Points of Interest

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Cardinal Rigali Highlights Donauschwaben Wallfahrt



As co-celebrant Father Charles Zlock said, "this was a huge feather in the cap of the Donauschwaben community." If that is the case - and surely it was - then it's also a feather in the cap of Frau Käthe Marx, the dynamo who makes this event a reality each year. What we're referring to is the fact that one of the more influential members of the Catholic Church in our country celebrated a memorial mass for us! What's more, he did so in German and with full knowledge of the unhappy history our people had to endure. In fact, whether you are Catholic or Protestant (and we have many of both at these events), the significance of his presence is by any measure quite remarkable. After all, the very acknowledgement that Germans suffered during and after WWII is still something of a "controversial" topic!

According to Käthe Marx of the Philadelphia Donauschwaben, it took an invitation delivered some two years ago to secure a commitment to attend our Wallfahrt from his office. For those at the June 11th event, the added pageantry of having the cardinal and his entourage, as well as five additional priests was quite spectacular! It certainly gave our annual pilgrimage an added air of importance and seriousness. The fact that the hundreds in attendance all attempted to shake hands with the man outside, shows just how well received he was too!

The event itself was otherwise similar

to all of the many others we've had over the years. Our Trenton club always plays a visible role, providing the white crosses, club flag, "Mother of God" girls dressed in white Tracht, and a number of procession participants dressed in ethnic costume. The Schubert mass was sung by a combined German chorus whose melodious sound thundered down from the balcony in the fabulously ornate and enormously large St. Peter's Church in Philadelphia. It was all very impressive and spiritually uplifting! Few of the two dozen plus Trenton members in attendance will soon forget this very special memorial service.

Congratulations to Frau Käthe Marx and the Philadelphia Donauschwaben on a job well done. Next year's chief celebrant will be a Donauschwaben bishop from Germany.

We highly recommend that all of our readers make plans to be with us for the June, 2007, Wallfahrt. See you then!

2006 Trachtenfest/Kulturausstellung... Ausgezeichnet!

What a tremendous experience our recent Trachtenfest/ Kulturausstellung was, dear readers! The Philadelphia Donauschwaben/ United German Hungarian/Trenton Donauschwaben joint undertaking was a success by every measure, proving once again that when good clubs come together, great things can happen.

Kulturausstellung

Planning for the Trachtenfest and the Kulturausstellung began more than a year in advance. The first, the Kulturausstellung (cultural exposition), was held at the Philly Donauschwaben in April. Members from each club generously loaned their most prized possessions from "the old country". As a result, the event was able to feature "all things Donauschwaben": from colorful Tracht and artwork to tools and appliances for the home. The display consumed the entire main hall of the Philly club and was laid out in an appealing, informative and easy-to-navigate fashion. We even had a corner for a PowerPoint history presentation by our own Dennis J. Bauer, who also had Donauschwaben related genealogical materials on hand for those interested in their family's heritage.

Set-up for the cultural expo started several days in advance, with many coming straight from work to label and place each and every display item. By the time the doors opened to the public on Saturday, the usual chairs and tables of the main hall was transformed into a cultural wonderland. One visitor, a professor from a nearby college, was impressed enough to comment that it was the best cultural display of its type she had ever seen!

And the visitors did come. In fact, there was a steady stream of people throughout Saturday and Sunday in numbers that gladdened the hearts of all involved. Whether young or old, of Donauschwaben ancestry or not, attendees seemed to thoroughly enjoy their visit too. Judging by the comments of so many visitors, the large amount of display items members made available, and the enthusiasm with which the display committee went about its work, it's clear that our Kulturausstellung, 2006, was a big success for our three clubs and the German community in general.

Trachtenfest!

Fast on the heels of the Kulturausstellung came the Trachtenfest, the second of our cultural one-two punch. The organizing committee had barely time to catch its collective breath! The Trachtenfest (Ethnic Costume Festival) is one of those "feel-good" events that no one - but no one - attends without gaining some appreciation for the spirit and enthusiasm our community has for its history and culture.

