It was a beautiful June afternoon in 1950. Jimmy Devlin and I were putting around the Wethersfield Cove in my motorboat. Jimmy suggested we check out the action at the town dock. We pulled up to the dock and there was the prettiest girl I had ever seen. I said, “Hi, I’m Bucky Cody” and she responded sweetly, “Hi, I’m Marilyn Woods.” So began 70 years together, 62 of them as husband and wife, on an amazing journey, the memories of which I want to share with the many whose lives Marilyn may have touched. So let’s travel together down memory lane.

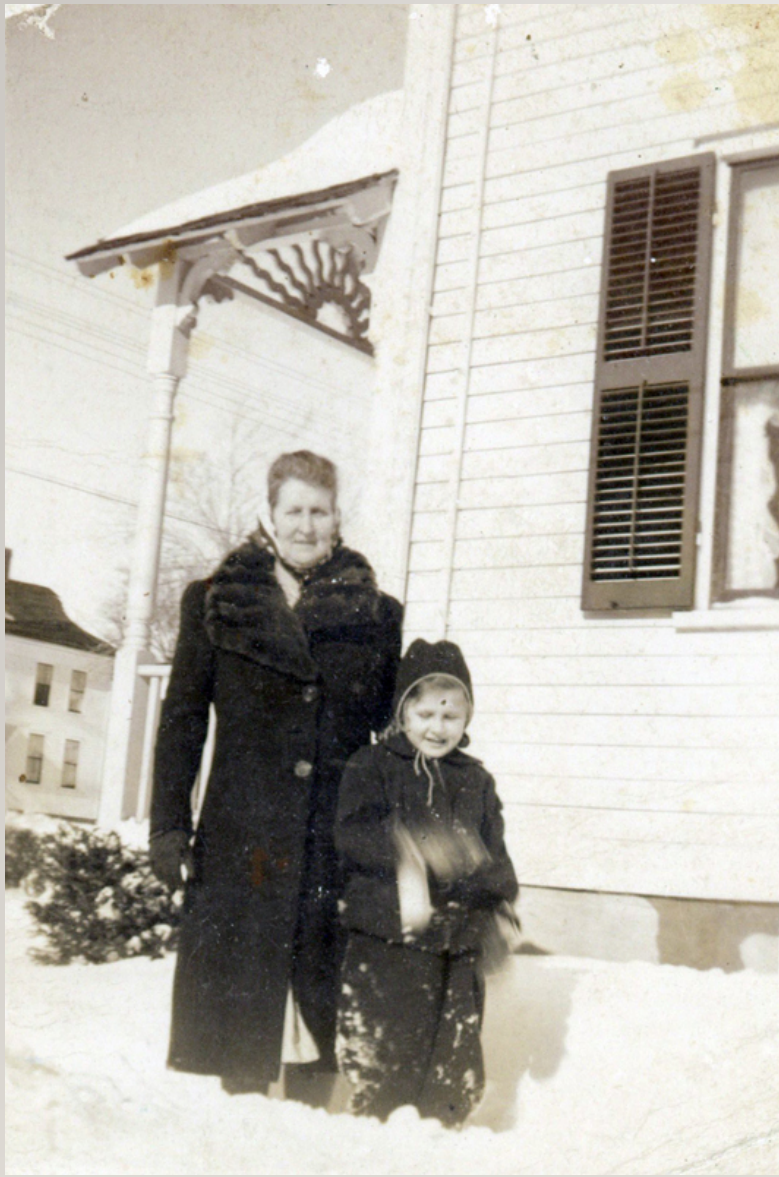

Marilyn entered the world on August 19, 1935 at 4:45 AM, at Hartford Hospital. She was the youngest of 6 children and the daughter of John Thomas Woods and Bertha Osborne Woods. She had 3 sisters, Myrtle, Dorothy and Joan, and two brothers, John and Thomas, all of which, as of 2020, have passed away, except for Joan, who is still living.

