

Bishop Harry L. Seawright: Name the candidates

*(The Conference Dean will read aloud the name(s) of each candidate.

Bishop Harry L. Seawright:

Members of the conference, if there be any of you who know any impediment or crime in any of these person(s) presented to be ordained deacon(s) for which they ought not be admitted to that office, let them come forth in the name of God and show what the crime or impediment is.

The Presentation of the Candidates by the Chairperson For Ordination as Elders

Rev. William H. Lamar IV, Chair:

Bishop Harry L. Seawright, we present to you these person(s) to be ordained Elder(s).

Bishop Harry L. Seawright:

Take heed that the person(s) whom you present unto us be apt and meet, by godly conversation to exercise their ministry, duly to the honor of God and the edifying of the Church.

Rev. William H. Lamar IV, Chair:

We have inquired concerning them, and also examined them, and think them so to be.

Bishop Harry L. Seawright: Name the candidates.

*(The Conference Dean will read aloud the name(s) of each candidate.
Each candidate will stand as their name is called and remain standing.)*

Bishop Harry L. Seawright:

Members of the conference, these are they whom we purpose, God willing this day to ordain elders; for after due examination we find not contrary, but that they are lawfully called to this function and ministry, and they are persons meet for the same. But if there are any of you who knows any impediment or crime in any of them, for which they ought not be received into this holy ministry, let them come forth in the name of God and show what the crime or impediment is.

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The Epistle – I Timothy 3: 8-13..... Rev. Dr. Mylinda Clarke
Bethel AMEC, Dale City, VA

Deacons likewise must be serious, not double-tongued, not indulging in much wine, not greedy for money; they must hold fast to the mystery of faith with a clear conscience. And let them first be tested; then, if they prove themselves blameless, let them serve as deacons. Let deacons be married only once and let them manage their children and households well; for those who serve well as deacons gain a good standing for themselves and great boldness in the faith that is in Christ Jesus.

The Epistle – Ephesians 4: 7-13.....Rev. Dr. Diane Johnson
Mt. Pleasant AMEC, Owings Mills, MD

But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift. Therefore it is said, 'When he ascended on high he made captivity itself a captive; he gave gifts to his people.' (When it says, 'He ascended,' what does it mean but that he had also descended into the lower parts of the earth? He who descended is the same one who ascended far above all the heavens, so that he might fill all things.) The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.

The Gospel – John 10: 1-16Rev. Tony Lee
Community of Hope AMEC, Temple Hills, MD

"Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and

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destroy. I came that they may have life and have it abundantly. "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own, and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd."

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The Call of the Deacons

Then shall all Candidate(s) for elder's ordination stand at their seats.

The candidates should have nothing in their hands and looking directly at the Bishop.

Bishop: Do you trust that you are inwardly moved by the Holy Spirit to take upon you the office of the Ministry in the Church of Christ, to serve God for the promotion of His glory, and the edifying of His people?

All Candidates (In unison): I trust so.

Bishop: Do you unfeignedly believe all the canonical Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments?

All Candidates (In unison): I do believe them.

Bishop: Will you diligently read and expound the same unto the people whom you shall be appointed to serve?

All Candidates (In unison): I will.

Bishop: It appertains to the office of a Deacon to assist the Elder in Divine Service. And especially when he or she administers the Holy Communion, to help him or her in the distribution thereof and to read and expound the Holy Scriptures; to instruct the youths, and in the absence of the Elder, to baptize. And furthermore, it is his or her office to search for the sick, poor, and impotent, that they may be visited and relieved. Will you do this gladly and willingly?

All Candidates (In unison): I will do so by the help of God.

Bishop: Will you frame and fashion your own lives and the lives of your families according to the doctrine of Christ and to make both yourselves and them, as much as in you lies, wholesome examples of the flock of Christ?

All Candidates (In unison): I will endeavor to do so, the Lord being my helper.

Bishop: Will you reverently obey them to whom the charge and government over you is committed, following with a glad mind and will their godly admonition?

