

### Tales From a Men's Ski Trip - by Mike Lenyo

The long European tradition of downhill skiing drew me to the mountains of Park City Utah in February this year. It was a rare 'menonly' trip to meet my brother and some friends and experience those male-bonding moments only men can appreciate (Just ask Herr J and the gang about their trips to Mt. Tremblant!). These trips usually involve alcohol, crude humor, and macho stories of the day's perilous runs down the mountain. Not that the mountains are particularly perilous. On the contrary, I was referring to my skiing ability which can transform a trip down a bunny hill into a treacherous undertaking.

We landed in Salt Lake City. A beautiful place surrounded by 10,000 ft mountain ranges on three sides. After a short trip into the hills the excitement was building in anticipation of three great days of skiing ahead. We immediately took care of our first priority – a trip to the pub. My older brother John and I enjoyed the Park City micro-brew, several in fact, and even sampled the local fare of buffalo burgers. As the first long day of travel and drinking came to an end, I knew this would be a special trip.

Tuesday morning we prepped for the first big day. Loading enough boots, poles, skis, hats, gloves, and sweaters to scale Everest, we were off to the big mountains of Utah. Our friends chose to hit the biggest, fastest mountain, known as Alta (Pronounced 'Alta', as in 'Altitude', we were told). This is the same city that hosted the winter Olympics in 2000, so challenging hills were certainly available. Plus, on a men-only trip, you have to push the envelope. For my brother and me, pushing the envelope consisted of going to the closest, easiest mountain, Park City. On this beautiful sunny day in the mid-twenties I was surprised to see no lines and only a few skiers milling around the base, unlike the Poconos, where you elbow your way through a 10 minute lift line for a 90-second run. Yes, it was wide open with large, sweeping runs and miles of snow...what could go wrong?

As the day progressed, brother John the (gasp!) snowboarder and I did the best skiing of our lives. I counted about 20 great runs throughout the day. In the late afternoon, we decided to work our way back to the top for some great photos. I meandered down a lazy slope on the top ridge, adjusting my gloves and goggles in preparation for an upcoming steep intermediate slope to the left. John was already ripping his board down the mountain ahead of me. Approaching the end of the trail, I quickly made the left turn. I headed down the trail. Unfortunately, my left leg didn't come with me. As my body made the turn, my left leg twisted underneath as I awkwardly flopped onto the snow. Looking up at the sky I thought of two things: "What a beautiful day", and "Wow, my

leg really hurts!".

I have fallen many times over the years and my skinny rubbery limbs always seemed to right themselves. So, I figured it was time to get up and head back down the hill. My left leg, lying limp on ground, scoffed at my command to move. I swear I heard it say "You've gotta be kidding!", and it was at this point I realized I was in trouble. So I waited. And waited. And after 10 minutes, during which no one came by (did I mention it was not crowded?), I managed to stand. All hopes of skiing down the mountain were dashed when I tried to move and only scuttled across the trail to the other side, unable to turn or put any weight on my leg.

Finally a Good Samaritan came by uttering those three magic words: "Are you okay?". She notified the ski patrol and the rescue began. The Park City Ski Patrol were the nicest folks you could ever

meet. As they entombed my body in the toboggan (picture to the right) and guided me down the hill, I snapped a great picture of the Ski Patrol with mountains in the background. At the bottom I was hooked onto the back of a snowmobile that



headed off through the woods. I peeked through the wrapping and was immediately pelted in the face with snow from the back of the snow-mobile. Choking on the exhaust and wiping the snow from my face, I recalled the valuable advice from the driver, who said "Dude, Keep your head down, and watch the fumes". Wise words indeed. A few minutes later I was transferred again, this time into the back of a Chevy Suburban. Flawlessly, they slid me into the back like a coordinated group of pall-bearers.

At the Urgent Care Center it was interesting to watch medical students wiggle my leg and ask the same questions repeatedly, "Is this loose? Did you hear a 'pop'? Does this hurt?". Then the doctor came in, wiggled my leg, and asked the same exact questions. The difference was that he actually came to a conclusion. "Your ACL's gone". At the time I wasn't sure what that meant, but I thought "That must be bad". Turns out, it is bad. The Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) is a ligament that connects the tibia to the femur and now mine wasn't connected.

Later that night at dinner, the male-bonding was in full force. Our friends talked about tearing up the black diamond runs in Alta, those same runs that Hans Meier and Bode Miller raced down in the Olympics. Pretty macho stuff I must say, but they couldn't top my story: "Hey guys, did I mention my ACL's gone?". They all continued skiing the next few days while I hobbled up and down main street in Park City testing, and ultimately proving my theory that the microbrews would also act as excellent painkillers.

After my ACL reconstruction on March 30, I am currently in physical therapy and I anticipate a full recovery. So I ask you club members, what do you think about a trip to Whistler next February? I'll meet you on the bunny hill.