Marilyn grew up living at the family home in historic old Wethersfield, 456 Main St, with her parents and 5 brothers and sisters. Her father immigrated from Ireland as a teenager in search of the American Dream. John Woods founded a successful house painting business in Wethersfield providing for his family, all of whom went on to be successful, responsible citizens, the perfect example of the American Dream. When you consider the early days of his business was during the Depression, it is even more remarkable. It is reported the Woods house, in the 1800's, was used as a halfway house for slaves escaping from the south to Canada.

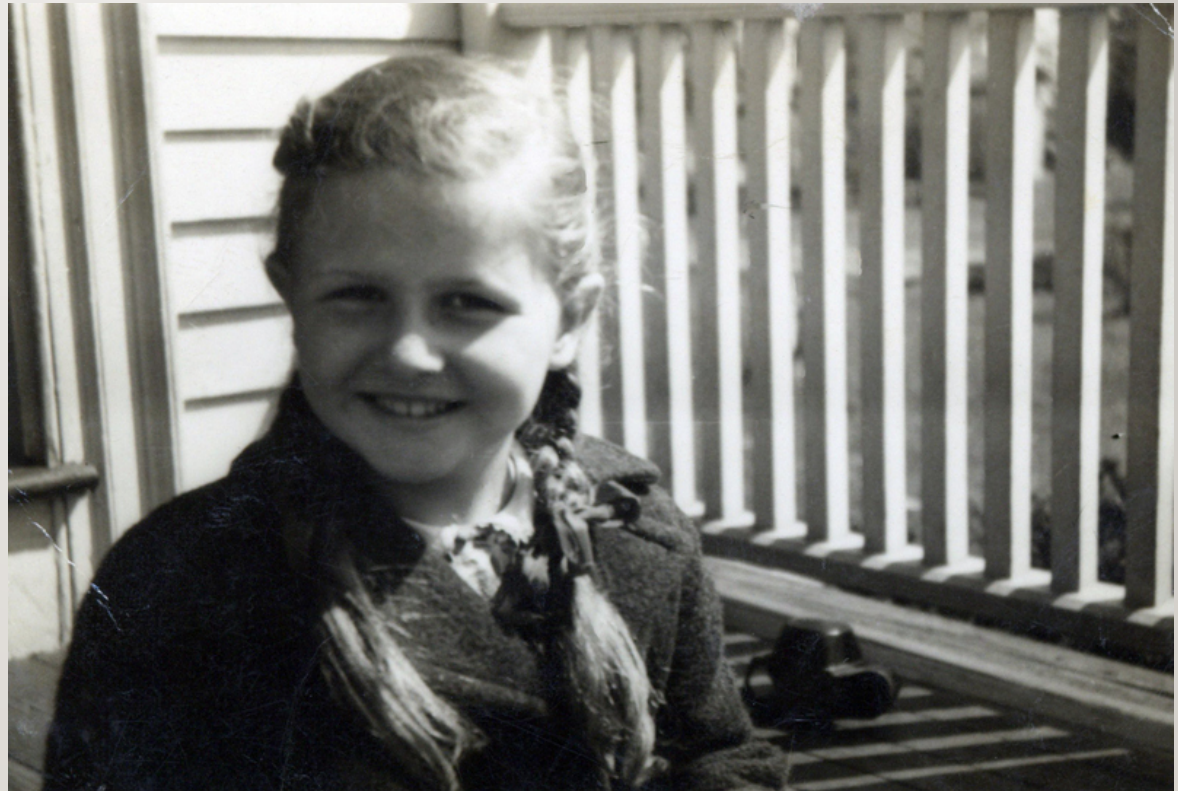


Marilyn was a picture-perfect child and teenager, at least that's what she told me, growing up in a loving family. She attended Stillman Grammar School and completed the 7th through 12th grades at the Wethersfield High School, graduating in 1953. With 6 children in the household, two of them with their spouses, it was quite a challenge for the family, but they made it work, representing a perfect example of a perfect American family. How Marilyn loved the doll house that her father built for her.

