

## Inviting and Welcoming

As announced in last month's Messenger, the newly launched Inviting & Welcoming Initiative is moving ahead with plans for our church to host a series of community events in the summer and fall, with the ultimate aim of attracting prospective new members. I'd like to inform you of one exciting event that we've already scheduled for September.

This fall will mark the 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the church's purchase from Paul Revere of our historic church bell. We're now planning a "Paul Revere Day" celebration for Saturday, September 25, from 1 to 4pm. Those attending the event can take a brief walking tour of the Village Green area, view the church's framed copy of the receipt signed by Paul Revere in November 1796.

Other activities inside the church may feature Jonathan speaking about some of our church's notable ministers (including Katharine Lee Bates' father), a dramatic reading of Katharine Lee Bates' poem about the Revere bell, music performed by John Dulina and our handbell choir, and bell-shaped cookies baked by the children of the church.

And remember that an essential ingredient in the success of our Inviting & Welcoming Initiative will be YOUR involvement in inviting a friend or neighbor to join you in attending an upcoming community event or Sunday service. ## Church Council

The Church Council held its fourteenth meeting via Zoom on May 19. In Reverend Drury's absence, Evelyn Johnson offered the opening prayer.

The first portion of the meeting was devoted to discussing the reopening of the church and what changes might be made when current restrictions are removed as of May 29.

Prior to the May 23 service, advertisements were placed in the Enterprise, in the kiosk at Town Hall Square, on WCAI radio, and on a sandwich board in front of the church. At this service, singing with masks on will be permitted. With visitors being encouraged, questions were raised about how best to welcome them and to follow up on the first visit. The greatest area of confusion surrounds the wearing of masks after the May 29 date. Council may schedule a special meeting to discuss this issue when more details become available.

Greg Mills said the Inviting and Welcoming Initiative work group will be collaborating with the Museums on the Green to celebrate the 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the purchase of our Paul Revere bell. A special event is scheduled for September 25.

Bob Johnson showed a PowerPoint of the steeple corbel issues. An assessment will be done to determine the scope of necessary repairs, which could possibly be a three year project.

Council then heard reports from the church boards and committees. The Cape Cod Council of Churches held a virtual auction fundraiser earlier this month. Nineteen kids in the FCC Kids program will be receiving books and the older youth will receive gift cards, thanks to a collaboration between Julie Fitzpatrick of the Board of Christian Education and Eight Cousins bookshop. On Sunday the 23<sup>rd</sup> the kids will be in church for a children's message by Reverend Drury and then will go outdoors for activities. The Outreach Committee, together with the North Falmouth church, assembled sixteen buckets with emergency cleaning supplies for the Church World Service project. A monetary donation of more than \$500 was also given to the CWS. The annual Housing Assistance Corporation Walk for Hope will be held on June 26. It will be a virtual walk this year. Look for information elsewhere in the Messenger on how to sign up to be part of Team FCC. The Deacons are discussing how the offering will be collected and how communion will be served once the church is fully reopened. The Music Committee is considering having recitals with singing once a month in July, August, and September. The Reception Committee will be serving punch outdoors following the Sunday services. Stewardship will begin meeting in June to plan for this fall's campaign. The Trustees are awaiting the final punch list on the heating system, so the project can be finalized. Our UCC delegate Bobbie Miner attended a meeting of the Barnstable Association at which two ministers spoke on the Post Pandemic Church. Our Southern New England Conference Minister, the Reverend Darrell Goodwin, addressed a conference meeting which our delegate Meg Becker attended. Eighteen people attended the May Women's Union meeting to hear a presentation by Ed Jackson. Women's Union will meet again in June. Marcia Young, Clerk

The Outreach Committee would like to thank everyone who helped to make the **Bucket Brigade** a success. We are happy to report that, in cooperation with the North Falmouth Congregational Church, we were able to deliver 16 buckets to Brockton, where the buckets are collected for the Church World Service. Cash contributions from our church netted \$765.20. We will forward this additional money to the Church World Service.

We also continue to seek participants for our **FCC Team** for the annual **HAC Walk for Hope** on Saturday, June the 26th. The **Housing Assistance Corporation's** third annual **Walk for Hope** on June 26th will give you the opportunity to walk to help our neighbor's most in need access to safe, stable housing on Cape Cod and the Islands. Whether you walk as an individual or a team, you'll be offering hope. You can walk wherever and whenever you want or as part of the group on the day of June 26. Families are encouraged to participate. We **hope** to get a group of people to walk together from the Green on June 26th, as the **FCC Team (approx. 2 miles)**. You may wonder if our donation dollars make a difference? Here's an example of how they do. The Outreach Committee contributed to the **No Guff in Falmouth, April 12-16, 2021**, this past spring. The No Guff Committee recently sent us a thank you note stating, "Your support contributed to the production of a video that highlighted the history of this home-grown celebration of kindness....The video will be shown widely throughout the community, including the entire Falmouth Public Schools family, FCTV'S **Falmouth in Focus**, and social media. We have included the First Congregational Church as a sponsor in the credits."

During the month of May, the Outreach Committee met and voted to make the following donations. A donation of \$700 was made to the **Fairwinds Clubhouse**, whose mission is to provide opportunities for friendship, support, employment and education to people with psychiatric disabilities who live on upper Cape Cod. A donation of \$2,000 was made to the **Falmouth Service Center**. The mission of the **Falmouth Service Center** is to ease stress, reduce hunger and improve quality of life for our neighbors in need. Some of the programs the **Falmouth Service Center** provides are the Food Pantry, the Fuel Assistance Program, Fresh Start Backpack Program, Falmouth Eats Together and the Thanksgiving and Holiday Toy Programs. A donation of \$250 was made to **The Massachusetts Council of Churches**. The mission of this organization is to make the vibrant church visible through education, ecumenical worship, dialogue, denominational interdependence and social justice. Finally, a donation of \$1,000. was made to the **SNEUCC**. This **United Church of Christ Conference** oversees the ministry of the UCC church regionally, nationally and worldwide.