All Candidates (In unison): I will endeavor to do so, the Lord being my helper.

(Then shall the bishop, laying his hand upon every one of them severally, say:)

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Bishop: Take thou authority to execute the office of a deacon in the Church of God in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

When approached by the Bishop, each candidate, instructed by the Bishop, open their Holy Bible and place both hands on the Bible kissing it: The Bishop saying...

Take thou authority to read the Scriptures, and to preach the same in the Church of God in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

The Call of the Elders

The Ordination of Elders

Then shall all Candidate(s) for elder's ordination stand at their seats.

The candidates should have nothing in their hands and looking directly at the Bishop.

Bishop: You have heard, as well in your private examination as in the exhortation which was just made to you, and in the writings of the apostles, of what dignity and of how great importance this office is, to which you are now called. And how again we exhort you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ that you have in remembrance into how high a dignity and to how weighty an office you are called; that is to say to be messengers, watchers, and stewards of the Lord; to teach and to admonish, to feed and provide for the Lord's family; to seek for Christ's sheep that are dispersed abroad, and for his children who are in the midst of this evil world, that they may be saved through Christ forever.

Have always, therefore, printed in your remembrance how great a treasure is committed to your charge. For they are the sheep of Christ, which he bought with his death, and for whom he shed his blood. The church and congregation, whom you must serve, are his Spouse, and his Body. And if it should happen the same church or any member thereof, do take any hurt or hindrance by reason of your negligence, you know the greatness of the fault, and also the horrible punishment that will ensue. Wherefore consider within yourselves the end of the ministry towards the children of God, towards the Spouse and Body of Christ, and see that you never cease your labor, your care, and diligence until you have done all that lies in you, according to your bounden duty, to bring all such as are or shall be committed to your charge unto that agreement in the faith, and to that ripeness and perfectness of age in Christ, that there may be no place left among you, either for error in religion or for viciousness in life.

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Bishop: Forasmuch then as your office is both of so great excellence, and of so great difficulty, you see with how great awe and study you ought to apply yourselves, as neither you yourselves offend, nor be occasion that others offend. Howbeit ye cannot have a mind and will thereunto of yourselves for that will and ability are given of God alone; therefore you ought, and have need, to pray earnestly for His Holy Spirit. And seeing that you cannot by any other means compass the doing of so weighty a work pertaining to the salvation of people, with doctrine and exhortation taken out of the Holy Scriptures, and with a life agreeable to the same, consider how studious you ought to be in reading and learning the Scriptures and in framing the manners both of yourselves and of them that specially pertain to you, according to the rules of the same Scriptures; and for this selfsame cause how you ought to forsake and set aside as much as you may all worldly care and studies.

We have good hope that you have all weighed and pondered these things with yourselves long before this time; and that you have clearly determined by God's grace to give yourselves to this office whereby it has pleased God to call you, so that as much as lies within you, you will apply yourselves wholly to this one thing and draw all your cares and studies this way, and that you will continually pray to God the Father by the mediation of our only Savior Jesus Christ, of the heavenly assistance of the Holy Spirit; that by daily reading and weighing of the Scripture you may wax riper and stronger in your ministry, and that you may so endeavor yourselves, from time to time, to sanctify the lives of you and yours, and to fashion them after the rule and doctrine of Christ that you may be wholesome and goodly examples and patterns for the people to follow.

Bishop: And now that this present congregation of Christ here assembled may also understand your minds and wills in these things, and that this your promise may the more move you to do your duties, you shall answer plainly to these things which we, in the name of God and his Church, shall demand of you touching the same.

Bishop: Do you think in your heart that you are truly called, according to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, to the order of elder?

Candidates: I do so believe.

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Bishop: Are you persuaded that the Holy Scriptures contain sufficiently all doctrines required of necessity for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ? Are you determined out of the said Scriptures to instruct the people committed to your charge, and to teach nothing, as required of necessity to salvation, but that which you shall be persuaded may be conducted and proved by Scriptures?

