Letter from the President

During the past few weeks we have undergone several major frightening events – Halloween, a blue moon (2^{nd} full moon in a month, and this one falling on Halloween!), end of Daylight Saving Time, world-wide pandemic, and a national election. Spotted Lantern Fly

On Tuesday, October 27, 2020 the Ohio Department of Agriculture announced that a new invasive insect has been found in the state. The Spotted Lanternfly was found in mid-October in Jefferson County, close to Steubenville, Ohio. The location of the population is about 250 miles from Butler County. While this may seem far away, it is important to be aware of emerging invasives as early identification can be key to slowing spread.



We have seen the impacts of other invasive insects in our area. Perhaps the most talked about is the emerald ash borer which has had a devastating effect on our ash tree populations and has changed the appearance of many wood lots throughout the state. Others you may know include the Asian long horned beetle, a threat to maple trees in particular, or the gypsy moth which can cause defoliation of oaks and other trees. Like these other invasive insects, the spotted lanternfly is a threat to the timber industry and well-balanced forest ecosystems. However, the insect prefers grapes and fruit trees becoming a cause for concern for wineries and fruit producers. Interestingly, the insect is also attracted to a common invasive plant, tree-of-heaven.

Now is a great time to spot the spotted lanternfly as it lays its eggs from October into early winter. Eggs can be found on the trunk and branches of medium to large sized trees and on other surfaces such as stones and structures. Egg masses look similar to a grey mud substance and may take on a cracked or dried out appearance over time. The department of agriculture encourages you to scrape egg masses into a plastic bag, double bag the masses, and trash them if found. Like with any invasive control, be certain of your identification before removal. Any sighting or removal of egg masses should be reported to the Ohio Department of Agriculture at <u>plantpest@agri.ohio.gov</u> or 614-728-6400.



While it is currently unlikely that you will encounter the spotted lanternfly in Butler County, becoming aware of emerging threats in our region is our best protection from such threats. Keep these things in mind as you are out on your hikes in the parks and surrounding areas. Perhaps if you are traveling in eastern or southeastern Ohio for some camping or other outdoor recreation be on the look out for this attractive yet destructive insect. If you ever come across any emerging invasive in our area, consider reporting to the <u>Great Lakes Early</u> <u>Detection Network</u> (GLEDN). GLEDN is a database for reports and sightings of invasive plants in our region and a powerful tool in slowing the spread of invasive species.



Friends of Chrisholm Founder's Garden Donations


