Deacon Melvin Bass



The life of Melvin Bass had accomplished many deeds with his industrious hands and benevolent heart. He was born in Ypsilanti, Michigan, the eighth child of Moses and Gertrude (Walls) Bass. He attended Ypsilanti High School and served his country by entering the United States Army during World War II. He married his high school sweetheart Dorothy Foley and God blessed this union with seven children.

Aside from being a loving father and husband, Melvin, with the training and help from his father, formed a construction company that enabled him to personally renovate the house that he and his several siblings were born. He was considered a Master in the Building Trade.
