Riding, training and competing are all about taking part, learning new skills, reaching personal goals, supporting one another, and having fun! he Old Berkeley Riding Club was founded by Colonel Phipps in 1948. He'd organise an huge array of social events and activities for the members, including garden parties, trips to Windsor races, cross-country rides and barn dances.

Competitions were often organised at prestigious venues, and OBRC team members won the one-day-event at Kensington Palace Gardens in 1960. The club's success continued into the next decade when its Quadrille team took top spot at HOYS in 1971.

Today, the club continues to grow in strength with a membership base spanning Buckinghamshire, Hertfordshire, and Bedfordshire.

The club is known for being supportive and friendly, making it a welcoming environment for its 50 plus members. OBRC had a very successful 2024 season with some brilliant performances from teams and individuals, who left their mark in various qualifiers and championships.

Highlights included veteran club stars Jillie Luff and Corby (she is 75 years old, and he is 20) continued success in the PYO (Medium/Advanced Medium) at Lincoln. They were National Champs in 2023, and were in the top ten last year.

2024 also saw numerous other standout performances, with riders and teams earning top spots in qualifiers within area six and at championships nationally.

We try and encourage fun and learning in a supportive environment to ensure that everyone can progress at their own pace and level of confidence. We host a variety of coaching sessions but also enjoy hacking together on BHS rides, training on the biomechanical horse (pictured below) and a good social night at the pub!

"Past sessions have included talks on equine dentistry, saddle fitting, and bridleways access. In addition, members have been able to learn about equine nutrition and techniques for managing competition nerves and building confidence.

"Each year the AGM marks a special occasion celebrating not only all the competitive achievements that our members have had, but also their dedication and growth over the year.

"The club's awards include around 15 challenge trophies and cups with many of our awards honouring the success whilst others focus on personal milestones such as improvements in rider confidence or achieving individual goals with their horses.

"One of our most cherished and longstanding trophies is The Phipps Trophy, which has been a part of the club's history since 1959. "This special award, affectionately known as 'the turning-up prize', is given to the member who attends the most training sessions and competition events throughout the year.

"The 2025 awards ceremony will mark the debut of our new, recently donated Galway Rose Cup which will be presented to a member embarking on their dressage journey.

"Our chairperson, Diane Hunt, and the other committee members meet regularly to ensure all our activities and competition entries run smoothly.

"The club also has lots of loyal and hardworking volunteers who contribute massively – helping at area qualifiers, national championships, at our evening dressage competitions and sharing knowledge and skills during online Horse Knowledge Club events.

"We're so grateful to have such wonderful members who make our club such a welcoming experience for all." **Q**