Candidates: I am so persuaded and have so determined by God's grace.

Bishop: Will you be ready with faithful diligence always to banish and drive away all erroneous and strange doctrine contrary to God's Word, and to use both public and private monitions and exhortations as well to the sick as to the whole within your charge as need shall require and occasion shall be given?

Candidates: I will, the Lord being my helper.

Bishop: Will you then give faithful diligence always so to minister the doctrine and sacraments and discipline of Christ as the Lord hath commanded?

Candidates: I will do so, by the help of the Lord.

Bishop: Will you be diligent in prayer and in reading of the Holy Scriptures, and in such studies as help to the knowledge of the same, laying aside the study of the world and the flesh?

Candidates: I will endeavor so to do, the Lord being my helper.

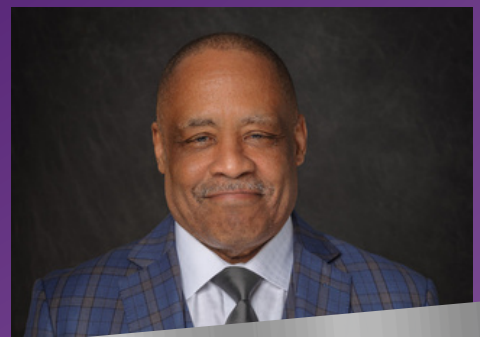

Episcopal Supervisor – 17th Episcopal District

Dr. Contreras-Byrd is a retired New Jersey state licensed psychologist with over 35 years of clinical practice. She specializes in meeting the psychological, and spiritual needs of all women, and both men and women of color. Dr. Contreras-Byrd's general areas of expertise involve issues of class, gender, ethnicity and faith; while her clinical areas of expertise are Major Depression and Anxiety Disorders.

A graduate of Rutgers University (NCAS), The Graduate School of Applied & Professional Psychology (Rutgers), and the Princeton Theological Seminary; her seminary thesis involved the development of a psycho-spiritual approach to treating Major Depression in Christian women.

She has worked as a school psychologist in urban and suburban districts; a clinical psychologist for juvenile offenders, homeless men, and adult substance abusers. Dr. Contreras-Byrd has directed programs for bilingual preschoolers and the intellectually gifted. She has been a professor of Psychology, Pastoral Counseling, Multicultural Counseling and Black Studies at Alliance Graduate School of Counseling & The Doctor of Ministry programs at Drew University and New Brunswick Theological Seminary.

For six years she served as the Special Services Advisor to the Office of the Dean of Students at Princeton University where she developed, implemented and/or supervised programming directed at meeting the social, cultural, academic and emotional needs of Asian, Black, Latinx and Native American undergraduate students. She also served as interim Director of the Third World Center at Princeton University (Now renamed the Carl Fields Center), as well as director of the Princeton University Minority Affairs Adviser Program. For six years she served as a consultant psychologist and clinical supervisor for LifeTies Inc. of Trenton and Ewing, N.J. working with teen populations with backgrounds of abuse & neglect, and those who were “medically fragile” or gay, lesbian, bi-sexual, trans-gendered or questioning.

Dr. Contreras-Byrd has appeared on local radio and television stations, and served as lecturer, preacher, work-shop facilitator or key note speaker for numerous corporations, diverse community, religious and educational organizations throughout the United States, Africa and Latin America. She served as Dean of the AME Ministerial Institute in the Dominican Republic District (which includes Cuba and Brazil); and was an elected member of the Board of The Association of Theological Schools. She has been a consistent presenter for The Transatlantic Roundtable on Religion and Race, The Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference, The Hispanic Theological Initiative and a lecturer or the Hampton Ministers Conference. She has been blessed to among those receiving the Presidential Volunteer Service Award, and to serve as an NGO delegate to the United Nations.

