MILLIONS CRIED – NO ONE LISTENED

Vor ungefähr drei Jahren kam eine hübsche Frau zu einem

Treffen der

Donauschwaben von den USA und Kanada, und suchte ältere Volksdeutsche die in den Konzentrationslagern Titos waren und die allgemeine Vertreibung von Haus und Hof miterlebt hatten.

Sie heisst Ann Morrison und kommt von St. Louis, Missouri. Sie kam mit ihrem Mann und Kindern, um die Aussagen von einigen Landsleuten via Videocamera fest zu halten und es dann später in der Form eines Filmes zu zeigen. Sie studierte damals an der Meramec Community College in St. Louis.

Diese ihre Aktion erregte Interesse, nicht nur unter den Donauschwaben sondern auch von allen vertriebenen Volksdeutchen, Sudetendeutsche und Ostpreussen. Wir Donauschwaben gehören zu der Gruppe der Volksdeutschen und lebten im Südostraum Europas, also in Ungarn, Jugoslawien, Rumänien und Bulgarien. Die deutschen Siedlungen konnte man entlang der Donau finden, die sich bis zum Schwarzen Meer streckten.

Seither werden jedes Jahr Konferenzen geplant mit vielen Rednern, sowie Filme, die an die Kriegs und Nachkriegsjahre erinnern und aufzuklären versuchen. Dieses heikle Thema, war ja für die längste Zeit tabu, doch jetzt 65 Jahre nach dem Chaos der Nachkriegsjahre wollen doch unsere Kinder sowie Enkelkinder wissen was damals los war

Auch der Schreiber dieses Berichtes, sowie meine Frau, sind überlebende der Tito-Konzentratsionslager. Obwohl wir damals nur Kinder waren, die Todesnähe war aber immer spürbar, sowie der unmenschliche Alltag der Lagerzeit, kann man nie ganz vergessen.

Darum ist es vielleicht gut, dass jetzt mehr und mehr Leute sich interessieren was von 1944 bis 1948 und in manchen Ländern noch länger damals passiert ist und warum es passiert ist.

Man kann nicht alle diese Ungerechtigkeiten mit einem: ja, die Deutschen sind die einzigen Kriegsverbrecher, abtun. Wie so manche Forschung über die Nachkriegsjahre zeigt, wurde vieles von den Siegerregierungen und Generäle unterstützt und verheimlicht.

So kam es heuer zu einer zwei Tages Konferenz, organisiert von dem Deutsch-Ungarischen Verein in Oakford, im Grossraum Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Präsident Bill Galgon und seine tüchtige Frau Marlene, hatten wieder mal alles im Griff, was auch dem Seminar zu gute kam, und den Erfolg der zwei Tage guarantierte.

Auch der MC Werner Fricker, war super am Mikrophon und leitete den Ablauf des Programs ohne Probleme.

Die Konferenz endete am Samstag, dem 21. April um 17 Uhr mit einem sehr guten Abendessen. Die Kindertanzgruppe sowie die Jugendtanzgruppe zeigte ihr Können mit der Vorführung von gut eingeübten Volkstänzen. Das brachte wieder gute Stimmung in den Saal, und so endete ein sehr interessantes und lehrreiches Seminar

Im Rückblick kann man sagen, dass vieles gesagt wurde, was schon lange überfällig ist und so manche Teilnehmer aufhorchen liessen. Die Anmassung, dass wir deutscher Herkunft bekommen haben was wir verdient haben, ist unfair und falsch.

Die Forschungen über die Nachkriegsjahre zeigten auf schwarz und weiss, dass die Siegerstaaten diesen Chaos nach 1945 unterstützten und befürworteten.

Die Wahrheit über die damalge Zeit wäre ein guter Anfang um diese historische Lücke zu füllen.

Am Freitag, dem 20. April, 2012, um punkt neun Uhr, eröffnete Werner Fricker diese Vorträge und Debatten.