Marilyn worked her way through Mount Ida Junior College as a live-in nanny for a prominent Boston family. She was the youngest of a chain of six Woods children, all but one working their way through college, quite an achievement. Johnny, second oldest, spent his college years fighting for the USA during World War II. I have always been so proud of being part of such a remarkable American family.

Back to the Fifty's when Bucky, later shortened to Buck, entered the picture at the Wethersfield town dock. Marilyn and Buck dated steadily that first Summer and during Buck's following senior High School year. Lots of boating, walking Marilyn home from Buck's side of the cove to Marilyn's side, movies at the Webb Theater at 25¢ a ticket and occasional special trip to Hartford for a movie at the Lowes Poli Theatre, followed by pizza at the Pizza Palace.



I remember the first time Marilyn met my family. One day during our first summer I told her I was going to Old Saybrook for a two-week vacation at my family's cottage, the Red Cottage for those of you in the know. Marilyn quickly replied, "what a coincidence, I'm going to Saybrook those same two weeks to visit my sister, Dorothy". I later learned that she rushed home and phoned Dotty, who lived in Old Saybrook, to arrange a visit. I clearly remember introducing Marilyn to my family. The family had been buzzing, Bucky has a girlfriend. When the family met Marilyn, they couldn't believe that shy Bucky got the prettiest and nicest girl they had ever seen. Marilyn fit right in. She had a remarkable talent for meeting people because of her grace and easy-going manner.

Holidays were with the family and summers were spent working and at the shore. Summers at the shore were special with Wayne Orsie, Harvey Peterson, Dick Keller, Jimmy Devlin and their girlfriends. Although separated by school and other distractions, there was something magical that always brought Marilyn and I back together. Could it have been love?

We both graduated from college in 1956 and began our first full time jobs, me in the U.S. Navy and Marilyn as an American Airlines flight attendant, a sought after and glamorous job in those days. Marilyn was based in New York City and I was based in Portsmouth, Virginia. Although we only saw each other infrequently the next two years and both dated others, our bond continued strong and the few times we were together was as though we were never apart. It was during this period Marilyn had her first claim to fame. She was the flight attendant on an AA flight carrying John F. Kennedy, candidate for President. The newspaper published a photograph of Kennedy at the bottom of an off-ramp. At the top of the stairs were the legs of the flight attendant, Marilyn Woods.

Although there have been numerous great weddings within Marilyn's and my families, I would like to focus on three.

What a fantastic wedding Marilyn planned for us. The wedding was at the Wethersfield Congregational Church. It included a formal ceremony, numerous beautiful bridesmaids and handsome groomsmen in their formal tuxedos. Marilyn's sister Joan was maid of honor and my father, in absence of my brother who was at National Guard camp, was best man. It was a beautiful, sunny, but windy fall day and the colors were glorious. I remember it as the most beautiful wedding I had ever attended but, of course I was biased.



There was one minor hitch in the wedding ceremony, which Marilyn told me about later. When she was walking down the aisle, she looked at me and my face was all red and blotchy. My mother had sent Marilyn to bed early the night before to rest up for the busy following day. When Marilyn saw my face, she assumed I had partied while she was sleeping. The truth was I had packed my razor the night before and had to borrow one before the wedding, a razor that didn't like my face.

I also had a night job at Friendly's Ice Cream washing dishes and Marilyn had \$2,000 saved from her job at American Airlines, so we bought a new house in Bloomfield, CT for \$17,500. Jennifer was born there in January 1962. We had a good life in Bloomfield with friends and family. Marilyn joined the Kiwi Club, retired American Airlines flight attendants. They had great parties. She also worked for AA doing travel packing demonstrations, compensated in space available airline passes, which proved to be a great benefit.