She is a writer and poet and has published many articles and four books. She is an ordained Elder of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, the mother of two daughters, the Rev Kamaria Milagros Byrd McAllister and Alexa Esperanza Byrd, a vocalist and recording artist. She joined her husband, the then Rev. Vernon R Byrd Jr. in pastoral ministry for some 30 years; and upon his recent election of Bishop, she now serves as Episcopal Supervisor of the 17th Episcopal District of the AME Church in 6 countries in Central Africa.

Rev. William H. Lamar IV

William H. Lamar IV is pastor of Metropolitan African Methodist Episcopal Church in Washington, DC, where he has served since 2014. As pastor of Metropolitan, Rev. Lamar has extended the church's historic legacy into the contemporary moment. Under his leadership, the congregation has grown, and its ministries have achieved significant impact.

A native of Macon, Georgia, Lamar earned the Bachelor of Science degree in public management with a minor in philosophy and religion and a certificate in human resource management (*magna cum laude*) from Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University in 1996. In 1999, he earned a Master of Divinity degree from Duke University. Lamar is currently a PhD candidate in African American Preaching and Sacred Rhetoric at Christian Theological Seminary.

The ministries of the Metropolitan African Methodist Episcopal Church are rooted in worship, liberation, and service. Major philanthropic organizations have partnered with Metropolitan to amplify its consequential local, regional, national, and global impact. Metropolitan's Come to the Table Storytelling Initiative and Sankofa Parenting Program (<https://sankofaparenting.org/>) are generously funded by Lilly Endowment. Metropolitan also partners with the Smart Surfaces Coalition to combat the deleterious effects of climate apartheid and heat islands in Black, brown, and poor communities. Metropolitan has awarded \$700,000 to more than thirty churches and organizations in 6 cities across the nation to keep our communities safe and cool.

Before his tenure at Metropolitan, Lamar served African Methodist Episcopal congregations in Florida and Maryland; and from 2008 to 2011, he was the managing director of Leadership Education at Duke University Divinity School in Durham, North Carolina, where he convened and resourced executive pastors of large churches, denominational finance executives, young denominational leaders, Methodist bishops, and the constituency of Lilly Endowment's Sustaining Pastoral Excellence Program.

Lamar is actively involved in community organizing and currently serves as the founding board chair of the Just Power Alliance, a collective of organizations from the Midwest to the East Coast that focuses on building a multi-racial, multi-class, multi-generational, and multi-faith democracy in this nation that facilitates joy and justice for all. Rev. Lamar serves as chair of the strategy team for the Washington Interfaith Network, a broad-based, multi-racial, multi-faith citizens' power-building organization rooted in congregations and associations across Washington, DC. He also serves on the board of the Texas Methodist Foundation.

Lamar has published essays and chapters in outlets from peer-reviewed journals and books to articles and essays in the public sphere. His Washington Post op-ed from December 15, 2020, published after the Proud Boys desecrated Metropolitan by vandalizing church property, was a clarion call that culminated in a judgment of more than \$3.2 million in punitive damages against the white supremacist group for their criminality. Metropolitan was also awarded legal ownership of the Proud Boys trademark.

Lamar's efforts to embody justice in community have been featured in The Washington Post, The New York Times, The Los Angeles Times, US News and World Report, and the Afro-American and on WNYC's "The Takeaway," NPR's "1A," NPR's "All Things Considered," MSNBC's "The Reid Out," and PBS's "News Hour." Lamar has preached, lectured, and facilitated peer learning groups for denominations, judicatories, universities, seminaries, colleges, and local churches. He is the former cohost of the Can These Bones podcast, and his book, *Ancestors: The Names That Bless Us, Curse Us, and Hold Us*, was published by Broadleaf Books in March 2026.

Lamar was awarded Georgetown University's O'Neill Institute Inaugural Lifetime Achievement Award in the Promotion of Justice in 2025 and was honored as the Jeremiah A. Wright, Jr. Spiritual Leader-in-Residence by Howard University in 2026.

