

Board of Christian Outreach

The Outreach Committee would like to thank everyone who contributed and/or participated in the **HAC Walk for Hope** on June 26th. We had an impressive number of FCC members participate in the walk and our church donated \$1,245. to the **Housing Assistance Corporation.** The mission of this nonprofit organization is to help our neighbors who need access to safe, stable housing on Cape Cod and the Islands. It was a great event!

Over the summer, the Outreach Committee met and voted to make the following donations. A donation of \$500. was made to **Habitat for Humanity,** an organization which brings people together to build homes, communities and hope. A donation of \$600 was made to **Neighborhood Falmouth.** This community-based membership organization's mission is to provide information and services that will help members live independently, safely, and com-

fortably in their own homes for as long as possible. A donation of \$500 was made to **WE CAN**, an organization which serves more than 2,400 women across Cape Cod with free and confidential legal services, employment and business support, financial empowerment, mentoring and personal development programs. A donation of \$350 (or 12 backpacks) was made to the **Falmouth Service Center** in support of their Fresh Start Back to School Program. A donation of \$1,000. was made to the **AIDS (ASGCC Services)**. This nonprofit organization operates an AIDS support program out of a van at the Falmouth Service Center. A donation of \$200. was made to **Celebrations**, an organization which provides funding for the Falmouth High School After Prom Event. A donation of \$500. was made to **No Place For Hate (Falmouth)**. The mission of this community organization is to build bridges, combat bias based on race, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, and religion and to promote respect for all people through advocacy and education. Finally, a donation of \$1,680. was made to the **Southern New England UCC Conference**. This Conference elects delegates to the General Synod which oversees the mission and ministry of the **United Church of Christ** nationally and worldwide.

Looking to the fall, we want to encourage and promote your support in the upcoming **Habitat for Humanity of Cape Cod** home being constructed in East Falmouth. We need bakers and snack volunteers to drop off snacks on Tuesday and Saturday mornings during the month of October and possibly beyond. Registration volunteers to welcome the construction folks on the designated mornings are also needed. Finally, anyone interested in helping with the construction in any way would be greatly appreciated. We'd love to have a team of volunteers from our church committing to work one or more Saturdays in October. Please contact Laura Cole or John Bowers if you are able to help in any way. As they say, "Many hands make light work.."

Lastly, September the 26th is our designated Outreach Sunday. We've invited all of our grantees to join us and share their organization's mission during the Coffee Hour. Tables will be set up in the Fellowship Hall. Please join us. This is your opportunity to learn more about the organizations we support and ask questions. Nicholas Dryer will be our guest speaker.

From Our Moderator...

A subcommittee of the Board of Deacons is preparing to lead a conversation with the congregation on Open and Affirming. I believe that before we start that process we should be aware of our present position on welcoming. The Board of Deacons developed a Welcoming Statement in 2014 that was approved by the Church Council. That statement is provided below:

The First Congregational Church of Falmouth, Mass is open to all persons who accept the obligations of membership in the Church of Jesus Christ, without any restriction as to race, class, ethnic background or sexual orientation.

We re-affirm the Mission Statement adopted by our congregation at its Fall Budget Meeting on October 20, 1996, which states: "Believing that God calls us into the Church of Jesus Christ, we invite everyone to join us in worshiping God and in ministering to one another and the world."

It is the policy of the First Congregational Church of Falmouth that our Ministers and Honorary Ministers have the authority to officiate, at their discretion, at all marriage services deemed legal in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. This includes marriage services held in our sanctuary.

In keeping with this policy, future Ministerial Search Committees should consider all candidates and present the best candidate to the congregation for a vote in accordance with the existing by-laws."

We recently developed a new mission statement that needs to be included in any new positions on this subject. John Honey, Moderator

Church Council

The Church Council met on August 18 via Zoom. Reverend Drury opened the meeting with prayer. Jonathan said the church will continue to follow state guidelines relative to COVID. John Honey has an article elsewhere in the <u>Messenger</u> regarding wearing masks in the church. Rally Day is being planned for September 12.