In December 1964 I came home and told Marilyn we were being transferred to Minneapolis. I was told I was going to the Quad Cities which I assumed was Minneapolis (Twin Cities). Being from Connecticut, I never heard of Davenport-Bettendorf-Rock Island-Moline-E. Moline. As a salesman traveling 5 states, I was away 75% of the time so Marilyn had a challenge raising two preschool children without a lot of help from me. She was terrific.

Davenport, Iowa was not our favorite place to live, but there were lots of young families like us amongst the cornfields. Marilyn surprised me with a 30th birthday party. When I returned, the rec room had become a Caribbean beach. What a blast. Business was good so Marilyn traded in her old VW Beetle for the latest design VW Karmann Ghia.

Then suddenly, off to Los Angeles to a new assignment. It was some trip, the four of us in the car, Karmann Ghia in tow, across the country, arriving in L.A. in the pouring rain. L.A. vs. the Quad Cities is quite a contrast. In accordance with standard operating procedure, Marilyn picked out a house, a neat place in Palos Verdes Peninsula, and moved us in. It was an exciting four years. My job again included a lot of traveling so you can imagine how tough it was on Marilyn, but, as always, she stepped right up to the challenge. The family returned to the Connecticut shore for the month of July and I spent my 2 weeks vacation joining them.



We loved our life in California. We attended the movie premiere of Isadora Duncan and sat behind Clint Eastwood. We literally danced with the stars at the after party in Hollywood. At a charity event, Marilyn chummed up to an older lady who insisted on introducing us to her husband. She said, "Meet Jimmy Doolittle." We were really impressed to say the least. Kiwi parties were fun, retired AA flight attendants who really knew how to party. I remember when a neighbor, Fred Schaus, who was general manager of the L.A. Lakers, worked with Marilyn to have a challenge basketball scrimmage at half time between the retired AA flight attendants and retired UA flight attendants. The pretty girls really dressed up and put on quite a show. Marilyn sat on Andy Williams lap who had a court side seat. The fans stayed in their seats, rather than buying beer and hot dogs, to watch the pretty girls run up and down the court.



L.A. was great; family visits to Disneyland, Marineland, Knotts Berry Farm, restaurants, the beach, Las Vegas, Palm Springs, San Francisco and never-ending things to do with people who really know how to live.

It was in California Marilyn learned her famous “wide mouth frog” joke and I learned my spoon trick. As far as Marilyn’s joke goes, it was her delivery that made it hilarious. As far as my spoon trick goes, referring to the following photograph, you can see what Marilyn thought of it.

We bought the red cottage in Old Saybrook from my father, so it was family summers in Indiantown. Marilyn and I had learned tennis in California, belonging to the Jack Kramer tennis club, learning from Vic Braden and members including the Austin family (Win played with Tracy Austin). We became enthusiastic tennis players in Avon. Marilyn was quite good. What she lacked in strength and power she made up for in grace and coordination. Her smooth swing carried over to golf in later years, sort of slow motion with minimal power. Marilyn sort of attended President George H.W. Bush's inaugural ball. Our neighbor's daughter married a Bush so the neighbor was invited to the ball. She went in a gown borrowed from Marilyn.

Back to Connecticut in 1983. This time we settled in easily. We had friends and family all around us. Win was in college and Jennifer entered her high school senior year. She was a real trooper, electing to move with her family in her senior year rather than finishing up in North Carolina. Marilyn picked out a house, on the contemporary side this time, in Simsbury. Marilyn met Sally Huber who owned a jewelry store. As I recall, Sally had three employees, Marilyn, Marsha and Jennifer. Marilyn was paid in costume jewelry, which is how she accumulated her vast inventory of costume jewelry. As I previously mentioned, Marilyn was great with people. Jennifer said, my mom was one of the best salespersons I ever knew. If a customer was served by her, they never left the store empty handed. I remember the time Marilyn invited a sales clerk she met in a store to our Thanksgiving dinner, because she was new to the area. With Marilyn there were always surprises, but they were good ones.