### Austrian newspaper "Die Presse", Mai-22-2004 CELEBRATION FOR DANUBE SWABIA.

Donauschwaben refugees from WWII erected a memorial cross in the cemetery at Gakowa in Serbia, site of the murder of many ethnic Germans. It will be dedicated today, Saturday, in the presence of Serbian government representatives. When combined with neighboring concentration camps, the death toll numbered some 64,000 Donauschwaben between 1944-48.

#### Johnny Weissmuller—Banater

The Banat List may be interested to know that a display honouring all emigrants from the Banat and featuring Johnny Weissmuller as an example of an immigrant to the USA in the early 1900's, will open on June 2nd. at the Donauschwäbisches Zentralmuseum in Ulm. June 2nd is the 100th anniversary of his birth and the opening ceremony will be attended by his son, Johnny Weissmuller, Jr., members of his family as well as members of the Weissmüller family living in Germany. ### A NEW DONAUSCHWABEN EXPERIENCE BOOK TO BE RELEASED THIS SUMMER

Having been born in Gakowa over sixty years ago and having experienced three years in the concentration camp there, I am happy to see that a fitting memorial has been placed on the field of the mass graves in Gakowa where thousands of Donauschwaben lie buried. The old cemetery in Gakowa, where my mother is buried, has also been cleared of all the high thornbushes and grasses that have kept everyone from finding the graves of their loved ones. My husband and I were there last year and found it to be impossible to find any graves of my family members. This was very sad.

I am very proud to announce that this summer, the book I have written about my life as a child in the concentration camp, the escape to Germany and the emigration to America, will be released. It is a hard cover book with pictures from many years ago. Not only do I describe my ordeals in detail, but also my husband's. He and his family left their hometown of Bezdan (a short distance from Gakowa) in 1944 before the concentration camp began. His life on the road was no picnic and the years after the war and their final journey to America is a heart warming story of survival.

If anyone might want to pre-order this book, please just email me and I will give you more information. I would be honored to have my book in your bookshelves -- it is history coming from a survivor.

The book is called: "A PEBBLE IN MY SHOE" - A Memoir by Katherine Hoeger Flotz. It is a hard cover book, almost 200 pages with many pictures from our families. Subscriber List for Mercer County, NJ 1951-54 (*Deutsch-Ungarischer Familien Kalender*, National Weeklies, Inc., Winona, MN, 1951, 1953 & 1954 Issues). This is a list of T-Z surnames from the Trenton area only. Additional surnames will follow in future issues.

Transcribed by Dennis J. Bauer, 17 December 2002. Surnames appear exactly as spelled in the original text and may not be the actual spelling. The list shows the individual's place of origin and their address in the Trenton area at the time of subscription to the magazine. Some translations of town, county and country names were done. As with any secondary source, you may wish to consult the original magazine. This complete list can also be found on the Club web site under genealogy.

The magazine, written in German, was published in the U.S. from 1932-1954. They contained stories from the German-Hungarian regions of Hungary, Yugoslavia and Romania, pictures of "home", jokes, poems and best of all a list of American and Canadian subscribers, their spouses, their place of origin and their present addresses in the U.S. and Canada. During its publication, the magazines listed between 10-15 thousand North American Donauschwaben.

### TERRY'S AUTO TIPS

Summer Heat!

With summer comes heat, an

enemy to your car. Keep these tips in mind as the temperature rises this summer:

- ⇔ Change the engine oil prior to the summer season. Air conditioning and turbo-charging (if applicable) add to engine heat. Change the oil at least every 4,000 miles for conventional oil and 8,000 fior synthetic oil. ALWAYS change the oil filter.
- ☼ If your belts make noise, they are worn and need changing.DO NOT use belt dressing to try to quiet the noise.
- Make sure your tires are not bald or dry rotted which can cause a blow out. Inflate them to the manufacturers specs.
- ☼ If those wiper blades chatter or streak, put on new ones (at least once per year).



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


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### TAG DER DONAUSCHWABEN CANADA & USA

### DONAUSCHWABEN CONSCRIPTS

Years ago, I was sitting with my cousin, Josef (Josie) Branitsch, in his kitchen near Stuttgart. Ironically, Josie and my Dad (first cousins and both only 19 years old in 1944) had fought on different sides of the world during World War 2 -- my Dad in the Pacific with the US Navy Seabees and Josie in France with the German infantry as a conscript. Now, as we sat there, Josie said to me "I was in Trenton (New Jersey) once!" Startled, I re-translated what he had said back and forth in my head. At that time I didn't think that Josie had ever been in the United States. Grinning, he repeated it. He then told me what none of the rest of the our US family knew. He had been captured by US Forces in France during 1944 and spent the rest of the war in one of our POW camps in Texas.

As he was being repatriated after the war, the train stopped in Trenton, NJ. He said that he could have made a phone call to his aunt ( my grandmother, Lena Rohrbacher Drobnek from Palanka & for many years the caterer for the Arbeiter). However, two things stopped him: his lack of English (!) and his fear of "causing trouble" for my grandmother. He continued by saying to me that two things really impressed him -- he was never mistreated by the Americans and he always had enough to eat.
