

SOME HIGHLIGHTS OF POSITIVE NEWS

'Flights are safest mode of travel'

New Delhi: When flights resume and you take to the skies again, do not panic



when someone on the rows ahead or behind you sneezes or coughs. There is minimal

risk of Covid-19 — assuming the person sneezing or coughing is an undiagnosed infected and is wearing a mask—finding its way to you by transmission through air inside the cabin, according to European aerospace major Airbus. The aircraft manufacturer says its cabin airflow and filtration systems virtually rule out airborne transmission of contaminants like Covid-19 on flights.

To be sure while airborne transmission has been ruled out, Airbus reiterates everyone onboard must follow heightened norms of hygiene like disinfecting hands and wearing masks, decontamination of surfaces and

controlled boarding to ensure that the virus does not spread through surfaces of common touchpoints like lavatory doorknobs. The mandate for facial covering should keep you safe even if the person next to you sneezes or coughs.

"The air inside an aircraft is extremely clean due to three reasons and air travel therefore remains the safest mode of transport. There is no airflow between front and back or left and right," Anand Stanley, Airbus (India and South Asia) president and MD, told TOI.

"First, airflow in an aircraft happens only from top to bottom and air is sucked out at the bottom of the floor which does not happen on any mode of surface transport. Second, air is recycled every 2 to 3 minutes and finally the air passes through hep a filters that can keep even PM 2.5 particles out. Coronavirus is relatively bigger in size," he explained. "These three factors make air inside the cabin clean and safe."

LIFE IN QUARANTINE

A nurse and her son's long wait to return home

NEW DELHI: Among the few words her two-year-old can utter are 'mumma' and 'papa'.

Huddled close on a hospital bed, the mother springs up and makes a video call to her husband whenever her child says 'papa'

"My boy hasn't learnt how to speak yet, but he understands that the man on the mobile screen is his father.' says the child's 29-year-old mother.

The woman and her son have both been quarantined at a city hospital for 19 days ever since they tested positive for Covid-19. She works as a nurse at another hospital. where one of the doctors had tested positive for the virus on April 7.

At the quarantine centre, for a lot of time when they are awake, the mother holds her

mobile phone in front of her two-year-old so that he can watch cartoons. "He is a very active child. But he hasn't troubled me at all here despite facing issues with his food and milk," the woman said.

"Our hospital wasn't even treating or screening Covid patients, so I don't know how he (the doctor) got infected. But once he tested positive, all of us who were in contact with him had to undergo tests, said the woman, who doesn't want either the hospital she works, or where she is admitted to be identified. Soon after, she and some other healthcare workers tested positive.

An official from the hospital administration says they still haven't been able to pinpoint how the doctor tested positive, despite not treating any Covid patients.

In any case, this nurse thought that she was safe as neither were there any cases at her hospital, nor had anyone been tested. So, she didn't feel the need to keep her child away from her at home.

But soon, she and her son tested positive while her husband tested negative.

The two were allotted a hospital room, but the facility is nowhere close to what the nurse would have liked. "My child is used to getting milk around 11am. I can survive till 2 pm with just a packet of biscuits, but I can't expect my child to," she says.

For the last two days, she says, there has been no milk. "I am using packed milk that my friends brought us and heating it up in an electric kettle that I had brought along,"

She fears that the kettle may not stop working. "Anytime the kettle makes a sound, I worry it will malfunction,' she says. "The initial few days, the hospital staff wouldn't let anyone bring anything for us. I am a nurse

myself, but the hospital staff would look at me as if I committed a crime by getting infected. But thankfully they allowed the milk when we needed it," she says.

The mother and son sleep on the same bed. Unlike earlier, she says, she doesn't feel like watching films on her mobile phone. Family members keep calling her. "Though it worries me that my child is sick, he is the reason I am able to survive the

quarantine," she said.
The nurse did have a little fever around the time she tested positive, but her son hasn't displayed any symptoms. "My only prayer is that he remains asymptomatic,'

she says.

She says she is getting to spend valuable time with her son, though she misses her husband. "I'll teach my child to speak a few more words by the time he gets to actually

2,400km to help sister fight cancer

NEW DELHI: Debeshwari Ch. 49, had to reach the National Capital Region (NCR) centred on Delhi from Imphal, the capital of Manipur, to donate bone marrow for transplant to her cancer-stricken sister. To do so, she travelled by car for four days, covering a distance of 2,409 km, accompanied by her daughter and brother-inlaw, arriving in Delhi on April 22.

Hersister, Ch Ningolee, 55, had been brought to Fortis Memorial Research Institute in the last week of January for the treatment of acute myeloid leukaemia, a type of blood cancer in which excess production of immature white blood cells affects normal blood production. "She had highrisk cancer, where the mortality is 100% if a bone marrow transplant is not done. We had to get her to remission-less than 5% of the leukaemia cells surviving before the transplant could be done. well to the third one. It was after the lockdown when we informed the family that she was in a condition to undergo a transplant,' said Dr Rahul Bhargava of the Institute of Blood Disorders and Bone Marrow Transplant.

Debeshwari was informed on April7about the improvement in her sister's condition. The family decided to wait another week until the first phase of what turned out to be an extended lockdown was lifted on April 15.

"We had booked flights for April 15, However, by April 13 or so there was talk about the extension of the lockdown, so we approached the state government. We asked if she could hitch a ride on the cargo planes, but permission was refused. That is when we tweeted and received a lot of support from a lot of people and government agencies," said Vilina L, Debeshwari's daughter.

Under the lockdown, only two people are allowed to travel in a car but the family received permission for five-two drivers and three family members - as they had to cover a long distance. The doctors gave Ningolee another round of chemotherapy to ensure she remained healthy during the wait for her sister's arrival.

"Because of the lockdown, there weren't any hotels or restaurants open on the way. We had to map the travel meticulously. The district authorities got in touch with the local police and the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF), who arranged for our stay in hotels and guest houses on the way. We were scared and anxious about travelling such a long distance, espe cially in the hilly terrains of the Northeast, but the authorities met us at every step of the way, checking in on how we were doing," said Vilina.

Lunch was provided on the way by an NGO. After reaching Gurugram on April 22, Debeshwari underwent a Covid-19 test, which returned negative on Saturday. Monday on, she will receive injections to prepare her for the bone marrow donation. The injections force the bloodforming cells into the blood, which is then collected using a process called apheresis, in which a machine separates the components of the blood, collects the required cells, and pushes the rest back into the body.

She is an allogenic donor, meaning that she is a genetic match for her sister. "We had counselled the family about the risk of undergoing a transplant during the Covid-19 pandemic. However, the risk of the disease was more than that of Covid-19 and the family decided to proceed with the treatment," said Dr Meet Kumar, consultant haematologist and bone marrow transplant physician at the hospital.




TRAVELLING PAST THE PANDEMIC





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