Marilyn could take care of herself. I remember the time she was accompanying me on a business trip to Japan, followed by a convention in Arizona. We stored the Arizona bags in an airport locker to pick up after returning from Japan and I had the key. Marilyn was traveling on a space available pass earned doing public relations work for American Airlines. Wouldn't you know it, there was no space available, so I left for Tokyo leaving Marilyn standing in the terminal with locked up suitcases, no key and no reservations for the next 4 days. When I returned to the U.S. the locker was empty and I found Marilyn at the John Gardner's Tennis Ranch in Scottsdale Arizona. When I got there, she introduced me to her tennis partner, Joe Coors. As I told you, Marilyn knew how to take care of herself and how to meet people. It was a great four years, both Win and Jen in college and Win starting his first job. However, the company was sold so we were off to a new job for the 8th time.

Because Pratt & Whitney was sold, I moved on to a company outside the Colt Industry umbrella, Kearney & Trecker Corporation. Milwaukee turned out to be a great small city and a wonderful place to live. Marilyn picked out a former beer baron's mansion on Lake Drive. There were lots of them from the old days, but not currently in demand, and often in disrepair. With the help of a former Kiwi friend, Marilyn renovated and redecorated the place, returning it to the grandeur of years past. It was a special experience living there. Marilyn became friends with Irene Hoyer who owned an event planning business. Irene provided much of the decoration for Win's and Linda's 1988 wedding.



While in Milwaukee I remember a phone call from Linda in 1992 saying our first grandchild, Helene, was on the way. Little did we know then of the tragedy to happen 16 years later when Helene suddenly left us as a result of a brain aneurysm. It was the saddest moment in our lives.

As it was with my former company, the Milwaukee company was sold, so were off to my last job in Alexandria, MN.