Nach jedem Vortrag gab es Filme über Flucht und Konzentrationslager, sowie Vertreibung vom eigenen Haus und Hof, die durch Video Interviews von den Personen die diese für deutschsprechende Menschen gesetzlose und lebensgefährliche Zeit erlebten und überlebten.

Nach jedem Vortrag konnte man Fragen an den Sprecher stellen und die jeweiligen Themen ergänzen oder erweitern.

So ging es bis zwölf Uhr mittags, dann wurde ein leckeres Mittagsessen serviert, zubereitet in der Küche und von den Mitgliedern der Ungarn-Deutschen Vereinigung.

Das persönliche Erlebniss sowie Schicksal von einigen Sprecher und Sprecherinnen, traf auch viele der Anwesenden, von denen fast ein jeder ein Buch schreiben könnte von dieser schrecklichen Zeit und dem zum Himmel schreienden Unrecht der Nachkriegsjahre.

Die Sprecher an dieser Konferenz waren:

Erika Witt – Sie wurde in Budapest, Ungarn, in 1942 geboren, zu deutschstämmigen Eltern. Erika lehrte für vierzig Jahre Fremdsprachen in Philadelphia, deutsch, franzözisch und spanisch. Sie sprach über die Nachkriegsjahre in Österreich und ihre Herkunft und Reise in die USA.

Bruni Adler – Sie hat ein MSS vom Brynmawr College, sowie ein MSW von der Uni von Tübingen, Deutschland. Sie hat drei Bücher veröffentlicht: "Bevor es zu spät ist", "Geteilte Erinnerungen", und "Zerrissenes Leben".

Sie flüchtete von Ostdeutschland nach Westdeutschland als sie noch ein Kind war. Ihr Thema war über das Schicksal von hundertausendeutschen, die in die Arbeitslager geliefert wurden und über die Vielen die dort starben.

Alexandra Blitzer – Sie wird im Mai ihr Studium an der Sarah Lawrence College erfolgreich beenden, mit einem MFA in Literatur. Sie hat einiges aus ihrem Buch vorgelesen, das mit den Themen dieser Konferenz zu tun hatte.

Rose Matico - Sie hat ein BS degree in Biochemistry von der Temple Universitåt. Sie arbeitet als ein Protein grosse Biochemist für eine Geboren und Pharmaceutical Firma. aufgewachsen in Philadelphia und ist zur Zeit Präsident der Vereinigung der Donauschwaben in Philadelphia. Thema war, wie ihre Generation, also die 40 bis 50 jährigen Töchter und Söhne von den Alten, die die Konzentrationslager erlebt und überlebt haben, beeinflusst wurden.

Deutsche Ecke, Suite I

Danube Swabian Easter Customs by Jacob Steigerwald

At my birthplace of Banat Topola, the church bells in the steeple remained silent from 'Gründonnerstag' (Maundy Thursday) until 'Karsamstag' (the day after Good Friday), for figurative recharging. As children, we were told that they had flown to Rome for spiritual renewal.

While the bells were 'absent,' the function of summoning worshipers for masses and to remind the faithful that it was time for praying, so-called 'Ratscher-Buben' ran from house to house along each side of different streets shouting, 'mir ratsche zum erschte, zum zweite, zum dritte Mol in die Mess' (we are rousing for the morning, noon, or evening mass).

The message of the boys was underscored with a few revolutions of the Ratsche each boy was carrying. Some of them were genuine heirlooms! This wooden instrument makes the sound of a rapidly clicking ratchet. Alternately, the gizmo is also called Rätsche, Schnarre, Klapper, and Karfreitagsrassel.

The word 'gerewelt' that has been correctly interpreted by participants in some discussions alludes to the activity of ratschen.

