ABOUT THIS BRIEF

WHY WE PUT THIS TOGETHER

Every day of the 88-Day New Testament Bible Study covers three chapters across three different sections of the New Testament simultaneously. The reading plan was designed so that each day you experience the Kingdom gospel, the grace gospel, and the transition between them side by side. But without context, those three chapters can feel disconnected or even contradictory. The daily summaries exist to bridge that gap showing you why it matters and how it connects to the bigger picture.

We put these together because rightly dividing the word of truth is not just a concept to understand once and move on. It is a lens to apply every single day. Each summary identifies which section of the framework you are reading in, what the primary audience is, and how that day's three chapters speak to each other across different administrations of God's plan.

This document is free to use for personal reading, small group study, and sharing with others. It is not a statement of church doctrine. It is a teaching tool designed to help people read their Bible with greater understanding. Scripture quotations are taken from King James Version (KJV) unless indicated otherwise.

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INTRODUCTION

Matthew 10 records Jesus sending the twelve apostles exclusively to the lost sheep of the house of Israel, proclaiming the gospel of the Kingdom and confirming that message with miraculous signs.

Romans 10 presents the message of the gospel of the grace of God. These chapters trace the movement from a commission directed specifically to Israel, through the transitional opening to the Gentiles, to the universal proclamation of salvation by grace through faith.

Acts 10 marks one of the turning points in Scripture as Peter is sent to Cornelius, demonstrating that God is now including Gentiles in His saving work and preparing the way for the ministry that will be carried out through Paul.

MATTHEW 10 -THE KING COMMISSIONS THE TWELVE

Theme

Jesus sends the twelve apostles to proclaim the gospel of the Kingdom exclusively to Israel.

Outline

1. The Twelve Are Chosen (vv. 1–4)
 - Jesus names the twelve apostles.
 - He gives them authority over unclean spirits and disease.
 - Their miraculous powers authenticate their Kingdom ministry.
2. The Commission to Israel (vv. 5–15)
 - Jesus commands: “Go not into the way of the Gentiles.”, “Go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel.”
 - Their message is: “The kingdom of heaven is at hand.”
 - They are to heal the sick, cleanse lepers, raise the dead, and cast out demons.
3. Warnings of Persecution (vv. 16–25)
 - Jesus prepares them for opposition.
 - They are to remain faithful despite suffering.
4. Fear God, Not Men (vv. 26–42)
 - God knows and cares for His servants.
 - Faithfulness to Christ will be rewarded.
 - Receiving Christ’s messengers is receiving Him.

Kingdom Emphasis

- Audience: Israel.
- The commission is specifically directed to the lost sheep of the house of Israel.
- The message remains: “The kingdom of heaven is at hand.”
- Miraculous signs accompany the proclamation of the Kingdom.



ROMANS 10 - SALVATION IS AVAILABLE TO ALL

Theme

Paul declares that righteousness comes through faith in Christ and that salvation is freely offered to everyone who believes.

Outline

1. Israel's Zeal Without Knowledge (vv. 1-4)
 - Paul desires Israel's salvation.
 - Israel seeks righteousness through the Law instead of through Christ.
 - Christ is the end of the Law for righteousness to every believer.
2. The Message of Faith (vv. 5-13)
 - Salvation comes through believing in the heart and confessing Christ; "Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved."
 - There is no difference between Jew and Gentile regarding salvation.
3. The Necessity of Preaching (vv. 14-17)
 - Faith comes by hearing the Word of God.
 - God sends messengers to proclaim the gospel.
4. Israel's Continued Unbelief (vv. 18-21)
 - Israel heard God's message but largely rejected it.
 - God extends His grace to the Gentiles while Israel persists in unbelief.

Grace Emphasis

- Romans 10 emphasizes the universal offer of salvation through faith.
- No one is justified by keeping the Law.
- The same Lord is rich unto all who call upon Him.
- The gospel of grace is proclaimed without distinction between Jew and Gentile.



ACTS 10 - THE GOSPEL REACHES CORNELIUS

Theme

God demonstrates that Gentiles are also recipients of His saving work, preparing for the broader ministry that will unfold through Paul.

Outline

1. Cornelius' Vision (vv. 1–8)
 - Cornelius, a devout Gentile, receives instruction from an angel.
 - He is told to send for Peter.
2. Peter's Vision (vv. 9–23)
 - Peter sees the sheet descending from heaven.
 - God teaches him not to call unclean what God has cleansed.
 - Peter begins to understand that God is working beyond Israel alone.
3. Peter Preaches to Cornelius (vv. 24–43)
 - Peter proclaims Jesus as Lord; He testifies of Christ's death and resurrection, declaring that everyone who believes receives forgiveness of sins.
4. Gentiles Receive the Holy Spirit (vv. 44–48)
 - The Holy Spirit falls upon the Gentiles.
 - Jewish believers are astonished.
 - Cornelius and his household are baptized.

Transition Emphasis

- Acts 10 is a major turning point in the Book of Acts.
- God demonstrates that Gentiles are not excluded from His saving purposes.
- Although Peter's ministry continues, this chapter prepares the way for the apostle Paul's extensive ministry among the Gentiles and the fuller revelation of the dispensation of grace.



2 Timothy 2:15

Study and be eager and do your utmost to present yourself to God approved (tested by trial), a workman who has no cause to be ashamed, correctly analyzing and accurately dividing [rightly handling and skillfully teaching] the Word of Truth. (AMPC)



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