Greg Mills reviewed a schedule of fall events developed by the Inviting and Welcoming Initiative. The first event, Paul Revere Day on Saturday, September 25 from I-4 p.m., will celebrate the 225th anniversary of the purchase of our Paul Revere bell and include a program in the sanctuary with a guest speaker and brief guided walks of the Village Green highlighting church and town history. This event has been planned in collaboration with the Museums on the Green. Other events throughout the fall include a Blessing of the Animals; an After-Church Chowder Fest at which Ben Carnevale will speak on his newly-published book Nobska; a Solar Energy Celebration; an After-Church Chili Fest; and a talk by author Nathaniel Philbrick on his latest book Travels with George.

A subcommittee of the Deacons has been meeting to develop a plan to move our church toward a vote on becoming an Open and Affirming church. A letter will go out to the congregation in the middle of September.

The Treasurer's report showed that we are on target with member support and expenses. We are also again receiving income from rentals of our space. The Fall Budget Meeting will be on October 24.

Council then heard reports from the church boards and committees. The Cape Cod Council of Churches has an opening for a chef at its Faith Family Kitchen and a program director for its Covenant to Care for Foster Families. The annual assembly will be held on September 30 via Zoom. In September, Jonathan will begin a two-year term as president of the CCCC Board of Directors. The Board of Christian Education has convened a committee to hire a Director of Christian Education. This fall, FCC Kids will be in church for the children's message and then outside for activities. The Outreach Committee is working with Habitat for Humanity to set up volunteer opportunities at its work site in Falmouth. The Deacons will serve Communion in the traditional way, but kits will continue to be available. Offering plates will be at each entrance to the sanctuary. The choir will sing on August 29 for the first time in many months. The Bell Choir will perform at the Paul Revere Day event. Plans are being made for a Messiah Sing on December 19. The Reception Committee will continue serving punch outside through September. The Stewardship Committee has chosen the theme "Becoming Church Together in New Ways" for this year's campaign, which will emphasize gifts of time and talent as well as treasure. The campaign will begin on October 17 and culminate on Loyalty Sunday, November 7. The Trustees approved a request from the Museums on the Green to plant shrubs along our joint property line. In a separate project, the holly trees that are not in good condition in the area near the shed will be removed, and the area cleaned up. Audio/visual additions will be made to the meeting room making it a mini-conference room. The heating system project is now complete. The UCC has issued an appeal for \$100,000 to help the people of Haiti, following the massive earthquake on August 14. Funds can be sent directly to Haiti Appeal, United Church of Christ, 700 Prospect Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio 44115. The Women's Union will hold its annual meeting in October.

They would like you to know that the Council's Annual Assembly is scheduled for Thursday, September 30, and will be a virtual meeting via Zoom. The Council assists more than 7.500 low-income individuals and families in the mid-Cape area each year through its many ministries, including A Baby Center, Covenant to Care For Foster Families, Faith Family Kitchen, and several others. Our church makes regular contributions to the Council through our Outreach Committee and Women's Union. As the new board of directors is voted upon, our own Jonathan Drury will begin his two-year term as President. While only Delegates can vote, all are invited to attend the Annual Assembly; just ask Lee or Carol to arrange for you to receive the Zoom link when it becomes available.

An appeal for Haiti assistance

The United Church of Christ is issuing a call to action to help the people of Haiti. A massive 7.2 earthquake on Saturday, August 14 has killed more than 1300 people. Search and rescue efforts have been hampered by Tropical Depression Grace

which came ashore only two days later. The UCC has issued a \$100,000 appeal to help the people of Haiti. Funds can be sent directly to Haiti Appeal, United Church of Christ, 700 Prospect Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio 44115.



Covid Precautions...

We have decided to follow the guidance from the State of Massachusetts regarding protection from Covid. There is not a mask mandate from the State and therefore we do not have a mandate on the wearing of masks in our church. However, the State has provided the following guidance which is consistent with the CDC and neighboring states of Connecticut and Rhode Island which we all should be aware of.

"Effective July 30: The Department of Public Health has issued a new mask advisory in light of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's updated guidance. Fully vaccinated individuals are advised to wear a mask or face covering when indoors (and not in your own home) if you have a weakened immune system, or if you are at increased risk for severe disease because of your age or an underlying medical condition, or if someone in your household has a weakened immune system, is at increased risk for severe disease, or is an unvaccinated adult.

Here are little "thumbnail" sketches of our groups not listed elsewhere in this issue. Should you have interest, please contact the person listed for each. If a contact is not listed, please feel free to contact the church office.