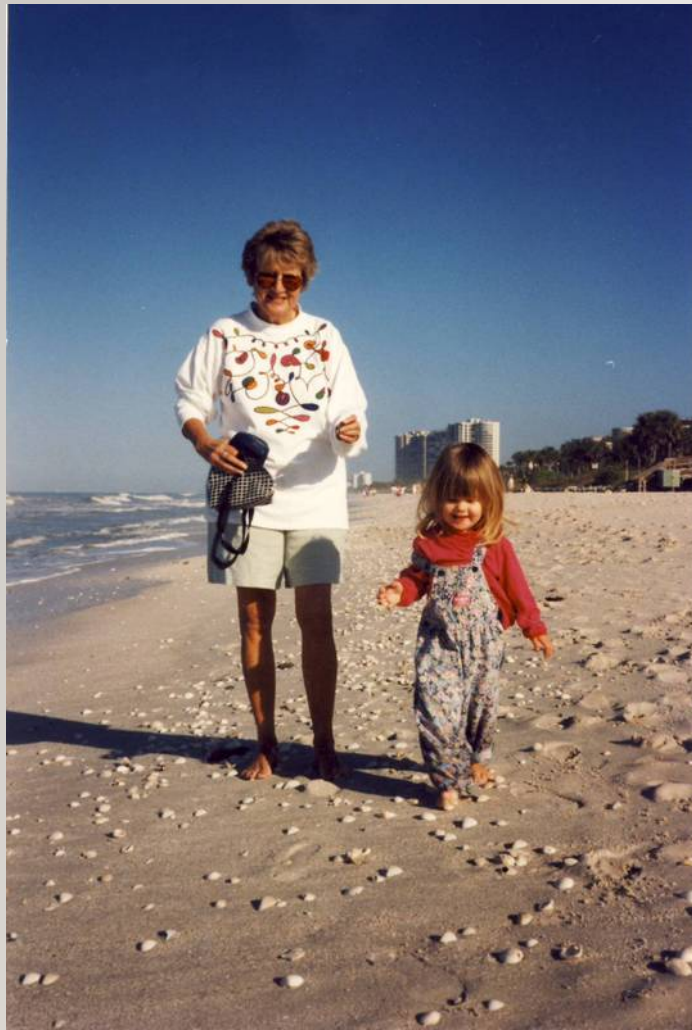

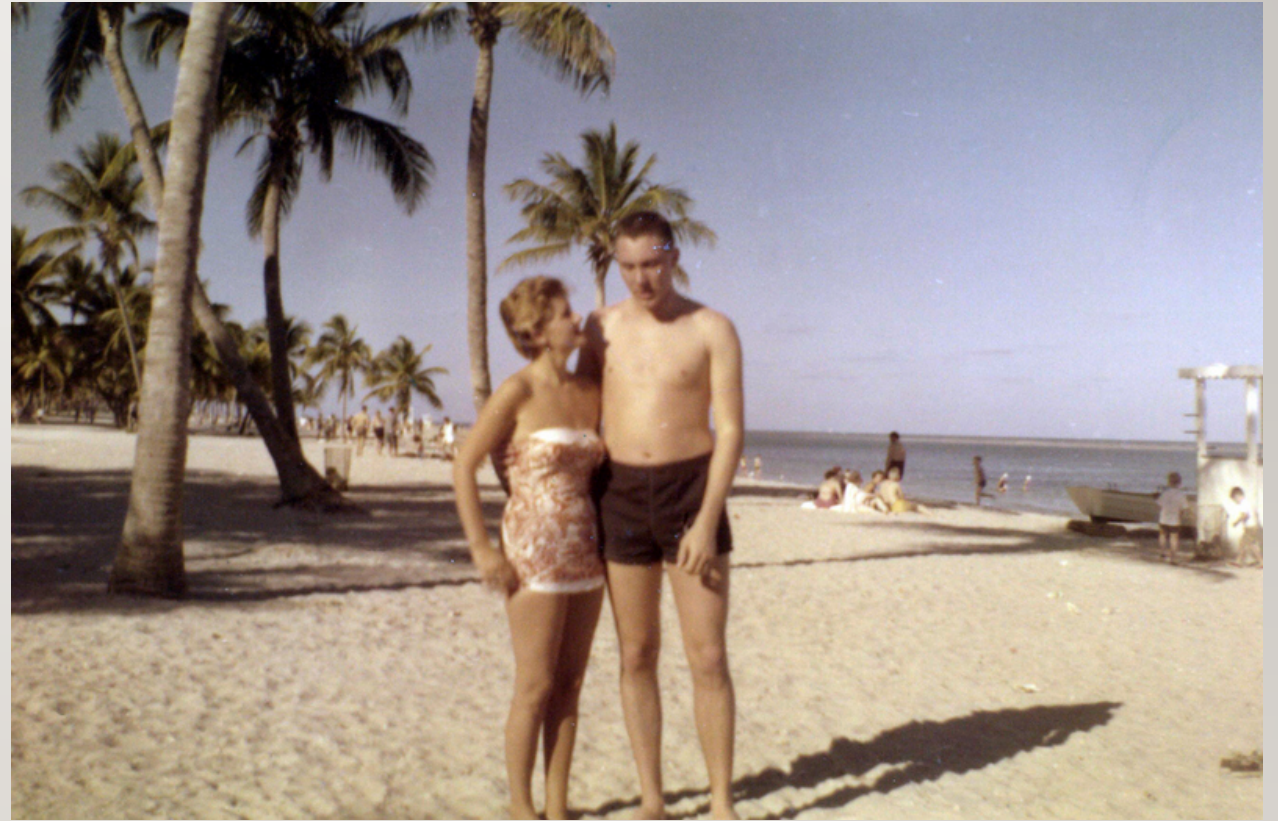