Lamar is honored to serve Metropolitan African Methodist Episcopal Church, where he seeks daily to extend Metropolitan's nearly two centuries-long legacy of bearing witness to and ushering into this world the reign of the living God. Under his leadership, Metropolitan remains committed to worship, liberation, and service. He is married to Dr. Dana A. Williams, Dean of the Graduate School at Howard University.

Rev. Dr. Abdue L. Knox

Rev. Dr. Abdue L. Knox is a visionary pastor, executive leader, and community builder with a proven record of growing churches, strengthening organizations, and advancing social impact initiatives. He currently serves as pastor of St. Joseph AME Church in Durham, North Carolina, where he leads with the guiding theme: “Love God, Love the People, Do the Work.”

Over the course of his ministry, Dr. Knox has shepherded congregations of varying sizes, achieving measurable growth in membership, revenue, and community impact. At Greater Bethel AME Church in Charlotte, NC, he oversaw the expansion of a metropolitan congregation to more than 400 members (local and virtual), increased annual revenue from \$347K to \$1.1M, and strengthened ministries through innovation, stewardship, and community partnerships.

One of his most significant milestones was leading Greater Bethel in the liquidation of its mortgage, where he presented the bank with a \$350,000 check, freeing the church from long-term debt and positioning it for greater ministry expansion. In the midst of a global health crisis, he launched GB Cares, which provided financial relief to employees displaced by the COVID-19 pandemic and delivered vital supplies to seniors. Under his leadership, more than 5,000 vaccinations were administered, directly supporting public health and saving lives during the pandemic.

Earlier, at Bethel AME Church in Selma, NC, Dr. Knox not only grew the congregation but also successfully liquidated its mortgage ahead of schedule, demonstrating fiscal discipline and forward-looking leadership that set the foundation for continued ministry growth. While there, he also founded Bethel Cares, a ministry created to assist families impacted by government shutdowns and natural disasters in Eastern North Carolina.

Beyond the pulpit, Dr. Knox is a respected civic and denominational leader. He currently serves on the General Board of the AME Church, previously on the board of Habitat for Humanity of the Charlotte Region, where he was chair of the tithe committee, and the Shaw University Alumni Association (Charlotte Chapter). His commitment to affordable housing and community development was honored in Charlotte by naming a street (Abdue Knox Way) in his honor.

Dr. Knox’s ministry is marked by a deep investment in health, wellness, and equity initiatives. He has spearheaded projects to address food insecurity, designed food pantry and healthy meal-prep resources (including multilingual recipe cards and booklets), and led congregational programs around mental health, active senior living, LGBTQ inclusion, HIV awareness, and chronic disease prevention. His leadership consistently bridges faith with tangible action, improving quality of life for individuals and families across North Carolina and beyond.

Dr. Knox holds a Doctor of Ministry (2019) from Payne Theological Seminary, a Master of Divinity (2016) from Campbell University Divinity School, and a Bachelor of Science in Religion (2013) from Liberty University, with additional undergraduate study at Shaw University. His academic preparation is paired with extensive hands-on leadership in congregational, nonprofit, and civic settings, giving him both theological depth and practical wisdom.

A devoted husband and father, Dr. Knox has been married to Rashida for 23 years. Together, they are the proud parents of Kezia, Abdue II, and their fur baby Christmas. His personal life is grounded in faith, family, and service, reflecting his lifelong commitment to leaving a legacy of love, justice, and transformative leadership.

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Rev. Dr. Jo Ann Browning

Co-Pastor, Ebenezer A.M.E. Church, Fort Washington, MD

Rev. Dr. Jo Ann Browning is a pastor, preacher, teacher, author, mentor, wife, mother, grandmother, and trailblazer whose life's work has been devoted to serving God and God's people. For more than 40 years, she has faithfully served in team ministry with her husband, Rev. Dr. Grainger Browning, Jr. Together, they have led the Ebenezer African Methodist Episcopal Church in Fort Washington, Maryland congregation from 17 faithful members with a \$12,000 budget to a dynamic, transformative ministry that serves thousands of members, strengthens families, and impacts lives across the world.