Care & Connection Team – Supported by Laura Cole, our Coordinator of Care & Connection, this team reaches out to our church family through regular visits, phone calls, resources, listening, and offering prayers when needed, as well as helping to deliver poinsettia plants at Christmas and Easter lilies at Easter. This team provides an integral opportunity to support others as needs arise within our church community. They can be seen offering support to our members and friends at JML Care Center, Heritage at Falmouth, Atria Woodbriar Place, Atria Woodbriar Park, Royal Main, Royal Megansett, Cape Cod Apartments, Cape Regency, as well as other area care facilities and individual homes when members and friends can no longer attend church. Loss Support Group – This very important group meets regularly to discuss loss and to work to support one another in a non-clinical way. Loss comes in many forms and this group welcomes new members as we continue to walk in a journey of healing from loss. Contact: Laura Cole

Good Shepherd Project – The Good Shepherd Program continues in the memory of Bruce Haslun, a member of our church who encouraged us to care for one another through the cooking of meals. They continue to cook monthly to assist in preparing meals for caregivers, those who are homebound, and struggling community members who enter our church. Meals are prepared under Serve-safe supervision to ensure safe and healthful meals. This group is kept to about six people in order to work within the physical space in our kitchen. Outreach Singers – This group continues to make a significant impact on others within our church and community with their visits to the homes of members & friends as well as rehabilitation and residential facilities. Due to public health concerns, this group currently is "on hold." Contact: Bobbie Miner bobbieminer@aol.com

Bible Study/Adult Education – Typically offered on a seasonal basis, groups are led by both clergy and lay volunteers. Topics in the past have included a group reading of *Our Town* and an extensive examination of *Paradise Lost*. Contact: Rev. Jonathan Drury – minister@firstcongfalmouth.org

Youth Group – Currently structured for grades 4 - 8, youth meet monthly on a Sunday to engage in fellowship and fun activities while exploring expression of their faith.


Due to Covid concerns, a start date has not yet been established for the PLAYTIME group.

These items were brought to our attention by Olivia White who asked that they be included.

Rev. Herold Wilke, a pioneer for American Disability Act:

July 26, 2021 was the 31st anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The ADA was created as a civil rights law to prohibit discrimination based on disability. It also required the employers to provide reasonable accommodation and accessibility in the workplace.

Today we take ADA for granted forgetting the work of many who made this possible. One of those at the forefront of this movement was the late Reverend Harold Wilke, an ordained minister and national leader of the United Church of Christ. Born without arms in 1915 on a farm in Washington MO, Wilke learned to use his feet like most people use their hands to wash himself, feed himself and even write holding his pen with his foot. Rev. Wilky worked, along with others, to insure that people with disabilities like his would have the same rights as other people. His efforts started back in 1986 with the National Council on Disability



where he was instrumental in drafting the language of the bill presented to the House and Senate in 1988 that later became law.

On July 26, 1990 when President George H. W. Bush signed ADA into law, Rev. Herold Wilke was invited to the White House for the official signing ceremony. President Bush gave him one of the pens he used to sign the law. Herold held out his foot to receive the pen. The United Church Christ celebrates the life and dedication of our former pastor, leader and a champion of justice for all people with disabilities.

Juanita Helphrey, a pioneer for racial justice for Native Americans, protested the name of the "Cleveland Indians"

Juanita Helphrey was a member of the Executive Council of United Church of Christ in 1990's. She was Native American and affiliated with three tribes: Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara. Juanita lived most of her life on the Fort Berthold reservation in North Dakota. She moved to Cleveland, Ohio when she began working for the Justice and Witness Ministries of the United Church of Christ.

Juanita was instrumental in getting the UCC staff and friends to fight for justice by picketing at the Cleveland Brown's stadium at the start of every baseball season demanding a change to the team's name and the Chief Wahoo logo. The Cleveland Browns' stadium is located next to the national office of the United Church of Christ in downtown Cleveland. She was joined by many people with banners and picket signs at the gate of the stadium. A visionary and champion for racial justice and the dignity of Native Americans, her decade long fight came to an end on July 23, 2021 when the team an-



nounced its new name, "Cleveland Guardians", a reference to a Cleveland landmark. Juanita passed away January 9, 2018 and could not share the good news of the fruits of her labor. Rest in Peace Juanita, a true pioneer for racial justice.
