Lake neighbors. I was asked by the preservation council to share our family's experience regarding the replacement of our septic system and grant process. So here it goes.

On Labor Day weekend 2021, the Moon Lake Preservation Council conducted one of their meetings at the public boat launch and we attended. During the meeting, it was brought to our attention that NYS was offering a grant for cottage owners who were willing to upgrade their septic system. After the meeting, I talked with a cottage owner who had just applied for the grant. He shared with us the application process for the grant, and he gave us the name of the company he was using to design & install his septic system. Our cottage was built in the mid 60's and had a septic system installed in the early 70's. At the time, I did not know much about our septic system, and we were only having minor issues with ours. When we were at the cottage for more than a long weekend, we would sometimes notice an odor from the area of the septic system. Also, years ago the metal cover had rusted away, so we replaced the cover with pressure treated plywood and this was beginning to fail.

In years past, our family had discussed upgrading our septic system, but we were concerned about the cost and the permitting process that we would need to go through, so we decided to live with our current septic. But once we found out there was some assistance from the State and the process seemed to be straight forward, according to own or our cottage neighbors, we decided to move forward.

William Billings III septic services was recommended to us, and we were told he had completed numerous septic systems on Moon Lake. I contacted Bill about replacing our septic and soon thereafter, he came out to our cottage to look at our property and septic system. Within a short timeframe after his visit, he provided us with engineering drawings for a proposed new septic system and a quote to complete the project. Once I had all this information from Bill, we applied for the grant. This process was done through the Jefferson County Planning Department. The application was straight forward, and it basically asked questions about our current system, problems we are having with it, who will be completing the new system and a cost estimate. We did not have much information on our current system, and we noted that in the questionnaire. We sent the questionnaire in at the end of September. At some point during the fall, a county representative came out to look at our property and review the proposal. As we all know, the wheels of government can work slowly, and it was not until June of 2022 that we were awarded the grant. At this time, we worked with Bill to see when he could fit us in to his schedule.

In August of 2022, work on our Septic system started. In all honesty, I believe it took a couple of weeks to complete, but I cannot recall exactly. I will say that Bill was amazing to work with. Our new system works flawlessly, and I would highly recommend Bill.


Once the work was complete, we were inspected by the town and given a Certificate of Occupancy. At this point we were able to fill out the paperwork to be reimbursed for the approved amount of the grant. The completed process from start to finish was a little over a year once we were reimbursed. The process was smooth, and I must say the Jefferson County Planning Department was very helpful when I called for information or questions. Also, I never had to make a specific trip to the cottage for any of this process. If you are considering replacing your septic, but are concerned about the process, based on our experience I would not be worried. It does take some time for the County to manage your application/grant, but in the end, it was well worth it.

2023 CSLAP Water Testing Reports are here!


Trophic state refers to the overall biological productivity of a waterbody. The trophic state of Moon Lake is Eutrophic. Each circle represents a single observation and is colored to highlight oligotrophic (green), mesotrophic (yellow), and eutrophic (red) conditions. Two key metrics for our lake is Phosphorous and Chlorophyll. Phosphorous has remained relatively flat in the past decade where we have seen slight improvements in Chlorophyll.

What is Phosphorus and why is it important

- Phosphorus is a trace element that is essential to plant growth.
- Small amounts of phosphorus cause phytoplankton and algae in the lake to bloom.
- When algae dies, oxygen is decreased, causing more phosphorus to be released from decayed algae, causing more algae to bloom, depleting the oxygen – a spiral of lake degeneration. This is called eutrophication.



Did you know you can help the lake by taking pictures and marking the locations of weeks, plants, and algae?



These efforts are crucial for maintaining the lake's health, alongside volunteering for the board or other projects. The best part? You can do this while enjoying the lake—it only takes a few minutes. Use Google Maps on your phone to drop a pin and get coordinates for marking where you find algae or plants.
