By our next meeting the Fourth of July Parade will have already happened. I hope we were well represented and had a good time in the parade.


I hope all is well with you, and I'll see you at the next meeting on July 9 at the Pleasant Valley Library 7:00 p.m.

The Jenkins family Route 66 trip

Doug Jenkins, past president of our Model A and the Model T club, as well with wife Holly and 13 years old son Tyson went on an awesome seventeen-day Route 66 vacation. It is something they have always wanted to do.

We in the club have an interest, a curiosity of liking, to know what our fellow members are doing when it comes to their cars and automotive pursuits. They left

on May 31st and returned June 17th. driving a Doug Jenkins restored 1970 Chevelle Super Sport Convertible.

The journey to Chicago to start the Route 66 Tour took the Jenkins first to Mt. Rushmore and then to Custer State Park. After four days of travel, they arrived in Chicago. The beginning Route 66 sign was found and so officially their journey to Santa Monica began with the usual breaks at the tourist traps and 'stop-and-guawks.'

An overview of the trip by the numbers: They went through 16 states. Arizona twice and the entire state of Utah, 13 hotels/motels, 17 days of traveling, 3 time zones, 37 gas station fill ups, 414.2 gallons of gas, \$2.94 to \$4.49 a gallon, total



cost of gas \$1,351, 10 to 15 miles per gallon, 4,967 total miles traveled. Out of that mileage Route 66 was 2278 miles. They do recommend staying out of the big cities as Route 66 gets lost and swallowed up, while the smaller cities seem more to embrace it.

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Jim's technical tip

Keep an Eye on Your Ammeter

Thrifty Henry Ford would only spend the money to put an ammeter in the Model A if he knew it would help you while driving, so get in the habit of keeping an eye on it.

Here's what to look for and what it can tell

Watch for the ammeter needle to "twitch" as you pop out the ignition switch or turn the ignition switch to the "on" position. This confirms that the coil is getting power. Now start the cor.

After the engine starts and you have it on a fast idle to warm up, check that the ammeter is showing a Charge to the battery. If not, find out why.

Look at the ammeter needle when you step on the brakes. It should jump a bit toward discharge (unless you have LED brake lights installed, which draw very little power). It's always good, before you hit today's crazy, busy roads, to know that your brake lights are working.

If you have a voltage regulator in your gener-

If you have a voltage regulator in your generator, or if you have an alternator (which has a voltage regulator built in) then you should see the initial battery charge rate on the ammeter steadily drop until it is back to zero in 5 minutes or less. A stock Model A generator will not do this, it has a constant amps output above idle RPM, so you can watch for that while you drive.

Check the ammeter as you turn your headlights on. The charge rate to the battery should drop with a generator; the needle should jump around a bit but go back to where it was if you are driving with a good alternator

As you see, the ammeter can help keep you out of trouble every Model A Day!
