Our "Back Home Again" Dinner.

By now it's been well established that the Trenton Donauschwaben honors the rich heritage of its ancestors in both word and practice. Indeed, if we could go back home again as our dinner theme suggests, our grandparents would immediately recognize today's menu as authentic: Rindsgulasch (Beef goulash), roasted chicken (Hendel) and Fischpaprikasch (chopped fish in a stew over noodles) are Schwob comfort food favorites like no other. Most of us are pretty familiar with Gulasch on a bed of noodles and is there really anyone who doesn't know about our roasted chicken?! Our third offering, Fischpaprikasch, however, is something quite extraordinary.

Let's look at what makes this so special among our Donauschwaben. Back in the old country eating fish was what one did on Friday. Fridays after all were considered days of fasting, kind of like Lent all year round. Happily, this coincided nicely with an abundant supply of fish found in the Danube River. So, add the need for religious observance together with the availability of carp and catfish and what came of it was the beloved dish we call "Fischpaprikasch"!

My hometown of Bukin in the Voivodina in what is today Serbia was not far from the mighty Danube. Back then, a few Hungarian families lived on the banks of that great river and they took good care of the town when it came to supplying fresh fish. I remember well the way they would travel by wagon back and forth through the streets calling out in German something akin to "get your fish here", "get your fish here".

And so it was that we Bukiners could buy great tasting fish right on our door step. Together with onions, paprika and Oma's noodles, they made for some excellent Fischpaprikasch everyone enjoyed. Not to be forgotten was my dad's homemade wine which made the fish feast complete, something even a small boy like me got a few swallows of every now and then. Those were heady days of good and plenty, of family and friends, of laughter and enjoyment. A relatively short but glorious time before the war caught up with Bukin and changed everything. What a time it was!

Congratulations to our kitchen staff on their fine efforts to take us back home again.



GERMANS IMMIGRANTS TO IRELAND

In the early 17th Century, the Lower German Palatinate was rich with Protestant refugees from neighbouring lands. Families settled there to rebuild their lives and escape persecution. The Palatinate was repeatedly ravaged by attacks from France during the 17th Century. Following a terribly harsh winter and responding to notices by New World landowners showing the benefits of emigrating to America, a substantial exodus of Palatine families occurred in 1709. Some of the Palatine emigrants of 1709 found their way directly to the New World, but over 13,000 were routed through London. The Landlords of Irish estates wanted to increase the Protestant tenant population, a goal supported by Queen Anne of England. In September 1709, almost 3000 Palatines were relocated to rural Ireland, with a roughly equivalent number being transported to New York and North Carolina. Over the following three years, more than two thirds of the Irish Palatine settlers left Ireland and returned to England and Germany.

Der Hof hinter dem Doppelhaus, der eine Grassfläche war hat Frau Marx in einen bunten Blumen und Rosen Garten aller Art verwandelt. Es ist eine wahre Augenweide.

Ihr Glauben und Ihre Liebe für unsere alte Heimat gibt Frau Marx eine Stärke und Zielstrebigkeit die Sie aussergewöhnlich erfolgreich machte. Sie war Vereinssekretärin für über 60 Jahre im Verein der Donauschwaben, PA. Sie organisierte und leitete die jährlichen Wallfahrten, und deutsche Messen die nur durch Ihren Einsatz möglich waren. Ihre Beiträge zu unserer Ahnen und Dorfkultur haben sich überall bemerkbar gemacht. Wir hoffen und wünschen, das Sie weiter so macht. Herzlichen Dank für Alles ! Daher wurde Ihr 90. Geburtstag im Haus der Philadelphier Donauschwaben so grossartig gefeiert. Die Idee diesen Moment in Ihrem Leben, den 90. Geburtstag gross zu feiern mit Familie und Freunden, war die Idee Ihrer Tochter Dr. Christine Marx und Ihren Töchtern. Der Saal war ziemlich besetzt, wen Frau Dr. Marx die Gäste begrüsste und willkommen hiess. Sie gratulierte Ihre Mutter und dankte Ihr für alles was Sie für sie und ihrer Familie getan hat. 