After mass on Karsamstag, two Ratscher-Buben were designated as hoarders, with painted faces for identification. Together, they carried a large utility basket, into which the collected goods were placed as the group of boys walked from house to house to receive their rewards for having served as Ratscher-Buben. Donations generally consisted of money or eggs, with occasional cups of flour, which was placed into a linen sack.

To announce themselves to village residents, the group of boys sang a ditty that went like this (in the local dialect):

Stipp, stipp Staab aus dr Katz gehn die Hoor aus Summer, Summer Mai aus, die Veigle un die Blume, dr Summer werd bald kumme. O Leit, o Leit, ihr liewi Leit, do kummt die heilichi Oschterzeit. Gibt uns Ajer, gibt uns Geld, alles, was ihr wollt, nor khe Schlää, die tun weh. Ecku, ecku ruschafeh, heit is torus tambure, Ajer raus, Glick ins Haus!

Conceptional Translation:

"Commence spring cleaning, for cats are already shedding fur. With May in the offing, Summer is approaching.

Violets and (other) flowers signal the imminence of Summer. O people, dear people, Easter-time is upon us.

Give us eggs or money - anything you want, except beatings, for they hurt.

No particular meaning was associated with the words in the next two lines, but their mystifying sound may have conjured up supernatural notions. These 'magic' words were followed with best wishes in return for gifts received."

Upon departing, the boys would sing (partly in high German, for reasons of rhyme: Wir danken für die Gaben, die wir empfangen haben. Lebt wohl, lebt wohl, bis uffs anri Johr! (We thank you for the gifts that were bestowed upon us. Fare well, fare well, until next year).

Julius Lösch - Er wurde 1931 geboren, in einem Dorf in der Slowakei das Muhlenbach heisst. Er hat ein Masters degree in Mechanical Engineering. Er arbeitete an der "White Sands Missile Range" und dann an Aerospace Projects, sowie Solar Wind Spectrometer (Apollo 12 Lunar landing) und verschiedene Military defence projects. Er ist seit 1992 im Ruhestand.

Marlene Fricker - Sie hat ein BFA für Tanz von der Adelphi Uni. und arbeitet zur Zeit als Direktor im Abington Memorial Hospital und studiert an der Gwynedd Mercy College.

Adam Dickmann - Seine Eltern waren auch Donauschwaben. Diese drei Sprecher informierten uns über die verschiedenen deutschen Mundarten.

Kearn Schremm - Er wurde in New Jersey geboren und ist Vizepräsident von der "German World Alliance".

Er ist ein Rechtsanwalt und sprach über das Kleiner-werden des Gebietes wo die Deutschen über Jahrhunderte lebten.

Rudiger Stoehr - Er ist ein Sudetendeutscher und sprach über das Sudetenland und die lange Geschichte dieser deutschen Region. Er beklagte sich über die Unverschämtheit der Tschechen, dieses sein Heimatland, wo zuletzt siebzehn Millionen Deutsche wohnten und nach 800 Jahren ganz einfach enteignet wurden.

Ann Morrison - Sie ist die Person, die diese jährlichen Konferenzen organisiert, die Filme dreht und die Schicksale der Vertriebenen dokumentiert. Sie studierte an der College in St. Louis und machte die Vertreibungen und Vernichtungen der Volksdeutschen, sowie Sudetendeutschen und Ostpreussen, zu ihrer Lebensarbeit um so viel wie möglich zu Filmen und Bekanntmachen, was damals passiert ist.

Dann kamen zwei Donauschwaben, die jetzt in Philadelphia wohnen, Frau Anna Hartmann, geboren in Nero, Rumänien im Jahre 1937 und Frau Johanna Reiter, geboren im Jahre 1932, in Franztal, Jugoslawien. Sie erzählten über ihr Leben von daheim bis zum heutigen Tag. Zwei äuserst interessante Lebensläufe.

