## Critter Corner By Roger Koch

You never know what you are going to see on a Sunday afternoon hike.

Several weeks ago I was hiking our little north 40 (it is way under 40 acres – but it is ours) and encountered a very unusual insect larvae, one that I had never seen before. It was near the top of an 8 foot fir tree (I have several fir on my place) and after close examination, I noticed it was doing a considerable amount of damage. This active and brightly colored guy measuring 2-3 inches long was resting under a lateral branch about 18 inches from the top and chomping away on needles. He wasn't interested in the branch itself except to rest on, but every needle in his way was consumed, and the frass he was leaving made me blush. His frass was quite large in relationship to his body and the branches and needles below were full of his droppings.

Hickory horned devil is the common name of the larvae, and the adult is a Regal Moth, or Royal Walnut Moth, *Citheronia regalis*. “Walnut” because they are commonly found on walnut trees and occasionally on hickory, permission and Sweet Gum. They can be found on a variety of other tree species when their favorite hosts are not available.

The larvae are quite large and can reach 4-5 inches before pupating in mid to late summer. The adult moth can have a wing span of 4-6 inches and they only live for about a week. During this time they never eat, and only search for a mate. The female lays eggs on host tree leaves before she dies.

I've never taken a Sunday hike when I didn't find something interesting.

**“Here’s Looking at You Kid”

Have you ever walked through the woods and felt “eyes” upon you? Maybe it was the Eastern-eyed Click Beetle, *Alaus oculatus*? This beautiful grey, black and white beetle has two large false eye spots, making it



easier to recognize than some of the other 800 species of click beetles that are found in North America. These huge fake eyespots are an adaptation to scare would be predators away. Their true eyes are much smaller and located at base of the two saw-toothed antennae.

It is obvious why this insect is called “eyed” but why “click”? To confuse the matter, they are also called snapping beetles, skipjacks and spring beetles. When an Eyed Click Beetle is threatened it will bend its head and prothorax backward and then straighten out quickly with a snapping motion. This force causes a clicking noise and physically launches the beetle four times its body length into the air.



If the false eyes and clicking doesn't scare predators away, the next action might do the trick. When the beetle lands on its back, it may click again to right itself and fly away or it may tuck in its antennae and six legs and play 'possum'. Several predators will not eat their prey unless it is alive and moving. Playing dead can have its advantages at times. So, maybe it should be called the Eyed Click 'Possum' Beetle?

This nearly 2 inch long beetle goes through complete metamorphosis: egg, larva, pupa and adult. In the larva stage (2 to 5 years) it is called a wire worm and lives in the soil or dead wood. Some wireworms are pests because they eat roots of cereal crops, corn, potatoes and turf grasses. However, the Eyed Click Beetle larvae is a carnivore and eats other wood-boring insects and flies. The adults eat flower nectar and leaf sap; if they eat at all. Have fun finding the Eyed Click Beetle in our MetroParks of Butler County sites and remember ... we are being always being "watched". ## **Sebald Park Expansion – Elk Creek MetroPark**

Butler County, Ohio– (09/23/15)

A Middletown area golf course is slated to become part of a new public park that will be known as Elk Creek MetroPark. The property will provide opportunities for thousands of Butler County residents to run, walk, picnic, ride horses and play in the future. Additionally, the site has the potential to serve as an economic catalyst for future sports tourism events such as regional cross country meets, triathlons, equestrian events and more. MetroParks announced plans today to expand Sebald Park through the acquisition of Weatherwax Golf Course through a purchase from the Trust for Public Land (TPL). TPL secured an option to purchase 456 acres of the golf course from Weatherwax Holdings, LLC which is owned by Bowling Auctioneers.

In a recent statement, Myron Bowling,



President and founder of Myron Bowling Auctioneers, a Ross Township based commercial and industrial auction company, announced his intent to sell the property. Mr. Bowling had acquired the land in 2014 from the City of Middletown. When approaching Trust for Public Land (TPL), a national non-profit organization, Bowling expressed a desire that the site be maintained as open space and an asset to the community. He stated, "I made a decision to sell the property and after reviewing my options I felt the best option was the combined commitment of MetroParks to keeping the property publicly accessible and The Trust for Public Land's ability to facilitate a transaction in the public interest. This decision will help create one of the largest county parks that will be a valuable asset to the community that everyone can enjoy." However, due to restrictions placed on the use of the property by the grant funds used to acquire it and safety considerations golf will no longer be possible there once the present golf lease expires and park ownership begins.

Trust for Public Land (TPL) has a mission of creating parks and protecting land for people ensuring healthy, livable communities for generations to come. TPL, whom MetroParks had worked with in the past, made MetroParks aware that land, adjacent to Sebald Park, was on the market. MetroParks owns and operates Sebald Park, in Madison Township and shares over a mile of common boundary to the Bowling property. "It was, therefore, logical for MetroParks to pursue, in the public interest, the expansion of Sebald Park through the acquisition of the property in order to ensure continued public enjoyment and access", said Greg Amend, President of MetroParks' Board of Park Commissioners. "Funding to pay for the acquisition of the land and its conversion to a natural area public park open to all will be available at almost no

local cost through a combination of donated value, labor, state and federal funds", he noted. The significance of the purchase is "Not what won't happen there, but what will happen there in the future that makes this change in the use of the property important to the residents of Butler County", said Jonathan Granville, MetroParks Executive Director. Granville commented that, "The creation Elk Creek MetroPark, through the expansion of Sebald Park, will open over 800 acres of picturesque acreage to thousands of county residents for daily public use as they walk, run, picnic, play and enjoy free access to the site."

Elk Creek MetroPark, will be MetroParks single largest park. When joined the combined area has the potential to serve as an economic catalyst for Butler County by providing enough space in a single location to more than double the mileage on existing horse trails, feed the county's sports tourism market through regional cross country events, future equestrian events and more.

After MetroParks takes ownership of the property and after planned natural habitat restoration is complete, Master Planning sessions will occur through a well announced public process to determine what the detailed usage plans will be on the newly combined Elk Creek MetroPark.

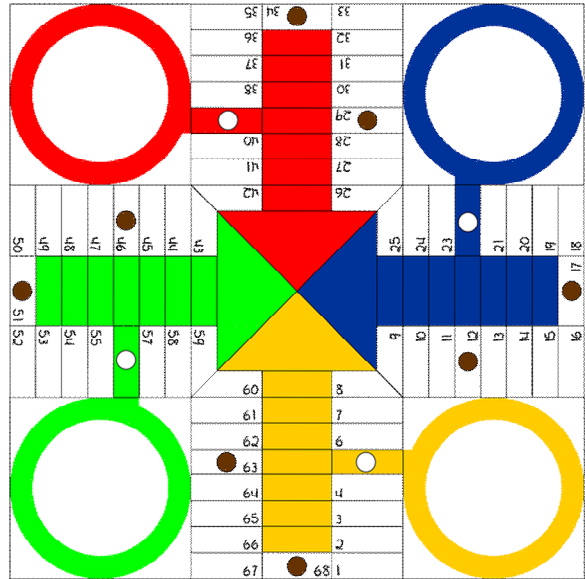
