Regional Water Association, and as a hobby he enjoys preparing taxes. Welcome Don.

As we head full swing into spring, here is a fun thing to do, track Monarch Butterflies as they fly north. We all know the Monarch has been having a hard time lately, their habitat has been under attack from various directions, large agriculture, climate change, development, etc., and as a consequence their numbers are down considerably. By some accounts their numbers are down 50% in the west, and 90% in the eastern US, since 1990.

There are several different websites you can go to get information about the Monarch, but if you go to this website, www.learner.org/jnorth/monarch/, it will allow you to see, via various interactive maps, where other Monarch enthusiasts have spotted the Monarch migrating north, as well as milkweed development, the first Monarch eggs, and the first larva. If you sign up you can be part of this interactive sequence.



Milkweed is the only plant on which the Monarch Butterfly will lay their eggs and their larva use as a food source.

To do our part to encourage the Monarch habitat, Carol and I have purchased some Milkweed seed that we are going to plant in a few weeks, with the hope of starting a

small Milkweed garden. Common Milkweed, *Asclepias syriaca*, is a perennial and likes dry soils in areas where there is little competition, such as road ditches and fence rows.

For those of you who enjoy birding, there is a similar site for watching the Humming Bird migration. You can Google it.

By the way, Chuck Holliday and I took in the Salamander Migration Program at Upper Indian Creek MetroPark several weeks ago. It was well attended and very interesting. Kelsey Sturgill and Bonnie Seegmueller led our group through the woods at dusk to the vernal ponds. After turning over a few soggy leaf mounds and decaying logs, our group located a several Eastern Red-Back Salamanders and numerous Spotted Salamanders. It was fun for all.

Don't forget April 8 is the Friends of MetroParks annual meeting. The location is Forest Run MetroPark, Timberman Ridge Welcome Center, on Timberman Road, Hamilton, 45013. If you receive the Voice, then you should receive an email invitation to the annual meeting. Hope to see you there.

Invasive plant alert: Lesser Celandine

How to recognize lesser celandine

Lesser celandine has eight petals, and resembles a short-stemmed buttercup growing from a dense mat of leaves. It is an early bloomer, starting in mid-March. By June the leaves have disappeared for the year. Celandine belongs to the buttercup family (Ranunculaceae).

Lesser celandine has been introduced to gardens in the United States several times. The plant is found across Europe and Asia. It thrives in wetlands, and is uncommon on higher, drier sites.

How lesser celandine affects surroundings

Lesser celandine is an exotic spring ephemeral and a vigorous growing groundcover that forms large, dense patches or mats on the forest floor, displacing and preventing native plants from co-occurring. Because lesser celandine emerges well in advance of the native species, it can establish and overtake areas rapidly.

The window of opportunity for controlling lesser celandine is very short, due to its short life cycle. It can be managed with persistence over time using methods that are site appropriate. While manual methods are possible for some (small) infestations, the use of systemic herbicide kills the entire plant from tip to root and minimizes soil disturbance

Locally acres of this invasive can soon be seen crossing the Great Miami River at the Liberty/Fairfield Wayne /Madison Bridge.



Tree & Shrub Sale

One question that I frequently asked is “where can I buy native trees and shrubs?” My answer this time of year is always the same, Butler Soil & Water Conservation District’s Tree & Shrub Sale. On their list this year are redbud, linden, sassafras, and American Elm trees, and spicebush, nannyberry and hazelnut shrubs. Costs vary according to species, sold in packets of 3-5 saplings for \$7-\$8. Best place to buy trees and shrubs for planting in your yard!

**TUESDAY, April 14- Spring has Sprung!
Let's have some Fun, Dave Russell,
Department of Biology, Miami University**



A wave of neo-tropical migrants, headed north from the American tropics, has been descending upon the tri-state area for the past three weeks in ever increasing numbers indicating that spring must be here. They are the vanguard of more than 200 neo-tropical migrant species flooding into North America. Although your eyes may not deceive you the multitude of different calls and songs surrounding you are bewildering. Come spend the evening with Dave and Jill Russell as they help you improve your birding skills just-in-time for your first spring birding trip.

Dave Russell teaches introductory and advanced ornithology courses at Miami University. Dave is a certified bird bander and trainer. Through the Avian Research and Education Institute (AREI) whose mission is “to protect and conserve avian populations through research, education, and advocacy” many area residents and students have learned about birds and the thrill of bird banding by visiting the AREI bird

banding station at Hueston Woods State Park. Bird banding is a powerful tool with which to teach conservation lessons and become an advocate for the birds. AREI is sponsored and supported by Audubon Miami Valley. Dave and his wife Jill have a continuing project banding Boreal Owls in the Fairbanks Alaska area that has been ongoing for the past five years. Bald eagle aerie located in Butler County



An active Butler County eagle nest has been located on Great Miami River near New Miami, Ohio. The search for this nest began as far back as 2009, when 2 adult and 2 juvenile birds were seen feeding together at a nearby gravel pit in late September of that year. Juvenile eagles are fed and taught to feed themselves by their parents well into late winter after they are hatched in the spring. Eagles, both adult and immature, had been routinely seen in the area for several years. Six juvenile eagles had been spotted and reported in the winter of 2014 nearby on Sevenmile Creek. They could be easily viewed from the New Miami High School parking lot until their roost tree was blown down during high winds.

According to ODNR this nest had never been reported to them. This could be the most ideal and best location for a viewing spot of a nest in Ohio, according to an ODNR official. The nest is on private property, and is not approachable by the public, viewing is from the opposite side of the river. Binoculars and spotting scopes are beneficial for viewing. Caution this is on a

very busy road, located near the old Armco Coke plant on Augspurger Rd.

Other known bald eagle nests in the area are located near Ross, at Hueston Woods State Park and on the Great Miami River north of Middletown near the Butler/ Warren County line.

**Critter Corner:
Deep in the Heart of Texas**



When Ohio winter gets to be too much, there's nothing like a trip to the Hill Country of Texas. While there, your editor spied a bird not common to Butler County, a scissor-tailed flycatcher. This beauty breeds from eastern Colorado and Nebraska south to Texas and western Louisiana. Like a kingbird in a morning coat, the flycatcher makes it a point to harass hawks, crows, buzzards, and other large birds invading his air space. His long split tail makes for highly aerobatic courtship flights and helps him catch his dinner of flying insects.