Pastor Grainger and Pastor Jo Ann Browning have led the Ebenezer A.M.E. Church family in donating more than \$5 million in scholarships to high school graduates and returning college students. Additionally, the church distributed more than \$1 million dollars in grocery gift cards to those in need to assist throughout the COVID pandemic and beyond. Rev. Dr. Jo Ann accepted her call to preach in 1982 at Hemingway Memorial AME Church in Maryland under the pastoral leadership of Rev. Dr. William R. Porter. She briefly served on the ministerial staff at St. Paul AME Church in Cambridge, Massachusetts where Rev. Dr. Leroy Attles was pastor, before joining her husband at Ebenezer in 1983. She became assistant minister in 1985, assistant pastor by 1986, and began acting as co-pastor in 1991. In 1998, Bishop Vinton R. Anderson made the historic and unprecedented appointment officially naming her as Co-Pastor of Ebenezer A.M.E. Church. This groundbreaking appointment was continued by subsequent bishops until 2025, in accordance with the retirement requirement of the AME Church.

She continues to serve actively in ministry alongside her husband, Rev. Dr. Grainger. Her ministry extends far beyond the local church. Pastor Browning has preached, taught, and facilitated around the world, including across the United States, Haiti, Bermuda, Barbados, Germany, Liberia, and nations throughout southern Africa. She also traveled to Israel with an interreligious delegation for theological study. With a deep passion for women's spiritual formation, Pastor Browning has envisioned and led 41 annual Women's Seasons and 40 Women's Spiritual Retreats, drawing thousands of women from across the nation and abroad. These retreats have become sacred spaces of healing, empowerment, and transformation. She is the author of *Our Savior, Our Sisters, Ourselves and Faithful, Focused and Fearless*.

Her leadership and service have earned her numerous awards and recognitions, including the One Thousand Churches Connected Award from Rainbow PUSH, the Café Mocha Religion Award, the Governor's Award of Distinction from Massachusetts, and inclusion in *Who's Who* in Cambridge. She holds an Honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree from AME University in Liberia, and she has preached Spelman College's Baccalaureate Ceremony, where she also served on the Sisters Chapel Wisdom Center Executive Board for a decade. She is an honorary member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., and has served on multiple boards, including Maryland Governor Wes Moore's Interfaith Council. Pastor Browning is a graduate of Boston University with a Bachelor of Science in Communications, and she earned both her Master of Divinity (1986) and Doctor of Ministry (1991) from Howard University School of Divinity, where she received the Benjamin E. Mays and Pew Fellowships and the Rev. Vernon Johns Preaching Award. Her commitment to continual learning has included participation in the Princeton Center Graduate Theological Inquiry.

Pastor Jo Ann Browning remains a humble servant of God, a powerful voice for justice and spiritual growth, and a pioneering leader who has opened doors for women in ministry everywhere. Her life and legacy continue to inspire generations.>

Associate Dean, Professor of Spiritual Formation and African Methodist Episcopal Church Polity, Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, DC

The Rev. W. Antoni Sinkfield, Ph.D., is a native of Nashville, Tennessee. He earned the Bachelor of Science degree in Marketing from Tennessee Technological University, the Master of Divinity degree from Vanderbilt Divinity School, and the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Ethical and Creative Leadership, with a specialization in Martin Luther King, Jr. Studies, from Union Institute & University. He has also completed post-graduate study at United Theological Seminary, Oral Roberts University, and Asbury Theological Seminary as a Beeson Pastor Scholar.

