

Fixing to Help March 1, 2022



Welcome! Thank you so much for supporting our mission to promote pet wellness. There are so many wonderful things I'd like to tell you about our families, our friends, and our donors. **They're the**heart of this program and Lin is a perfect example.

Lin is disabled and barely makes do on her low income. She'd rescued a mama cat and her "teenage" son. They'd been hanging around the neighborhood much more than ever. It turns out that their so-called family had moved and left them to fend for themselves. They were in rough shape.



Mama cat was something of a neighborhood fixture. She'd been pregnant at least six times that Lin could recall. Yet, Lin rarely saw any kittens. She feared they probably didn't make it.









Lin was so relieved to be able to give Mama and Sonny the warm, loving home they deserved. But things wen't downhill <u>fast</u>. Mama was in heat again. And Sonny was determined to offer his services. Lin wasted no time putting them in separate rooms!

That did <u>not</u> go well. They wailed. They scratched the doors...and the spraying! "It was AWFUL," Lin said. "I couldn't make them stop. I couldn't sleep. And I had no way to get them fixed!"



Lin faced two nightmarish choices: Let Mama and Sonny out of their separate rooms to fuel a population explosion of inbred kittens or banish Sonny, sending him back outdoors and into survival mode.

Without your help, low-income dog owners would have had nowhere to turn for financial help. New this year, the clinic now requires a \$20.00 refundable deposit to hold dog appointments and discourage no-shows.



Challenges to Tackle

- Fewer than half of our pets get fixed.
- The wait for appointments is 1-3 months for cats,
 4-5 months for dogs. More providers are needed.
- We cannot provide transportation to and from appointments.

Pantry Partner Program

Thanks to donations for printing and postage costs, our flyers are heading to more than 60 food pantries throughout Onondaga County. Neighbors receiving these flyers have already begun to call to register their pets. We can't wait for the day when more in-person contact is possible.

Pet Wellness/Vaccination Clinics



We worked with fellow animal welfare groups to offer basic pet wellness/vaccination clinics to low-income pet owners.

Our efforts fell short. We could not find veterinary staff available to participate in the clinics. The pressures and time constraints imposed by Covid have left veterinary practices overbooked and understaffed. We're hanging tight to the dream.

Advocacy

Thanks to strong public response to our call for help and to close collaboration with several animal advocacy groups, we successfuly convinced the Syracuse Police Department to maintain their animal cruelty investigative services.



We collaborated to explore ways in which Onondaga County can address the lack of low-cost pet wellness services for low- income residents. This initiative requires further study and public input.

I can't handle that!


He's my emotional support dog. He has to get neutered.

How We Got to Where We Are

As eager as we were to start fundraising, we could not ask for donations or even open a checking account until 12 months ago. That's when the IRS notified us that Fixing to Help had been certified as a public charity.

These past 12 months saw three major shifts:



The incredible startup funding from our two anonymous donors ended in June - as expected. They are why Fixing to Help exists today. We will never be able to thank them enough for that and for helping more than 700 pets get spayed or neutered.



Public donations began trickling in, although slowly. Even so, donors packed a punch - covering surgeries for 53 waiting pets. Unfortunately, it was not enough to keep us afloat.



The Pet Wellness Fund, maintained by The Community Foundation of Herkimer and Oneida Counties was a lifesaver. The fund awarded Fixing to Help \$30,000. Without these charitable grants, we would have closed down.







Individual donations accounted for 15% of our income, charitable grants 85%. We must do a better job of engaging animal lovers in Central New York in our life-saving mission.

Our pets rely on their help.



Lin's friends told her about Fixing to Help and of course she qualified. She lives in Onondaga County and receives benefits due to her disability and low income.

Lin's troublesome twosome were fixed - thanks to the kindness of our donors. They recuperated at home and then the time came to reunite them. Lin was a little nervous about how it was going to go after all these weeks of chaos.



Her delightful phone message said it best:

"Life is different here. It's so much better! It's like I have two different cats. They're so CALM . . . and I got to sleep for 12 hours!

"I was so afraid I was going to have to throw him outside – and now he is NEVER going outside! Your organization is a godsend."

To that I can only say that it's our donors, friends, and families who are the godsends and the true heart of Fixing to Help.

On a clear, cold November morning 3 1/2 years ago, a little Yorkie turned Fixing to Help's dream into a reality. Since her spay that day, 1159 dogs and cats have been spayed or neutered, thanks to generous gifts totaling more than \$92,000.

This report is sincerely and gratefully dedicated to our families and their pets, our friends, our veterinary providers, and our donors. You've enriched so many deserving lives.
















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
