
We will be inviting chairs of our various committee charities to look for donatable items for specific charities. Those individuals will be contacted prior to the set up.

A LETTER FROM THE FINE ARTS COMMITTEE!

Welcome to 2023!

This is the third in a small series of articles on art for the Fine Arts Day event in April 2023 to encourage participation at the event. As you put Fine Arts Day event April 21, 2023, on your calendars and make plans to attend the event, here is "food for thought" regarding our desire to produce and/or enjoy art and the art process.

Here are five reasons why we need art:

- We need art because it makes us complete human beings.
- ♦ We need art to have a full range of expression.
- We need art to keep us healthy.
- We need art to understand and to share our individual and shared history.
- We need art to keep us connected.

One of our interactive artists for the April 21, is Mesquite Club's member, Sue Churchill whom everybody knows as our resident artist and for her tremendous contributions of time, energy, and effort to keep Mesquite Club activities going for the benefit of all those meetings, art classes, fund raisers, and fun filled activities.

Here is Sue's biography:

I took my first art lesson in brush ink (like pen and ink) when I was 34 and wintering in Arizona. I loved the peacefulness I felt as I concentrated on the work and tuned the world out. After moving to Las Vegas, I signed up for a watercolor class at Reed Whipple which was taught by Mary Shaw and Charlotte Baklanoff. Mary's class was later moved to the Mesquite Club where we painted on Wednesdays for about 30 years before she retired from her teaching.

Early on, Mary encouraged me to join the National League of American Pen Women (NLAPW) as an associate member and the Nevada Watercolor Society (NWS.) During my time with the NLAPW, I won a first-place award in one of their annual art shows. After having paintings accepted in three different juried shows in the NWS, I became a Signature member. I have also had the honor of three of my paintings winning an Honorable Mention Award in the NWS. Through the NWS, I attended local workshops and demos.

With Mary as my traveling companion and mentor, I joined her when she taught a week-long class in Yosemite. We also had a group of fellow painters and friends who would meet in Aptos, California near Carmel for a "Same Time Next Year" art-related trip. Mary and I attended workshops at Asilomar State Park near Pacific Grove, California. While Mary stayed on the property, I had the good fortune to room with a friend

in a house in Carmel within walking distance of Mission Carmel and Clint Eastwood's Mission Ranch. I was taking a workshop with Tony Couch in Pleasanton, California on 9/11, an experience I can never forget.

The most fun workshop was three weeks at La Romita, an old monastery in central Italy where we took sketching excursions to the surrounding towns and villages. They also offered a print-making workshop given by an accomplished Italian print artist who spoke only Italian. Thankfully, we had a translator.

Here is my biography, Brenda Kostick.

While having been a devout art lover, appreciator, purchaser, encourager, observer, and exhibiting other "-er" behaviors, I am a "newbie" at creating art. After working at different jobs including a 30-year career, I found my opportunity to concentrate on developing my artistic interests other than being a spectator. Along the way reading, fabric arts (crocheting, embroidery, sewing, quilting), and gardening gave way to Ikebana (Japanese Flower Arranging). While living in Georgia where there is an active Japanese American community in Atlanta and the surrounding area, I took ikebana lessons for about six years eventually reaching the level of instructor. This was a lovely, joyful time working with fresh flowers arranging forms using traditional Japanese techniques. After years of exhibiting in the Cherry Blossom Festival in Macon, Japan Fest in Decatur, and other festivals in Georgia, I moved to Pahrump in the middle of the Mojave Desert.

Living in the desert has taught me to seek further application of my skills. Now, I am creating flower pictures using the colorful juices dripping from the beautiful, fresh flowers from my garden onto various papers including watercolor, washi, and Korean. I also use desert plants and dry materials to create floral arrangements evocative of Japanese styles.

I still photograph my arrangements and flower-dripped pictures for framing. To finish my flat artwork, I now cut my own matting from all those available, lovely, harmonizing mat boards. It is ALL fun—at times intense—but satisfying to my soul.

WHAT IS THE BOARD UP TO?

Board Meeting

Call to order: President Frankie Segel called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. with the Secretary present. The President led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Minutes: The minutes of the November board meeting were approved as corrected, and minutes of the November business meeting were approved as written.

President's Report: President Segel brought attention to the repair and painting of the perimeter wall that has improved the appearance of our property. She also named several male relatives of Club members who have assisted the Club in various ways and expressed appreciation for their efforts.

First Vice President: Peggy Bruhns reported that it has come to her attention that a requirement of the local, health district is that anyone operating our dishwasher must hold a Health Card issued by that agency. Nancy Bleau has performed this job for us for an extended time period, and she does not have the card. Nancy will be encouraged to obtain a card, but other options for the coming year will be reviewed by the Building Committee.

Second Vice President: Colleen Bailey reported that new member orientation meetings have been poorly attended. She proposed that the Board hold a New Member Tea rather than continue with the scheduled meetings. This idea was successfully carried out for new members of the last Club year. The Tea allowed attendees to become acquainted and to hear Club officers explain their responsibilities. By consensus it was decided to hold this Tea on Friday January 27, 2023.

Treasurer: Corinne Mewhirter provided copies of the November Profit and Loss report and the Balance Sheet report for November 3, 2022. She noted that it is important for us to be aware of the need to cut expenses where possible and to increase income. Corinne reported that she had met with the Club's insurance agent and together they found the annual cost of the insurance could be reduced \$3,173.00 with coverage remaining the same. The annual cost will be \$6,121.45 and the insurer going forward will be INSUREONE

Financial Secretary: Nancy Zangl passed copies of the November report. She commented that most of the month's income will be given to outside entities.

Corresponding Secretary: Sylvia Phillips reported that she had sent a letter of regret to Diane Mosinski who had retired in good standing.

Building Chair: Cherie Williams DeWitt reported that there is a new gardening service and that the outside lights that were not properly working are being serviced. She also said that her committee will be reviewing the contract for Custodian Scott Missen as it is up for renewal in January, and some changes to it may be necessary.

Evening Representative: Cheryl Musser reported that the annual Holiday Craft Auction held be the Evening Group was a great success and netted \$15,640.45 profit. The Foster Kinship organization will receive a donation and three scholarships will be awarded from the funds.

Ways and Means: Committee Chair Linda Zesiger was pleased to report the income from the Soup and Bake Sale was \$1,370.50. She reminded us of the Chinese New Year luncheon her committee will host on January 20, 2023.

Directors

Director Barbara Bolling asked the Board if they wished to continue the practice of giving a Christmas bonus to the custodian and dishwasher. After discussion Barbara moved "we give Scott \$100 for a Christmas bonus, also to give Nancy a \$100 bonus for Christmas." Motion seconded and adopted.

Old Business

President Segel was pleased to report that the painting of the utility box will start in January and the repair and painting of the wall has been completed. She also reported the construction work on St Louis Street will continue until mid-January

New Business

Community Service Chair Chris White and Director Cathi Poer: explained plans the committee has for their scheduled Spring Tea. It will be held on Saturday April 1, 2023, and they are hoping to attract community support by offering food, entertainment, door prizes, lottery and auction items. They feel the event rates a higher admission price than the regular \$35 lunch cost. Chris moved "that the price for the Community Service April 1, 2023 Tea be \$50 per person." Motion seconded and adopted.

Treasurer Corinne Mewhirter: asked for Board approval to shred ten years of insurance paperwork when papers are received from the new insurance carrier, INSURONE. By consensus approval granted.

Meeting adjourned at 11:53 a.m.


What is one thing you can do today to move yourself closer to the life of your dreams? See it, and do it! You can do whatever you dream you can do!
