

People of German Ancestry Dominate US Melting Pot

America is a melting pot of immigrants from across the globe and people of German ancestry make up the biggest chunk of that mix.

There are more than 49 million people with German ancestry in the United States, a number that accounts for 16 percent of the American population.

"This includes people reporting multiple ancestries," said David Garoogian, senior editor of *Ancestry and Ethnicity in America*, in an email. "Only 16,912,041 people reported being of German ancestry alone."

There are more than 41 million Americans who identify as Black or African American.

The US Census map identifies "Black" or "African-American" as a term for US citizens with ancestry in Sub-Saharan Africa. African Americans live predominantly in the South, but there are also large Black or African-American communities in Chicago, Illinois and Detroit, Michigan from US Census Bureau using data from Census 2000.

The 35 million people who identify as "Irish" form the next-largest ethnic group, followed by the 31 million people who identify as "Mexican".

LARGEST ANCESTRY GROUPS IN US (in order)—German, Black/African American, Irish, Mexican, English, American, Italian, Polish, French (ex. Basque), Scottish, Scotch-Irish, Dutch, Puerto Rican, Norwegian, Swedish, Chinese (ex. Taiwanese), Filipino, Asian Indian, Russian, French Canadian and Welsh.

People who came from England, followed by Italians, Poles, and French people round out the largest ancestry groups in America. There's an old adage that says "Birds of a feather flock together" and that's certainly the case with ethnic groups in the United States. "For the most part, people of certain ancestries tend to congregate in certain parts of the country," said Garoogian.

German-Americans have settled primarily in the Midwest where they account for more than 30 percent of the population. You'll find a heavy concentration of Irish-Americans in the U.S. Northeast, in states like Connecticut, Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine and Massachusetts.

People with Mexican ancestry are found along the Southwestern border of the United States and are heavily concentrated in Los Angeles, Houston, Phoenix, San Diego, Dallas, and San Antonio.

There are more than 19 million people who identify themselves only as "American".

The U.S. Census Bureau says the reason for this could be because their ancestors have been in the United States for so long, or they have such mixed backgrounds, that they do not identify with any particular group.

Some foreign-born children or those with foreign-born parents might identify solely as "American" to show that they are part of American society.

Ancestry and Ethnicity in America used data from the 2010 Census and the 2006-2010 American Community Survey to reach its conclusions.

It's Electric!



BEER



The Issue Would-be beer exporters to Germany and environmentalists rebelled for decades against the German beer purity law or Reinheitsgebot (originally enacted in 1516), which permitted only four ingredients in the beverage: water, hops, barley, and yeast.

If you are a beer enthusiast and plan to visit Germany then you should learn a lot about **Germany's beer**. This is a handbook that will guide you in knowing everything you need to know about the true taste of German's beer culture.

1. Germany's Best Breweries – Firstly, you need to look at how German beer is made. Take a tour through some of the best German breweries from the thousand-year old monasteries, to modern state of the art facilities. A list of all German Breweries can be found on www.germanbreweries.com.

2. Germany's Beer Gardens – If you really need to enjoy your handcrafted beer then you certainly need to visit German's beer gardens. Most of these beer gardens are shaded by century-old chestnut trees and have wooden tables. In addition, you

BEER IS A MAJOR PART OF GER-MAN CULTURE

For many years German beer was brewed in adherence to the Reinheitsgebot order or law which only permitted water, hops, and malt as beer ingredients. The order also required that beers not exclusively using barley-malts such as wheat beer must be top-fermented.

Since 1993, the production of beer has been governed by the Provisional German Beer Law which allows a greater range of ingredients (only in topfermenting beers) and additives, that have to be completely, or at least as much as possible, removed from the final product.

According to a 2004 report by the World Health Organization, **Germany ranked fourth in terms of per-capita beer consumption**, behind the Czech Republic, Ireland, and Swaziland.

A 2012 report showed that Germany ranked third in terms of per-capita beer consumption, behind the Czech Republic and Austria (second) and ahead of Estonia (fourth).

I think this might spur interest and be helpful with getting the younger generation more involved in the cooking and passing that down as well as the excellent recipes in the cookbook. The heritage goes on. That is the best part...."



PAPRIKASH BEEF STROGANOFF by Christine Horold (Charlotte, NC, USA) http://www.quick-german-recipes.com/paprikash-beef -stroganoff.html

Serves: 4 - 6

INGREDIENTS

1 lb Beef (diced) – you can use stew beef

1 tbsp smoked paprika

1 tsp salt
1/2 tsp black pepper
2 tbsp all-purpose flour
2 tbsp olive oil

1 tbsp butter

1 medium yellow onion, chopped
8 oz white button mushrooms, sliced and diced

3 cloves garlic, finely minced
1³/₄ cups low-sodium beef broth

2 tbsp tomato paste

• 1 bay leaf

¹/₄ cup plain yogurt, or sour cream
Fresh, chopped parsley for garnish

INSTRUCTIONS

1. In a medium bowl toss the cubed beef with the paprika, salt and pepper. Sprinkle the flour on top of the beef and toss to coat.