Eine schwierige Zeit für unsere Vereine

Als alter Mann kann ich feststellen wie sich die Zeit seit den fünfziger Jahren bis heute verändert hat. Die grossen Einwanderungswellen nach dem zweiten Weltkrieg, brachten neues Leben in die Deutsch-Amerikanischen Unternehmungen, eine Art Wiedergeburt. Es ist eine Art "Dorfkultur" die wir aus unserer alten Heimat mitgebracht haben und jetzt mit einigen modernen Einflüssen es den Mitglieder und Gäste mit unseren Schlachtfesten, Spiessbraten sowie Festessen anbieten und so den Verein bekannt gemacht haben. Natürlich ist nicht nur das Essen, sondern auch die vielen Unternehmungen die durchgeführt werden, von den Gedenkfeiern für unsere Toten bis zur jährlichen Wallfahrt, vom Donauschwaben Treffen bis zu den Kanutouren in den New Jersey "Pinebarrens", vom Zelteln am Upper Delaware River bis zu den Bergwanderungen am Watergap, und so weiter. All das und noch vieles mehr. Wie unter anderem auch die Volkstanzgruppe unserer Jugend die über die Jahre grosse Erfolge verzeichnen konnten. Es hält unseren Verein auf Trab.

Das klappt nur wenn Männer und Frauen viel Zeit opfern und ihre Talente gebrauchen um diese verschiedenen Unternehmungen auch leiten und durchführen. Unsere Vereinsleitung unter Präsident Josef Brandecker mit seinem Team von Funktionären können stolz sein auf ihre Leistungen. Die Frauen, mit Eva Martini ihrem Vorstand, schaukeln das Kochen und Backen und machen sicher das sich die Mitglieder und Gäste wohl fühlen in unserem Verein. Das sind die Gründe, zumindest einige, die unseren Verein so beliebt gemacht haben.

Leider können sich heute viele Vereine, die oft sehr bekannte sind und weit in die Vergangenheit reichen, nicht mehr behaupten, da die finanziellen Herausforderungen so angestiegen sind und zugleich die Zahl der Mitglieder immer weniger wird. Dazu kommt noch unsere moderne Leitkultur, in der der "smart phone" nicht mehr wegzudenken ist, und jung und alt sehr beeinflusst sind, was uns mehr Schaden bringt als Gutes. Die Gier nach Mehr, Grösser und Besser, macht das Geldverdienen zu einer Hetzjagd. Auch sind die täglichen Unkosten sowie die immer steigenden Preise für die notwendigen Services, der Steuern und Versicherungen, ja es macht sich bemerkbar in Allem im täglichen Leben. Diese Realität der heutigen Zeit verursacht zum Grossteil die Probleme der Deutsch-Amerikanischen Vereine.

So von den fünf Deutsch-Amerikanischen Vereine die damals hier in Trenton, New Jersey tätig waren, sind heute noch zwei, die "German-American" und wir die "Donauschwaben" Ortsgruppe Trenton, NJ. Im Staate New York gibt es seit heuer keine Donauschwaben Vereine mehr. Es ist eine traurige Situation geworden und ist so schade, da unsere Landsleute, sowie wir Deutsche und Österreicher so Vieles zu der heutigen Leitkultur beitragen könnten und es zugleich auch unseren jungen Menschen auf das Gute in unserer "Dorfkultur" näher bringen würden. **Adam Martini**

The Verband Looks to the Future

Legacy Preservation. The Verband set up a committee to assess the efforts to safeguard the history and legacy of individual clubs. This comes on the heels of two eastern region clubs (Rochester and New York) closing their doors in recent years. Much more on this in the near future.

Upcoming Treffen. The 2019 Treffen will not be held at the UGH as was previously reported due to a scheduling conflict with the previously mentioned trip to Hungary. That's too bad, but it was clearly in the interests of all involved. Instead, Chicago or Cleveland will do the honors. Stayed tuned. We look forward to Labor Day Weekend **this year** when we will gather in Kitchener, Ontario, Canada. Oh, Canada... look out, here we come!

