



On World Communion Sunday, observed this year on October 5, Christians across the globe gather at the Lord's Table for the sacrament of Holy Communion. The



Lord's Table stretches around the entire earth. A FEW THOUGHTS ABOUT POLITICAL VIOLENCE By Rev. Dean Feldmeyer

I never heard of Charlie Kirk until after he was dead, murdered for expressing his political opinions as a guest on a college campus. Since then, I have heard a great deal about him. More than I wanted to, to be honest.

I've heard that he was a devout Christian. I've heard that he was a devoted and loving family man. I've heard that he was a brilliant political apologist and a skilled debater. And I've heard that he was a bold and noble American patriot.

Maybe. The problem is that you could say those things about lots of people. You could even say those things about people who disagreed with Charlie Kirk

on everything he said. You could even say those things about me. Well, some of them, anyway. But are those the things that makes his death tragic?

I have no doubt that he loved his family but, as rock musician, Sting, reminds us, "the Russians love their children, too." I don't doubt that he thought of himself as a Christian though I haven't heard anyone say he loved his neighbors as himself or his enemies as Jesus told his followers to do. I'm sure he was a very clever, even glib debater but Jesus called us to be loving and kind, not clever or glib. And I'm sure he was a patriot, but I remember WWII veteran Andy Rooney observing that patriotism is a double-edged sword; he'd never seen a more patriotic people than the Nazis.

See, even if Kirk really was all those things that his fans say he was, that's not what makes his death tragic. What makes it tragic is that he was a young man, a father, a husband, a son – and he was murdered. On the tragedy scale, the rest doesn't matter.

We keep hearing people talking about "political violence" and how horrible it is, how we must eschew it, be done with it, reject it, avoid it at all costs. And I wish it was that easy. The problem is that political violence is just one kind of violence among the dozens which we tolerate, even champion in this country.

Let's be honest. This country was born out of political violence. What else would you call a revolutionary war? So, we don't reject all political violence, just the kind that offends us, that makes us feel uncomfortable, that threatens our placid way of life. And what about all those other kinds of violence to which we don't give a second thought, that we've just come to accept as the way life is in the Good Ol' USA?

Most wars are forms of political violence – the ones we agree with and the ones we don't. Then there's domestic violence, and verbal violence (and don't tell me words can't be violent). There's parental violence, and playground violence, and police violence, and TV and movie violence, and sports violence. There's road rage violence, and racial violence. And, if we put our heads together, I bet we could come up with a dozen more.

My point in all of this is that violence makes up, to a great degree, much of what it means to be an American. And unless and until we are ready to abandon ALL violence, it's just going to keep on happening.

Because, as columnist Ezra Klein reminds us, it's not just Charlie Kirk: A man tried to burn Josh Shapiro and his family alive in their home. A man broke into Nancy Pelosi's home to kidnap her and, when he didn't find her, he fractured her husband's skull with a hammer. The former speaker of the Minnesota House and her husband were assassinated. The chief executive officer of UnitedHealthcare was gunned down in Midtown Manhattan, and many lionized his killer.

Violence is viral. It infects; it spreads. Violence is combustible. It blazes into civil wars, world wars, and totalitarian turns. Who knows which spark will light the wildfire?



CAN CHRISTIANS CELEBRATE HALLOWEEN?

Yes, Christians can celebrate Halloween, though their approach varies significantly; some Christians avoid it due to its perceived pagan roots and association with evil, while others see it as a secular holiday or an opportunity for community outreach and witness, often through alternative events like Trunk or Treat. There is no single answer, and individual Christians and denominations decide how to align their faith with the holiday based on personal values and their understanding of biblical teachings on behavior and fellowship with the world.

Approaches to Halloween as a Christian


- **Rejection or Avoidance:** Some Christians avoid Halloween entirely, believing its pagan origins and dark themes contradict Christian beliefs and can invite spiritual darkness.
- **Secular/Community-Focused:** Others view the holiday as a harmless time for fun, costumes, and candy, focusing on the secular aspects and community spirit.
- Christ-Centered Celebration: Many Christians create alternatives to traditional Halloween, such as <u>Harvest Festivals</u> or Trunk or Treat events, to provide safe, community-focused, and joyful activities for children and families that align with their faith.
- **Community Outreach:** Some view Halloween as an opportunity to engage with their neighbors, practice hospitality, and share their faith in a way that demonstrates God's love and light in a sometimes-dark world.








Kids' Korner