The Trachtenfest was cosponsored by the three clubs mentioned above and was held at the United German Hungarian club, not far from the Neshaminy Mall. (Just to avoid confusion, "German Hungarians" and "Donauschwaben" refer to the same group of people with very few exceptions). For readers of this newsletter who haven't been there, the UGH club is situated on about 20 acres of land featuring a big clubhouse and ball room, a soccer field, indoor and outdoor stages, picnic areas and plenty of parking. In other words, it was a great place for us to hold this event, especially one that attracted almost 400 people. Like the Philadelphia Donauschwaben, the German Hungarians are excellent hosts, providing good food, drink and a most hospitable (gemuetlich!) atmosphere. Some of that "Gemuetlichkeit" was also created by the "Heimat Klaenge" German band, which played between all of the various cultural performances.

The evening began with the reading of a special Trachtenfest poem in both English and German. There were ten readers in all including Dennis Bauer, and Eva & Anna Martini from our club. With the

final words of the poem, "...today we celebrate Trachtenfest," a big parade of more than a hundred people from all three clubs began marching into the hall. The Tracht they wore were beautiful and the pride we all felt was amazing!

Next came the introduction of the various clubs/dignitaries, including that of Herr Leo Mayer from the Los Angeles Donauschwaben. He serves as the president of the national Donauschwaben umbrella organization (Landesverband der Donauschwaben, USA) to which all three clubs belong and we were glad to have him for the occasion. Our friends from the New York Donauschwaben and even from the Rochester, NY organization were on hand as well.

Our Trenton club was definitely well represented on the cultural end of things. In addition to the readers mentioned above, we had Brittaney Brandecker and Luisa Martini read essays they wrote about the Donauschwaben. We also had Eva Martini give an inspired reading of "Mein Heimatland". Finally, our own Christa and Katie Tindall did a skit called "Schwiegertochter" that went over very well with a most receptive audience. Clearly, ours is the "little club that can" and, from our dancers to our readers, Trenton gave an excellent accounting of itself

Speaking of dancers, there were dance performances by the UGH Kindergruppe (who sang too), the Philly Donauschwaben Kindergruppe, and the combined Philly/Trenton Youth Dance Group including our members James DiPierro, Josef & Brittaney Brandecker and Anna & Luisa Martini. And while the Cleveland Dance Group had to pull out at the last minute, it seemed the grand finale featuring dancers from all three clubs more than made up for their absence. Dozens and dozens of Tracht-clad dancers (including Melanie Bauer in her first performance!) whirled and twirled in unison as the evening's activities drew to an end. It was a proud moment for all and a wonderful way to wrap up a great event!

Escape from Cammin

(Ed. Note: What follows is a letter from Manfred's brother, Heinz, age 16 (!), to another, Helmut, describing his harrowing ordeal in what was once northeastern Germany (now Poland) toward the very end of WWII. This is a translation from the original that appeared in German last newsletter. Please note that in the interest of space, we've done some minor editing and condensing).

Dear Helmut,

I wanted to write to you about my escape from our hometown, Cammin.

I had to report with my entire class in March, 1945, to train in the use of rifles and anti-tank bazookas. Afterwards, our group of 16 year olds had to stay in Cammin together with an artillery detachment from the navy.

I really can't recall the exact date, but it was around 2 o'clock in the afternoon when the Russians started bombarding our town. As nightfall approached, giant fires burned everywhere but still they had not broken through. However, by midnight all roads out of town were blocked, so I began my escape along the dike toward the railroad bridge and into the town of Dievenow. Yet when I reached the bridge it was in the raised position. Fortunately, I found a boat and, with one good push, was able to make it to the other side.

The heavens above Cammin were blood-red. Only the church steeples stood out against the fiery glow as dark fingers, like warning signs from God. It was an unforgettable sight, horrible and beautiful at same time.

From Dievenow, I went with another group of soldiers to the nearby island of Gristow. The side facing Cammin was full of our soldiers and combat trenches lined the shore. Opposing us from Cammin were Russian tanks that fired on our positions day and night. Despite the tremendous noise from the shelling, however, we were exhausted from the ordeal and no trouble sleeping.

