Letter

Dear Friends,

Summer takes us into holiday time when rhythms of work change, and opportunities arise for spending more time outdoors - watching children playing, enjoying leisurely lunchbreaks in pavement cafes or bars - there seems to be a greater willingness to relax in the sunshine and linger over meals. Having endured Covid restrictions for so long it comes as a blessed relief, even though the virus hasn't gone away.

It's important that we savour these moments, however we see them – time out / time off / time for stillness / time "to just be" / time for prayer and quiet reflection / time to listen to what God is saying to us / time to recharge our batteries – all crucial to our health and well-being.

Our Liturgical cycle follows the same pattern – we are now in "ordinary" time and our liturgical colour for many weeks is green. We have experienced the excitement of Christmas and Epiphany, the drama of Lent and Easter, the enormity of Ascension and Pentecost and now we have time to reflect on the implications of these – a time for us to grow – a bit like a flowering of our faith. As the great Liturgical circle moves full-circle back towards Advent, we can approach our major festivals with a more open heart ready to deepen our faith. Just as when we have truly rested, our bodies and minds approach our everyday activities with renewed energy.

We often pray together the words of St Paul: "The Grace of Our Lord Jesus Christ, and the Love of God, and the Fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with us all evermore. Amen."

Paul reminds us of God's hope and desire, that we be united in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit – that profound sharing between God and his people wherever we are; and may we, by the grace of God, make time to bring the love of Christ to others we meet, at home or on holiday.

Summer reminds us that there is hope in the world, that the light within can illuminate and inspire others in God's strength.

I'd like to finish with the words of R.S. Thomas poem "The Bright field"

I have seen the sun break through to illuminate a small field for a while, and gone my way and forgotten it. But that was the pearl of great price, the one field that had treasure in it. I realise now that I must give all that I have to possess it. Life is not hurrying on to a receding future, nor hankering after an imagined past. It is the turning aside like Moses to the miracle of the lit bush, to a brightness that seemed as transitory as your youth once, but is the eternity that awaits you.



THE WANDERING CHORISTERS This month we have done several walks, but today I'm writing about our walk to Rhoson -Sea. It was raining when we started out on the 12th of July, but we decided to take a chance and go. We had a


good run through on the A55 and arrived in Rhos just after 11am. On our arrival we noticed a lot of work going on and had to divert up a road to the left of the main road which eventually brought us out onto the main road again. We parked the car, got our back packs on and started to walk through Rhos towards Colwyn Bay. It was lunch time, so we stopped to eat our picnic lunch. It wasn't raining here and we sat soaking up the sun enjoying our food. We continued our walk following the coastline towards Rhuddlan, stopping occasionally to take in the beautiful scenery. There was lots of work happening on the beach all along the coast. I just happened to see a lady who looked like an official and asked her was happening. She went on to say that they were improving the coastal defences by importing one million tonnes of sand to place on the existing



seawall. It will form the primary sea defence along a section of the coast while also being an attractive beach to enjoy. Work also included modifying a rock groyne next to Rhos harbour which will be higher and wider. The scheme also



includes improvements to the promenade, widening it to provide more space for pedestrians and cyclists. They are also upgrading the street furniture and lighting. After being enlightened by this lovely lady about what was going on we set off back to Rhos which was a long way behind us. We reached Colwyn Bay and couldn't help but divert to the shops before
