

NEWS FROM FRODSHAM CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

Our vicar, Rev Elaine, writes:

Our Church school Frodsham C of E Primary School have recently had their SIAMS inspection (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools).

I am so pleased and proud to report that this went very well, and the report was amazing – giving a wonderful reflection of our school as it really is - and the dedication and hard work of the staff and volunteers.



And from the school's head teacher:

We are thrilled to share with you that we recently had a very successful SIAMS inspection in school. This inspection looks in depth at whether the school is living up to its foundation as a church school and enabling pupils and adults to flourish and grow spiritually. Having spent the day in school talking to a range of children, staff, governors and parents, our inspection was able to confirm that we have 'a deeply embedded culture of Christian love which underpins school life, where children and adults know they are cherished in school and by God'.

Reverend Elaine was able to talk about our links with the church and the parish and the inspector recognised, 'a strong partnership with the church enhances pastoral care given to staff and families. Subsequently, flourishing is fostered through strengthened relationships between the school and community.' **Our school vision: 'Love each other, as God loves us,'** is rooted in John 15 where we hear that 'Jesus is the true vine, we are the branches and we need to remain in Him.' It was a delight to see this being recognised and celebrated in our school. If you wish to read the full report, you are welcome to do so and can find it on our school website.

Continuing with the theme of loving each other, our ever-popular Ethos Group once again hosted an Afternoon Tea. The children gave up their time to prepare the food, practise a range of musical, gymnastic, dance and joke-telling entertainments and make Christmas cards full of joy. It was lovely to welcome so many visitors into school for this occasion and the children all enjoyed chatting to their guests and finding out a little about each person as they lived out the fruits of 'love, kindness, goodness, gentleness and joy' which we have been learning about together in whole school worship. If you were unable to attend this time, please do not worry, the children are excited to host another afternoon tea very soon.

CRAFT AND CHAT have been making hats and other knitted items for babies, to go The Countess of Chester Hospital. CCH either sell the items to raise money for the hospital or else they are passed to the neonatal unit to be gifted to babies there. As an aside, by the simple expedient of Liz collecting £2 from everyone each week, Craft and Chat have been able to donate over £500 so far to Church Funds.


A boy was looking forward to the School Nativity Play. He desperately wanted to play Joseph and kept pestering his teacher in the hope that he could.


However, he was disappointed as he was to play the Innkeeper. He sulked during rehearsals until the teacher told him that if his behaviour continued, he would not be taking part at all.