Two days later, we received or-

ders to report to the town of Heringsdorf for further training. During this time a high-ranking officer stopped by and presented some with awards for bravery in the face of the enemy. I myself received the Iron Cross and another medal - but only on paper. I was told I would receive the actual medals after victory was achieved. So, no victory no medals!

It was May when I was put into the fighting line near the town of Stralsund. We were supposed to slow the attack on that town to help prevent it from falling into enemy hands. We deployed at night and had a tank to cover our flank. Then came the attack by the Russians. First, rifle shots, then the bazookas began firing. Russian vehicles were set ablaze and explosions detonated everywhere. In no time at all, the street was turned into a raging inferno. Then, suddenly, there was an eerie silence and it was decided we should withdraw before it was too late.

We needed to get to the nearby island of Ruegen, where we were previously instructed to withdraw to if our position became untenable. But how would we get there if we couldn't reach the Stralsund harbor? Russians were roaming the streets of that town by now and we really didn't know our way around as we did in Cammin.

Finally we happened upon a marina for sailing boats and found a rowboat after a hasty search. Five of us jumped in and cast off. We weren't but 100 yards from shore when a searchlight zeroed in on us. It was a Russian tank! The tank lowered its gun in our direction and fired. Just twenty yards away a fountain of water rose up where the round had hit. We began to row like mad, trying to get away as fast as we could. Suddenly, as if by some miracle, it began to snow in big, thick flakes. It snowed so heavily the Russians could no longer see us. We held our collective breath for a moment as another shot from the tank went wide... and then proceeded toward Ruegen unharmed.

On Ruegen we found hun-

dreds of people and all types of vehicles, all trying to get north where transport to the west was said to be waiting. It was a scene of total chaos and complete desperation. Word was out that the Russians had landed with tanks and were headed this way - there was no time to lose.

We eventually reached our destination, a small village called Wiek. Here we boarded a barge and lay down on some straw. Many more youths from my age group came aboard before long. There was, unfortunately, another problem. Our barge needed to be pulled by a tugboat. While the tugboat was ready to go, the captain of the vessel was not. He feared being shot at by the Russian tanks that had taken up positions on the opposite shoreline. There was only one way out of Wiek harbor and into open waters and he felt it was too dangerous.

The commanding officer then ordered him at gunpoint to get going, fast! We all had to stay below deck as the barge and tug departed. Just before we reached the critical point, a shot rang out and we came under fire. No one spoke a word during this time. Thank God, these Russians were not very good marksmen and soon we were in open seas. A Russian airplane then began circling overhead but flew off after a short time. Someone said it was because our barge and tugboat had been flying the Danish flag that we were left alone. And so it was that we escaped the Russian onslaught!

The next morning we landed on the island of Fehmarn, a place still undisturbed by the war. The village leader allowed the local farmers to take us youngsters on as farmhands. Thus, it was here we would spend the last days of the war and where we would stay until our parents or relatives came to get us.

Dad ended up bringing mom and our relatives over from the Russian zone after the war and we all ended up in the town of Lauenburg. Here I was also able to finish my schooling.

That's all for now. I hope you're doing well. Write soon.

THE WORLD CUP by Ray Martini

I'm always hesitant in taking on a topic as large and multifaceted as this year's World Cup in Germany. This is a topic that lends itself to rather passionate and

opinionated discussions, which should only be discussed over a few liters of beer. However, my obsession with the sport usually does and will get the better of my judgment and I will attempt to summarize the passion that sweeps over the world every 4 years... and maybe drink a beer as I write.

As you may or may not know the World Cup is being played in Germany this year and for all that have not been following soccer over the years, this is one of the "BIG" events for the rabid as well as more moderate fans. Germany has reconditioned and beautified 12 of its stadiums throughout the country in preparation of the event. With the final being held in historic Berlin's Olympic Stadium on July 9th. The basic premise of the World Cup is that it is "the" tournament that crowns the king of the soccer world for the next 4 years". There are only 32 spots available for the official World Cup tournament and to get one of those spots, the teams/country must qualify in their own group. The authorities (ruling body is FIFA, Federation International de Football Association) have divided the world into 6 groups, with each group sending their winners to vie for the World Cup. This event occurs every 4 years and is held in a different country every time, so for soccer fans this is something akin to the Olympics. Here in the U.S. of A. we are lumped in with the Caribbean's, Central Americans and Canadians in a group known as CONCA-CAF (Confederation of North, Central America and Caribbean Association Football, pretty aptly named don't you think). The rest of the world is similarly divided, and they are usually grouped geographically so they are not required to fly around the world just to play qualifying tournaments.

