KNOTT'S COLONIAL FUNERAL HOME

HAMILTON, NJ

Knott's has long served the club members and is a major supporter

of our club activities.

In 1899 Franz A. Wagner, a German immigrant, established the F. A. Wagner Funeral Home at 313 South Broad St. in Trenton. As one of the first "Undertakers" in Mercer County, Mr. Wagner was influential in the establishment of the Mercer County Funeral Directors Association serving as its first secretary in 1906. Between 1910 and 1920 the establishment moved three times, first to 157 Hamilton Avenue, then to 410 Hudson Street, eventually settling at 1055 South Clinton Avenue, Trenton where it remained for over 50 years.

In 1933 M. Adeline Wagner, daughter of Franz, along with her new husband Victor L. Knott, joined her fathers practice renaming it Wagner & Knott Funeral Directors. M. Adeline Wagner Knott was the first female embalmer and funeral director in Mercer County and possibly the second female licensed by the State of New Jersey. In 1951, following the death of her father, M. Adeline and Victor Knott changed the name of the operation to Knott Funeral Home. M. Adeline and Victor's son Franz V. Knott, joined the family business after his licensure in 1956 as the third generation to serve the Mercer County community.

Together with his parents, Franz opened a suburban funeral home in 1958 - the present location of Knott's Colonial Funeral Home at 2946 South Broad Street in Hamilton. In 1970 the South Clinton Street building was closed due to the majority of families choosing the Hamilton funeral home for services. Victor died in 1975 and the community was served by Adeline and her son Franz until the licensure of the firm's fourth generation funeral director **Robert V. Knott (club member)** in 1982. M. Adeline died in 1995 and Franz semi-retired in 1997 handing over responsibility for the business to his son, and current manager, Robert. 

Gemütlichkeit describes a space or state of warmth, friendliness, and good cheer. Other qualities include coziness, peace of mind, belonging, well being, and social acceptance. The term is most commonly associated with the tenor of a German beer garden.


Gemütlichkeit derives from gemütlich, the adjective of Gemüt, which means "heart, mind, temper, feeling" expressed by (and cognate with) English mood. The German abstract noun Gemütlichkeit has been adopted into English. The current meaning of the word derives from its use in the Biedermeier period. By the second half of the 19th century, it also became associated with a set of traits supposedly unique to the German culture. In the United States, the city of Jefferson, Wisconsin uses the phrase: "The Gemütlichkeit City" as its motto.

The word can be used in descriptions of holidays. In the 1973 English contract law case Jarvis v Swans Tours Ltd, a holidaymaker sued after not receiving the Gemütlichkeit promised by the promotional literature for a package holiday to the Swiss Alps.

The communal connotations of Gemütlichkeit are also emphasized in some uses of the term. For example, one academic described it as a tradition of "public festivity" (in the form of a "mixture of music, food, and drink"), which "promote community solidarity." The Harlem Renaissance was then cited as of how a sense of Gemütlichkeit arises from a "mix of music, art and politics in service of community consciousness".

Gemütlichkeit has been appropriated at least once to describe the tenor of an economic era rather than spirit of a social gathering. In analysing the "inflation dampening effects of globalization" a Georgia Southern University professor wrote that certain U.S. economic trends could "spell an end of the Gemütlichkeit — a situation in which cheap labor and money abroad as well as everincreasing productivity at home had permitted an uninterrupted spell of controlled growth in overall prices". 1950 U.S. Census to be Released April 1, 2022—from Dennis Bauer, Club Genealogist



The U.S. Census of the United States is taken every 10 years since 1790 according to law. The results are made public only after 72 years. The 1950 U.S. Census therefore, will be made public on April 1, 2022. This is a "big deal for us genealogists and family researchers".


Although many of our club founders had not yet arrived in the States from Europe before 1950, some had or some of their family members or relatives were in the States by then. They should therefore be listed in this Census.

The data collected and available will include; the names of all household members, address, race, sex, age at last birthday, marriage status, State or Country of birth, naturalized?, occupation information, place of residence in 1949, country of father & mother's birth, level of education of each person in household and 1949 personal and household income if over 14 years of age.

This will be the first Census the writer will be listed in— Happy Family Research. Of note, the 1960 U.S. Census data will not be released until 2032.

DIESEL INVENTION

125 years ago, on January 28, 1897, the German engineer Rudolf Diesel presented the combustion engine named after him. At the time, it was considered the invention of the century. It became one of the foundations for the breakthrough of modern car, ship and rail transport.

Rudolf Diesel was born into a struggling German immigrant family in Paris and raised and educated at various institutions throughout Europe. Cheated out of patents for refrigeration which he had developed, he began to work on a treatise on an internal combustion engine with the intent of reaching maximum thermal efficiency.



His first successful Diesel engine motor was officially tested in 1897 and is now part of the display at the German Technical Museum in Munich. Rudolf Diesel drowned in the English Channel in 1913 under mysterious and never resolved circumstances. ***

50 YEARS AGO

APRIL 1972: Feb. 17, 1972, was a day for celebration in Wolfsburg, where Beetle No. 15,007,034 rolled off the assembly line. The silver-blue car, heavily decorated with flower arrangements, was driven straight to the factory museum as the car that became the most manufactured automobile in history, beating Ford's Model T.



It is hard to believe this year will be our *17th Annual Euro-American Auto and Cycle Show* (the 2020 show was canceled due to the Covid Pandemic). The proceeds go to our club student scholarship fund, with scholarships going to a number of local high school students from the surrounding area each year.

As you know the car and cycle show is open to all makes and models of vehicles (cars, trucks and cycles). It is co-hosted by our friends at the German-American Society (GAS) at their picnic grove at 215 Uncle Pete's Road, Yardville, NJ. It is free for the public spectators.






Winter Arrives at the Jersey Shore