Der letzte Sprecher war Meritt Drucker - Er ist ein USA Armee Offizier im Ruhestand (1973 – 1993). Er war in Deutschland stationiert von 1987 – 1990. Er sammelte Aussagen von ehemaligen Kriegsgefangenen und hat bis jetzt etwa vierzig Reporte. Er versuchte zu erklären warum damals, also vor 65 Jahre, niemand etwas wusste, was da los war mit den Volksdeutschen und allen Vertriebenen.

Dann gab Präsident Bill Galgon, im Namen der Ungarn-Deutschen Vereinigung, eine kurze Anrede und bedankte sich bei Allen für die Anteilnahme an der zwei Tage langen Konferenz.

Auch wollen wir ihm, sowie seiner tüchtigen Frau Marlene, für einen sehr gut organzisierten Ablauf der vielen Sprecher und Filme, sowie die leckeren Malzeiten, h e r z l i c h d a n k e n . *Adam Martini*

Ferdinand Porsche, Creator of Iconic 911 Sports car, Has Died—April 5, 2012



In 1963, Porsche's design was still known as the 901. It was renamed the 911 before it came on the market in 1964. (© picture alliance / dpa) The creator of one of the most iconic automobiles of all time and a celebrated designer of other consumer products has died.

Ferdinand Alexander Porsche, designer of the Porsche 911, passed away in Salzburg on April 5 at the age of 76.

F. A. Porsche was the grandson of Porsche's founder and from 1962 to 1972 headed the German automaker's design studio. In 1963, an aerodynamic, sporty model, the Porsche 901 debuted at the IAA (International Auto Show) in Frankfurt. By the time it hit the market in 1964, however, the company had changed its name to Porsche 911 and a legend was born.

The deceptively simple design remains timeless and continues to shape the automaker's products today.

"Ferdinand Alexander Porsche designed everything that is important to men," said then Porsche AG CEO Wendelin Wiedeking in 2005 in honor of Porsche's 70th birthday. "With the Porsche 911, he succeeded in designing a form that is still valid today. It became the cornerstone of our brand identity. All sports cars that we build now and in the future must orient themselves towards it in order to be recognized as Porsche by our customers."

Porsche went on from designing cars for his family's company to founding his own design studio, where he created accessories for men as well as industrial products, household gadgets and consumer goods to great acclaim. He still served, however, as honor-

ary chairman of the supervisory board at Porsche. **The Week in Germany, April 5, 2012** ****

BETTER GAS MILEAGE

Slow Down & Accelerate With Care -One of the best ways to save gas is to simply reduce your speed. As speed increases, fuel economy decreases exponentially. Accelerate moderately when pulling away from a stopped position and keep an eye down the road for slowing traffic. If you accelerate to speed, and then have to brake right away, that's wasted fuel.

Periodically Check Your Tire Pressure—Under-inflated tires are one of the most common causes of poor MPG. Tires lose air due to time (about 1 psi per month) and temperature (1 psi for every 10 degree drop); under-inflated tires have more rolling resistance, which means you need to burn more gas to keep your car moving.

Reduce Extra Weight With a Clean Vehicle-If you're the type who takes a leisurely attitude toward car cleanliness, periodically go through your car and see what can be tossed or brought into the house. It doesn't take much to acquire an extra 40 or 50 lbs. of items, and the more weight your car has to lug around, the more fuel it burns. 



The Forgotten Genocide Conference – Friday, Saturday, April 20th & 21st (From the UGH June 2012 Monthly Progress Newsletter)

Many important events have taken place at our club over the years. One hundred years is a long time and maybe in the future, we will go over some of these events. Often when they are happening, we do not realize how important they really are. However, the conference that took place at our club in April ranks among the most important events that took place throughout our history. I am not going to go into great detail as we advertised in our March and April issues in great length. But, it was a most interesting and informative two days. Many only attended for one day, but many attended both days. The speakers were well informed and spoke with passion and zeal. After each speaker a film was shown. The film series began with the history of various groups of German peoples who migrated to the eastern European countries beginning in the year 1000 and came forward to the year 1943.