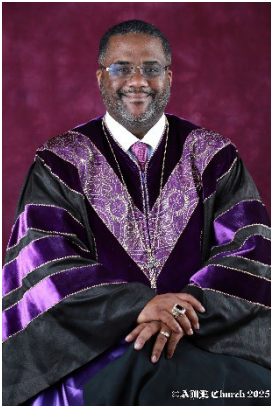
Dr. Sinkfield has served congregations across the African Methodist Episcopal Church, including pastoral appointments in Tennessee, Ohio, and South Carolina. His ministry leadership includes service as Pastor and Chief Executive Officer of Payne Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church and the Daniel Payne Christian Outreach Ministries in Nashville, Tennessee, overseeing community initiatives including early childhood education, food assistance, and substance abuse intervention programs. From 2012 to 2014, he served as Presiding Elder of the North Nashville District of the Tennessee Annual Conference. He has also served as Dean of Students at Allen University in Columbia, South Carolina.

Dr. Sinkfield currently serves as Associate Dean for Community Life and Campus Operations and Professor of Spiritual Formation and African Methodist Episcopal Church Polity at Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C. He also serves as Pastor-on-Loan at St. Paul United Methodist Church in Chevy Chase, Maryland, and as a church and clergy expert consultant with the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and Values Partnerships, supporting national initiatives at the intersection of faith, community health, and public engagement.

A published author and committed leader in community engagement and organizational development, Dr. Sinkfield has served on numerous boards and initiatives dedicated to community empowerment, including as a founding member and former finance and fundraising chair of Nashville Organized for Action and Hope (NOAH). His contributions to the church, academy, and community have been recognized through numerous honors, including being named Distinguished Alumnus of Vanderbilt Divinity School (2020) and Tennessee Technological University (2023).

Shaped by decades of pastoral, academic, and community leadership, Dr. Sinkfield's work continues to center the formation of leaders, the strengthening of communities, and the faithful engagement of church and society for the common good.

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Bishop Julius H. McAllister, Jr.

Presiding Prelate, Ninth Episcopal District OF THE AME CHURCH

A fourth-generation minister, Bishop Julius McAllister, Jr. answered the call to ministry in 1992. He was licensed to preach and admitted to the Northeast Annual Conference of the Seventh Episcopal District (South Carolina) of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in 1993. In 1997, Bishop McAllister was ordained an elder in the Northeast Annual Conference. Prior to his appointment to the Bethel AME Church in 2008, he distinguished himself as an outstanding pastor in the Detroit and Chicago areas. He was a youth minister at Oak Grove AME Church in Detroit, Michigan. Subsequently, he served as the pastor of Payne Chapel AME Church in Chicago, Heights, Illinois, and the Greater Institutional AME Church in Chicago, Illinois.

Called to minister to the moral and spiritual lives of God's people by spreading the Good News of the redeeming grace of Jesus Christ, Bishop McAllister is recognized for his passionate and powerful preaching and teaching of God's Word. He interprets, instructs, and inspires with the hope that lives will be transformed into the likeness of Jesus Christ.

Upon his call to Bethel, Reverend McAllister established the church theme, Called to Make a Difference, as believers are encouraged in Matthew 5:16 to let their light shine. He believes that Bethel's ministry experiences should reflect the abiding love of Jesus Christ, as well as love for one another; and that "our focus, as we turn the proverbial pages of time, must be to show the outside world that we are on the CARING END of ministry" Owing to his persistence, Bethel became one of the first black churches in the nation to address the COVID-19 vaccine distribution disparity in underserved communities by becoming a vaccination distribution site. A variety of ministries such as the Bethel Community Development Corporation that provides affordable housing for disadvantaged families; the A Life Recovery Center that offers accessible, efficient, and cost-effective treatment to low income individuals; the Tallahassee Homeless Shelter Food Project that provides hot lunches to the homeless, and other outreach programs, bring healing and help to those in need and assist in the formation of more loving and wholesome communities. As pastor of Greater Institutional AME Church in Chicago, Illinois, Reverend McAllister's devotion to community growth and development led to the creation of a Come Home For Christmas Ministry that served nearly 5,000 homeless, poor, and underprivileged adults and 2000 children and raised more than seven hundred thousand dollars to support needy families in Chicago during the Christmas season.

