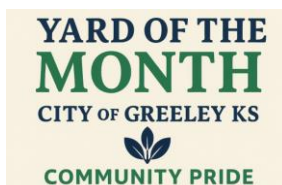

ORDINANCE SPOTLIGHT

ORDINANCE NO. 301 WAS PASSED, APPROVED AND PUBLISHED ON NOVEMBER 13TH, 2002.

By setting reasonable standards, the ordinance helps preserve property values, neighborhood stability, and overall community well-being. It balances housing needs and community standards, creating a safe and respectful environment for residents and neighbors alike.