Qualifying for the World Cup, in and of itself, is a two-year event. For example, for the U.S.A. to qualify, we started this process in July of 2004 with a game against Grenada. The reasoning behind this is that, as with all sports, the players for the national teams are professional players as well and as such have primary responsibilities to the clubs that pay their salaries. So the qualifying games need to be played when the professional leagues take a break or are finished. Each team in the group plays all the others in their group twice, one at home and away, (or the other countries home stadium) and those who win go on and those who lose do not. This is generally how it goes but because FIFA is a European based organization there are always beurocratic permutations on this simple equation. To elaborate I will attempt to explain one of the simplest variables, how our group (CONCACAF) qualified for the world cup.

In CONCACAF, the U.S.A. won the group (yippee!), Mexico came in second and Costa Rica came in third after that grueling 2-year qualifier, those teams automatically booked their tickets to the World Cup, pretty simple thus far. Win you go on, don't win you go home. The variable was that our group also receives an "at large" spot wait, wait, you're snoring, I haven't gotten to the other 5 groups and the variables...alright, alright... although it is good stuff I'll move on, but I really wanted

to discuss the goals for and goals against scenario... but we'll move on.

Before I go any further, let me state for the record, my favorite teams for the current and previous world cups. I have been a long-suffering fan of the U.S. soccer team as well as a longtime fan of the German national team (a lot less suffering). Since at this writing the U.S. has been knocked out and the German team has just beaten Argentina in a penalty shootout thriller. I am so far 1 for 2, which is much better than I usually am. To keep it brief, I will limit my analysis of these two teams with a final predictions of who to watch.

Having read all the opinions and discussions about these teams, I will now offer my opinion for what its worth. I will just state unequivocally that the U.S. team played well, I know, I know, they lost 3-0 to the Czechs (ranked #2 in the world) and 2-1 the Ghana (4 time African Cup winner) team... so how can I say that? In the U.S.'s defense, they were placed in the second toughest qualifying group in this year's cup (the first or "group of death" being the group containing Argentina, Holland, Serbia/Montenegro and Ivory Coast). It appears that the almighty FIFA bureaucrats determined that because the US had won their group (CONCACAF, remember there's a test after this) to get to the tournament, they were placed in more difficult groups than the other two qualifiers (that's the second place Mexican team or the third place Costa Rican team - remember test!!), which is usually not the case.

Had the U.S. had an easier group, I think they would have gained a bit more confidence and maybe, as they had done in the previous world cup, came out and been a threat in the knock out stage. However, since this a perennial complaint of all those countries that have been placed in those tough groups, I would have to join the line with all the other countries that were placed in difficult groups and are now going home. Aside from this complaint, (and the abysmal referees who officiated the U.S. games), the U.S.'s game against Italy was perhaps our best showing in years, right up their with our beating Portugal 3-2 in 2002 world cup to qualify for the later stages. Although only a 1-1 tie, we did it down to nine men (two men who were send off because of red cards, that's the abysmal officiating part) and even having a goal called back (see above abysmal officiating). Had you told me that this was going to be the case that we would get a point against the Italians, I would have told you to put down the Asbach and stay with the beer because your perception is off.

As for the German team, I believe that Jurgen Klinsmann (Germany's coach) has pulled off a revolution in the way Germany plays and approaches the game. Those of you who have read the German papers on "California Klinsmann," prior to the world cup and in qualifying, will know that the "experts" had effectively written off Germany and even a few predicted an embarrassing exit and the prerequisite firing of Klinsmann even before the second stage of qualifying had occurred. Within that tone and that much pressure, Klinsmann has stayed the course with his style and plan and it has paid off for him in spades. I think he has single handedly transformed the difficult to watch but often successful German side, into an enjoyable entertaining and successful side.

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
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Wedding Celebration...