2. Heat the olive oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium heat until hot. Add the beef in a single layer and cook until

golden brown on each side, tossing occasionally, about 5 minutes. Don't worry if the beef is not cooked through, it will fully cook later on in the sauce. Scrape the beef onto a plate and set

aside.

3. Add the butter to the pan, and stir in the onions and mushrooms. Sauté the

mixture, stirring occasionally and scraping up the browned bits from the beef, until the onion is translucent and

the onions and mushrooms are browned, about 5 minutes. Add the garlic and cook for another minute, until fragrant.

4. Pour in about ¼ cup of the beef broth and deglaze the pan by scraping up any bits from the bottom. Stir in the tomato paste, whisking to combine. Add the rest of the beef broth and the bay leaf, stirring well.

5. Add the beef back into the skillet and simmer the mixture over mediumlow to medium heat, until the beef is cooked through and the sauce thickens slightly, about 10-15 minutes. Stir in the yogurt or sour cream and cook for about 2-3 minutes longer. I used sour cream in mine. Let the mixture simmer for 2-3 minutes until thickened. Serve over mashed potatoes, egg noodles or rice and garnish with fresh parsley, if desired. ***



70 Years Later: A Celebration of Life.



By now almost everyone in the German community here in Trenton and Philadelphia knows the tragic story of the expulsion of the Donauschwaben. After all, we commemorate the saddest chapter of our history at least twice a year on both sides of the Delaware in some very meaningful ways. We know what was good, successful and peaceful became ugly, hateful and impoverished. We also know now that what happened to the "Schwowe" and other Germans in Eastern Europe was the biggest forcible population transfer in the history of mankind. From the Baltic Sea to the Black Sea and all the way west to Germany's current border, 15 million were ethnically cleansed from their ancestral homes with 2 million losing their lives in the process. among them untold tens of thousands of Donauschwaben.

But before those dark days things were different. The early settlers who heeded the calls of the Austrian Emperors transformed the swampy, devastated areas along the Danube River with hard work and more than a little sacrifice to become a very prosperous group by the late 1800s. They came mostly from the south-central area of what's now Germany seeking a better life for themselves and their children. They settled along a wide swath of territory that followed the mighty Danube River through Hungary, the former Yugoslavia and Romania. Staying true to their German language, customs and traditions, our ancestors enjoyed a full and rewarding life. WWII changed everything.

As the 70th anniversary of those sad days came upon us last year it was clear that something big needed be done. As they have in the past, members of the German Hungarians and the Philadelphia and Trenton Donauschwaben clubs banded together, lifted a glass or two of some frothy adult refreshment, and quickly decided that we would use an otherwise sad milestone to highlight the happy occasions and positive characteristics that make being "Schwowisch" something to be valued and cherished. The idea was to hold a different event in each of the three clubs in a series called "Living History Days".

The first of these was held in June of last year and was staged at the Philadelphia Donauschwaben club over the course of three days. Everything from artwork to clothing and from photos to hand tools were displayed in a most attractive manner from one end of the clubhouse to the other. Resource and reading materials were located downstairs as were guest speakers, Dennis Bauer, Andy Franz and Marlene Fricker, whose audiences listened with rapt attention. Their presentations were among the highlights of the weekend. The event was a success from every perspective and stands as a testament to the collaborative spirit and camaraderie among the members of the three clubs involved.

Several months later members of the three clubs would again be called together to plan a much larger undertaking to be held at the United German Hungarians. This would to be a Trachtenfest as impressive as we could make it, involving the talents and energy of each of the three clubs to the fullest extent possible. This, mind you, in the midst of all the other commitments each club faced during their busiest time of the year. The solution was simple enough: Step up the adult refreshment intake and get it done.

It was actually pretty easy to follow too since nowadays it is often mixed together with English words!

The first two events of our Living History Days series therefore can be deemed unqualified successes by any standard. We're grateful for the many who volunteered their time and talents to make them possible, most especially Marlene Fricker whose energy and dedication made the difference. Thanks go to all three club presidents, Rose Matico, Janet Malofiy and Joe Brandecker, for their efforts as well as to Mr. Fred Gauss, the eastern region's Landesverband USA vice president. All enjoyed working together so you can be sure there will be more collaborative efforts in the years ahead.

The last of the Living History Days series will be held right here in Trenton's clubhouse. The March 15th event starts at 1:30 and is entitled "A Taste of Everyday Life". It will feature aspects of a typical Schwowisch family's everyday life in a more detailed and hands-on manner. Presentations by club members from all three clubs will highlight what went on during the day and during special occasions like the Schlachtfest. A small sampling of typical Schwowisch food and drink will be offered (lunch will not be available at the event). The cost of admission is \$10.
