Letter

Dear Friends,

This Sunday is Advent Sunday, marking the beginning of our new Church year.

For those of you who may be unfamiliar with how our readings are chosen, we follow a three-yearly cycle:

Year A: When we follow the Gospel of Matthew (as we have been doing 2019/20)

Year B: When we follow the Gospel of Mark (as we will 2020/21)

Year C: When we follow the Gospel of Luke (Advent 2021/2022)

The Gospel of John is used at various times during all three years.

During the Advent season our liturgical colour is Purple – the colour of penitence, reflection and waiting.

Today we begin lighting the candles on our Advent wreath, formed from a circle of evergreen branches which symbolise eternal life. Four candles stand in the circle, each representing one of the four Sundays of Advent. In the centre of the circle is the fifth candle – the Christ Candle which is lit on Christmas Day.



The circular form of the wreath reminds us of God's eternal and endless mercy with neither beginning nor end. The evergreen speaks of the hope we have in God – the hope of new life in Jesus Christ and of eternal life.

The first candle that we light today is the PATRIARCHS CANDLE when we remember those early fathers who listened to the word of God and acted upon it – people like Abraham, Moses and Noah. It therefore is also the Candle of FAITH because Faith is

like a light shining in a dark place. As we look at this candle. We celebrate the faith of our ancestors and God's people of old.

In Advent, as we prepare to celebrate the Christ Child's birth, we remind ourselves that Jesus will come again in glory. It is so important that we do spend time reflecting during these weeks rather than jump straight to the "main event".

Maybe you would like to spend some time reflecting on the following thoughts by Thom Shurman:

Come, God-with-us: who braves our rejections and hurt, who holds us in acceptance and love.

Come, God-for-us, who whispers in our ears, that we – each of us – are beloved children.


Come, God-under-us, who cradles us in arms that never grow weary; whose lap has room enough for all.

Come, God-over-us, who watches in the long silence of the night that we might rest in peace.

Come, God-beside-us, who steadies us when we falter, who lifts us up when we fall.

Come, God-behind-us, who picks up all the faded dreams we drop along the way and patchworks them into hope.

O Come, O Come, Immanuel: and we will rejoice for ever!
