Goat Head Weed Hunt

"Coming together is a beginning, staying together is progress, and working together is success." – Henry Ford

Goathead weeds are a nasty species that thrives in rocky locations, yet is readily found in pastures and fields. The weed, also known as puncturevine, is difficult to eradicate, can poison livestock and pets, flatten bicycle tires and if you've ever stepped on it you know it's dreadful. Well, this lovely invasive plant is spreading voraciously throughout the Alturas Rotary Youth Park **and it's got to go.**



Alturas Rotarian Mike Mason presented an idea to the Club to take on the Goat Heads. His challenge was to meet at the ballfields at 7:00 am, gloved, shovel in hand and packing a trash can. Six Goat Head hunters showed up and set out on an east – west style searching for, uncovering and eliminating the offensive plants.

Within a couple of hours the eradicators covered about 10 acres and filled a front-end loader bucket full of the weeds.

In addition to the six Rotarians, Correctional Officer Swasey and 4



inmates from the local jail, cut and piled other undesirable weeds in the area adjacent to the new concessions stand in preparation of seeding for the new lawn area. Together, we, transformed the Alturas Rotary Youth Park and had fun doing it!

Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, has been nominated to become Rotary International's president for 2022-23, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organization's 115-year history.

Jones will officially become president-nominee on 1 October if no other candidates challenge her.

Jones says she sees Rotary's Action Plan as a catalyst for increasing Rotary's impact. "As we reflect upon our new strategic priorities, we could have never envisioned that *our ability to adapt* would become our North Star during what is inarguably the most profound time in recent history," Jones said in her vision statement. "Silver linings rise out of the most challenging circumstances. Using metric-driven goals, I will harness this historic landscape to innovate, educate, and communicate opportunities that reflect today's reality."

As the first woman to be nominated to be president, Jones understands how important it is to follow through on Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Statement. "I believe that diversity, equity, and inclusion ...



begins at the top and for us to realize growth in female membership and members under the age of forty — these demographics need to see their own reflection in leadership," Jones said. "I will champion double-digit growth in both categories while never losing sight of our entire family."

A current Rotary Foundation trustee, Jones has been a Rotary member since 1997 and has served Rotary as RI vice president, director, training leader, committee chair, moderator, and district governor. She played a lead role in Rotary's rebranding effort by serving as chair of the Strengthening Rotary's Advisory Group. She is the co-chair of the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee, which aims to raise \$150 million for polio eradication efforts.

Jones recently led the successful #RotaryResponds telethon, which raised critical funds for COVID-19 relief and was viewed by more than 65,000. Jones has also received Rotary International's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service. She and her husband, Nick Krayacich, are members of The Rotary Foundation's Arch Klumph Society, Paul Harris Society, and the Bequest Society.

However, once all the details were factored in Walt realized it wasn't very cost effective so he didn't pursue it any longer.

While living in Eureka, California, Walt worked for Bank of America in Ferndale and had an offer to become manager of the Alturas branch of the bank. Not knowing where Alturas was, and having only two days to decide, Walt, along with wife Kerry and 4-year old son Morgan, came to Alturas to check it out. Wanting a place with acreage to accommodate Kerry's love of horses, they were able to find the perfect home, where they still reside today. This was April 1, 1992 and needless to say, Alturas became their home.

During his youth, Walt was continually involved with Boy Scouts. In Alturas the scouting arena had dwindled to a very few interested boys and Walt was asked to take over the program. Walt visited the middle school and recruited some boys and the rest, as 'they' say, is history. Under his guidance the program grew in leaps and bounds. The Troop performed 50 mile hikes, winter survival campouts, backpacking, and learning the basics of what made a successful Boy Scout.

When Walt decided to retire from banking, he had visions of relaxing, hiking, backpacking, and taking some time to enjoy his family. By now his son had established a good life in Nome, Alaska, a place he calls home, loving the small-town attitude he grew up with. Walt and Kerry were both enmeshed in the community so they had no desire to move away. Walt was then offered a job with Edward Jones. Explaining he had no desire to leave Alturas, the agency offered to open an office here if Walt would be willing to manage it. We all know how that worked out. As many local individuals can vouch, this new venture in Walt's life has been a boon to many.

Thanks, Walt, for your contribution to Modoc County over the years. But wait, there's more! Yes, there is much more to Walt Davis. Sitting next to him during Rotary lunches, ask him about his multi-mile hike in a foreign land. Ask him about his history in Rotary. Those questions are sure to generate more, and help to know the real Walt Davis.