The second movie focused on fleeing groups in 1944 running from the Russian forces as well as the number of people sent to Ukraine and Russia before the Potsdam Conference took place. It told the story of children being separated from their parents and moved from the Carpathian region.

The third movie – January 1945 to June 1945 told about those being chased out of their homes to being tricked when trying to return. The time from July 1945 to December 1945 told of the labor and death camps who were losing people in great numbers and the children whose parents had passed away and were taken to orphanages run by the Communist governments. Escapes were planned and acted upon.

Movie 5 explained how the refugee camps were run and the ill treatment forced on the eastern German population. The sixth film reflected on the survivors and their descendants. Their memories are very strong and hard to deal with.

After each day, the attendees were sad and somber. Everyone was anxious to speak to their families and friends who also attended. All the things we had learned had happened to family members, club members and friends. Perhaps the man who heads the committee you serve on had grandparents or parents who suffered through these happenings. Perhaps the woman who is in charge an event had family members who were starved to death in the camps. If you were there, you appreciated the event. If you were not there, you really missed an extraordinary piece of history. Perhaps you felt it was not your history. But it was! It is the history of people and we are people. I personally thank all who helped to bring this event to the **United German Hungarian Club** and to all who helped in any way to make it a success.

ENGLISH AND GERMAN

German languages

As we have pointed out frequently in the past, English is a member of the West German family of languages and a branch of the Low German subfamily having been brought to Britain in the fifth century by the Angles, Saxons and Jutes after the Romans pulled out. It took a while to push the native Celtic tribes to peripheral areas in Scotland , Wales and Cornwall. The legends of King Arthur are a reminder of that conquest. With the exception of place and river

names, the Celtic people left very little vocabulary so anyone with a knowledge of modern German can, with some difficulty, read the Low German dialect which prevailed in England.

When the Normans invaded in 1066, their French became the preferred speech of the upper classes and the courts. It's an interesting comment on this class system that the names of farm animals are Germanic while the meat is Norman French – hence

swine and pork, sheep and mutton, cow and beef. By the time of Chaucer, English had been significantly changed from its German roots although it was still clearly recognizable as such. Final "e's", which are now "silent", were then pronounced as they still are in German.

Shakespeare and the King James Bible are the classics of early modern English but still retain some elements of their Teutonic background. One of the most common examples is the use of verb endings which, with the exception of third person singular, have disappeared in modern English. In German a verb has an infinitive form such as machen. When the en is removed it leaves the verb stem to which verb endings are added according to person and number as such

German Early modern
English Modern English

Ich mache wir machen I make we

du machst ihr macht thou makest ou make you make you make Er/sie/es macht sie machen he/she/it maketh they make he/she/it makes they make

You'll note that the second and third person verb endings in early modern English are similar to the German while modern English has only an s in the third person singular. Another similarity in early

modern English is the verb "have" which has the following forms where the second and third person are almost identical

Ich habe
Du hast
Er/sie/es hat
thou hast
Er/sie/es hat
he/she/it hath
You'll note the second person
singular pronoun thou which, with a
few exceptions, has now all but
disappeared from English. Thou is
equivalent to German du, th often
being used in English where German
uses d as in the definite article - the
German der, das, die

The other second person singular pronoun forms thee, thy, and thine are objective and possessive forms and you can see the similarities with the German possessive dein.

Modern English has moved further from its Germanic roots but is still obvious in grammatical structure and such cognates as mother/Mutter, father/Vater brother /Bruder etc. Examples of other, less obvious, words are deer which is related to the German Tieranimal - or swarthy – a person with dark complexion and Schwarz – black

I apologize if all of this seems a little complex but a knowledge of these similarities can aid you greatly in your study of German which I hope, unless you already speak German, you are going to do. Speaking a foreign language will help you to understand the German culture of your background much better.