Throughout his ministry, Bishop McAllister has been prominently involved as a leader on all levels of the AME Church. Currently, he is the chairman of the Eleventh Episcopal District Board of Examiners, a member of the Board of Trustees of Edward Waters College in Jacksonville, Florida, and chairperson of the finance committee for the Florida Annual Conference. He is constantly called upon to preach and teach throughout the AME Connection.

Bishop McAllister received the baccalaureate degree in criminal justice from South Carolina State University in Orangeburg, South Carolina, the Master of Divinity degree from the Turner Theological Seminary in Atlanta, Georgia, and the Doctor of Ministry degree from the Chicago Theological Seminary in Chicago, Illinois

Bishop McAllister is the son of retired AME Bishop Julius Harrison McAllister, Sr and Mrs. Joan Marla McAllister, Episcopal Supervisor. He is married to Mrs. Deana Elizabeth Young McAllister, and they are the proud parents of three children: Julius Harrison III, Colin McKinley Young, and Dylan David Jeremiah.

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Bishop C. Anthony Muse

**Founder/Senior Pastor – Ark of Safety Christian Church,
Upper Marlboro, MD**

Maryland State Senator; District 26 – Prince George's County

A powerful, nationally-known and respected teacher and preacher of the gospel, Bishop C. Anthony Muse is founder and senior pastor of the Ark of Safety Christian Church, a vibrant, growing congregation with a rich 130-year history that began as Gibbons United Methodist Church in Brandywine, Md. In 1999, following his resignation from the United Methodist Church, Bishop Muse founded the Ark of Safety, currently located in Prince George's County, MD. Bishop Muse was ordained nearly five decades ago and is. Today, his messages are broadcast around the world on the internet.

Bishop Muse is the presiding prelate of Ark United Christian Community Churches International, a fellowship of nearly 280 churches in the Washington Metropolitan area, the U.S., and Africa, whose mission is to transform leaders into powerful agents of change in the church, local community, and the world. Bishop Muse is well-known and beloved as a pastor with a true servant's heart. He serves on the Board of Bishops of Kingdom Fellowship Covenant Ministries, led by Archbishop Ralph L. Dennis in Towson, Maryland, Bishop Muse's father-in-the-Lord.

However, Bishop Muse's ministry has always extended beyond the walls of the church. In addition to his extraordinary and seasoned leadership in ministry, he is highly regarded for his political leadership and service to the citizens of Prince George's County. He is currently a four-term member of the state senate representing Maryland's 26th legislative district. He serves on the Judicial Proceedings Committee; Joint Committee on Administrative, Executive and Legislative Review; Joint Committee on Federal Relations; Executive Nominations Committee; and is vice-chair of the Rules Committee. He is a member of the Legislative Black Caucus of Maryland and the State Council on Child Abuse and Neglect. He is a former member of the House of Delegates, former chair of the Prince George's County delegation, and a former Maryland state ethics commissioner.

Bishop Muse holds a doctorate degree in church and community development from Howard University, a master's degree in divinity from Wesley Theological Seminary, and a bachelor's degree in history from Morgan State University. He is married to Pat Lawson Muse, a veteran local TV news journalist and Emmy-award-winning news anchor for NBC4-TV in Washington, D.C. Lady Muse is recently retired, and serves as an elder at the Ark of Safety.

Rev. Sherita grew up in Mount Moriah Baptist Church in Clinton, SC, where she served as a Sunday school teacher and church musician. In 1982, she became a member of Prodigal African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church in Swansea, SC. She supported her husband as he served as pastor of Payne Memorial AME Church, Jessup, Maryland, Hemingway Temple AME Church, Washington, DC, and Union Bethel AME Church, Brandywine & Temple Hills, Maryland. As an Itinerant Elder, at Union Bethel Rev. Sherita was the Assistant Pastor and Minister to Women. She also served as Executive Director for Bethel House, Inc., a Union Bethel non-profit agency. Rev. Sherita worked as a chaplain for Capital Caring Hospice in Prince George's County, Maryland.

In July 2016, at the 50th Quadrennial Session of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Rev. Dr. Harry L.
