Dean's Razor



St. Thomas Aquinas said that theological (religious) truth could be discovered through reason and I have followed that precept since I was in high school. This summer it has led me on a curious journey into the realm of social psychology (why people do the things they do), especially the books of Malcom Gladwell: "The Bomber Mafia," "Talking to Strangers" and, "David and Goliath," etc.

A few weeks ago, having read nearly all of Gladwell's published works,

I picked up a book by Dr. Dan Ariely, another prominent psychologist. I was fascinated by the title: "Misbelief: What Makes Rational People Believe Irrational Things." One thing he talks about in it is the concept of a philosophical "razor."

In theology and philosophy, a razor is a principle or a rule of thumb, that allows for the elimination (the "shaving off") of unlikely explanations for a phenomenon. Ariely says that there are three "razors" that we should keep in what he calls "our mental health hygiene kit."

The three he commends to us are:

Hanlon's razor: Never attribute to malice that which can be adequately explained by stupidity [or human frailty].

Occam's razor: When trying to explain or understand a phenomenon, the simplest explanation is usually the right one and should be accepted until evidence provides a better one.

<u>**Hitchens' razor</u>**: That which can be asserted without evidence can be dismissed without evidence.</u>

I'm going to keep those not just in my "mental health hygiene kit" but my "spiritual health hygiene kit," as well. Oh, and one more. We'll call it **Feldmeyer's razor**: When what you are doing isn't working, do something else.

Who knows, I may even work them into a sermon somewhere along the way. It'll be fun. Have a great September.




Dear Church Family,

A violinist once performed in the New York City subway, entertaining passersby for 45 minutes. A few tossed him cash, totaling about \$30 by the time he concluded.

Little did anyone know, Joshua Bell was one of the world's best violinists. That day, he played one of the most complex musical pieces ever written on an instrument worth \$3.5 million. Indeed, a few days earlier Bell had performed a sold-out concert in Boston, where tickets averaged \$100.


The church certainly needs both leaders and followers. And everyone should be flexible and ready to pivot quickly.


