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# **STEM TRIP TO SAN FRANCISCO**

On April 9th parents of next year's 7th and 8th graders are invited to attend a parent meeting for a June 1st-6th of 2020 STEM trip to San Francisco. This 6 day action-packed journey is filled with adventure on a tour through California's San Francisco area highlighting Science and Technology. Students will take a cable car ride, walk on Yosemite's scenic trails, embark on a cosmic voyage and get a firsthand look at an 11-pound lobster. They will also visit a world-famous interactive science museum to explore the more than 650 hands-on exhibits, which cover topics from the human body to outer space! They will learn science and technology in amazing new ways. The trip will also be open to parents who want to accompany science teacher Alexandra Carrillo. # FOCUS ON MS LANGUAGE ARTS

Seventh grade is reading a memoir, *Farewell to Manzanar*, which focuses on a World War II community called Manzanar, a California Japanese Internment Camp. They are researching and writing an informative essay that focuses on the hardships of these camps during World War II. Sixth Grade is reading the epic poem, <u>The Odyssey</u>by Homer. The Odyssey is a monomyth (a myth about one hero's journey). Students have been working extremely hard writing original monomyths, which follow Matthew Winkler's theory of The Hero's Journey. Along with writing their narratives, 6<sup>th</sup> graders are creating their own illustrations for their narrative and a PowerPoint presentation to present to the class. Eighth grade is reading, transcribing and acting out William Shakespeare's famous comedy, <u>A Midsummer Night's Dream</u>. Students will be busy the next 5 weeks reading the play, re-writing the script into modern English, and then presenting the play to the school - along with designing the costumes and set! This fun and rigorous module will end with students writing an extensive annotated bibliography and research paper, which will be their last project in Language Arts as 8<sup>th</sup> graders at St. Mary's! We hope they enjoy their endeavor with Shakespeare's classic work.