The Eastern Region Rocks. Yes we know, our region has some of the smaller clubs in the Verband including this writer's favorite, Trenton, as well as the great clubs of the UGH and Philly DS. But what we might lack in size we make up for in spirit and a willingness to be involved. Perhaps it's the toughness that comes with growing up in the rough and tumble of the Philadelphia/New Jersey metropolitan area or maybe it's a higher alcohol content in our Slivovitz, whatever it is the Eastern Region can always be counted upon to work hard and then socialize far into the night with the best of them.

Conclusion. The meetings went well and there's a strong feeling that we are headed in the right direction as an organization. No, not perfect, but clearly we're in a good position to continue preserving, promoting and perpetuating the heritage we all cherish. Many thanks to the Verband's President Robert Filippi and Stiftung President Ed Tuliis for their leadership and helping it all run smoothly.



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Another minority abused, in 1944

Ethnic Germans recall their forced flight from Yugoslavia and march to Soviet labor camps.

The ethnic cleansing of Kosovo stirs memories half a century old in Anna Gauss, now 75.

In 1944, she and her family were among many ethnic Germans whose families were uprooted from northern Yugoslavia by Serbs.

"Because the German people were all driven out," Gauss said in an interview yesterday, there's a parallel with what is happening in southern Yugoslavia now.

The Germans' ancestors had settled along the Danube River in the 1700s, not only in Yugoslavia but in Hungary and Romania — a subculture known as Danube Swabians.

A cultural exhibition evoking that history at the Danube Swabian Association of Philadelphia in the Somerton section runs through today.

In part, it is meant to mark a perceived parallel between the earlier treatment of the ethnic Germans and that of the ethnic Albanians.

"The difficulty," Fred Gauss said in an interview, "is that many people don't have sympathy for anything that happened to Germans in the war

"I'm not looking for sympathy for Mom and Dad," he said about Anna and Theodor Gauss.

But, he noted, "there's a history here," in the Serbian treatment of its minorities — Germans in the '40s, Kosovars in the '90s — "and we

have to learn from this."

An auditor for the Philadelphia Health Department, Gauss, 44, is president of the 350-member local Swabian organization.

Sitting in the dining hall of the association on Southampton Road west of Roosevelt Boulevard, Anna Gauss, who lives in Fox Chase, said that on Dec. 27, 1944, Yugoslav partisans emptied her village.

Filipowa was just northwest of Novi Sad — the city where NATO missiles recently destroyed a major bridge over the Danube.

The partisans, a mix of Serbs and others, drove the 23 men and 83 women on an all-night march to a railroad junction where, two days later, soldiers of the Soviet army herded them into freight cars.

With other ethnic German civilians from other Yugoslav towns, she said, they were on their way to spend almost two years in Soviet labor camps in Ukraine.

"We were working in the woods like lumberjacks," she said of the women from her village.

Her future husband was luckier.

Though he grew up in a Yugoslav village near her, Theodor Gauss left in 1941 to work in Hamburg and, drafted into the Wehrmacht, the German army, he was captured by American soldiers in France in 1944 and finished the war in a prisoner-of-war camp in Mississippi.

A publication of the Los Angeles chapter of the Danube Swabian or-

ganization states that "in Yugoslavia, 60 percent of the Swabians left the country in horse-drawn carts with the retreating German army as Soviet troops invaded."

"Those who remained were declared traitors and were subjected to cruel and harsh treatment."

According to a booklet published in 1982 by the Danube Swabian Association, U.S.A. Inc. in Milwaukee, Germans from Swabia and other regions were encouraged by emperors in Vienna in the 18th century to migrate east and settle along the Danube to counter the threat of Turkish invasions.

Adam Dickmann, 70, said yesterday that a Serb saved his life.

"I'm lucky," said Dickmann, who lives in Pennsbury, Montgomery County. In November 1944, when he was 16, Yugoslav partisans "shot 212 men in my hometown."

The partisans were not just Serbs. "In the area I came from," he said, "you could speak five languages."

His father had been drafted into the Wehrmacht in 1943 and was killed in Belgium in 1944.

In November, a month after the partisans took over his town, the young men there were ordered to assemble in the main square.

But Dickmann had been caring for the horses of one of the Serbs.

As the 212 men crowded into the square between the town hall and the church, Dickmann said, the Serb said to him, "Go in [to the town hall], and don't go out."

It was the last time that he saw those German neighbors, including 18 of his schoolmates.
