

## **Works Cited page drastically simplified**

Your Works Cited page should begin on a separate page. At the top, centered, should be the epithet Works Cited.

Everything on the page is **double-spaced**. The space between the centered title Works Cited and your first entry should be **double spaced**. Your entries should be in alphabetical order in correct format for the kind of source you're using. The paragraph style should be **Hanging**—after the Works Cited centered title. Please note that for your I-searches and your Annotated Bibliography, the only elements that should be **Hanging** are the bibliographic titles themselves, not the descriptions or the Works Cited title.

I will now create a model Works Cited page after I make this page break, just as you will. I will include some marginal comments to help those who have trouble. Please note that italics, punctuation, and shorthand are all important, so you must look carefully.
