## Letter from the President

Hello Friends.

On previous occasions I've discussed which months were my favorite throughout the year. Guess which month is my least favorite. It begins with J and is not one of the summer months. I just need to be patient and give it time, February will be here soon. I've already noticed that the days are getting longer, we've already added about 30 minutes of daylight since the solstice, and my wife has reminded me several times over the last few days that she has heard a few select birds singing spring songs.

Where Carol and I live in Reily Township must be magnet for interesting wildlife. Last week for instance a Red-tailed Hawk landed on the top rail our neighbor's post and rail fence, which is outside our kitchen window, and consumed a rabbit he had just captured. The hawk didn't leave its perch until it had its fill, and there was nothing left when he was finished, except a few leftover items on the ground.

Then on the way to church early Sunday morning Carol and I noticed a large bird perched on top of a utility pole. The closer we got it became obvious that this bird had ear tufts atop its head. As we neared the pole and slowed the car it swooped down, grabbed something from between the harvested corn stalks in the field, and flew towards a tree in the middle of the field. The bird book we have at the house narrowed it down to one of two owls, either a Screech Owl or a Great Horned Owl. It was too small to be a Screech Owl.

This morning as I was traveling north on SR 732 to get my morning coffee, I noticed a dog like silhouette crossing the highway in front of me. It was taking its time so I almost came to a complete stop and then

realized that it was not a dog, but a coyote. I wasn't mistaken because once you've seen a coyote, you can't mistake them for a dog. This mature adult trotted across the road, leaped across the road ditch and moved about 10 yards into the field and stopped. Then it turned its head to look at me for a few seconds and continued on into the woods ahead. By this time I had my car at a complete stop, with window down, and wishing that I had my camera.

Another extremely interesting creature, albeit it is one I haven't seen in a while, is the Spotted Salamander. We have them here in SW Ohio and soon they will be migrating. Migrating? I was completely unaware of this phenomenon until someone recently described it to me. Apparently, in the spring, when the temperature begins to rise these small amphibians make a rapid migration towards their annual breeding ponds, aka vernal ponds. Sometimes in just one night, hundreds of the salamanders make the trip to their pond for mating.

- Most participants are new online customers, so they must click on SIGN UP TODAY in the ‘New Customer?’ box.
- Sign up for a Kroger Rewards Account by entering zip code, clicking on favorite store, entering your email address and creating a password, agreeing to the terms and conditions

- You will then get a message to check your email inbox and click on the link within the body of the email.
- Click on My Account and use your email address and password to proceed to the next step.
- Click on Edit Kroger Community Rewards information and input your Kroger Plus card number.
- Update or confirm your information.
- Enter NPO number (15599) or name of organization (Friends of MetroParks of Butler County), select organization from list and click on confirm.
- To verify you are enrolled correctly, you will see your organization's name on the right side of your information page.
- REMEMBER, purchases will not count for your group until after your member(s) register their card(s).
- Do you use your phone number at the register? Call 800-576-4377, select option 4 to get your Kroger Plus card number.

## Winter Is For The Birds

One of the earliest memories of my childhood is feeding the birds visiting my backyard during winter. I can still hear Mom chopping up corn in the blender from the grain elevator just up the road. I can smell the peanut butter left on my fingers after spreading it on pine cone feeders. I can feel the cold of my face pressed against the window as I try to get a better look at a bright red Northern Cardinal against the snow back drop. Of course, within seconds,

the view is fogged due to my breath on the window pane. I hear the squeaking sound as my hand wipes across the glass. Who would have thought writing a bit about birds in winter would allow for childhood reminiscing.

Winter is a life and death struggle for the birds that stay in their territory when the mercury dips below freezing. Many of the birds in our area have evolved to migrate to warmer climates; like some of our human friends that are referred to as "snow-birds" in the locations where they winter. However, some of our resident birds stay here all year. It is these birds in particular that are the subject of this article, because in the wild, you either survive or perish; there are no other choices.



So with that said, how do our resident birds maintain their body temperature when the snowflakes are falling? They have evolved several strategies to survive; otherwise they would become extinct. The most obvious is to grow more downy feathers. Some birds and other animals seek shelter during inclement weather ranging from tree cavities, rocky crevices, evergreen bushes and brush piles. Others, such as the Northern Bobwhite will huddle together to share warmth. Ever watch a Black-Capped Chickadee puff its feathers up and tuck its head and feet underneath? The air is trapped between the feathers and acts as a

thermal blanket to keep it warm. This same bird will lower its body temperature and shiver to help conserve energy at night, too.



Humans do not need to gain weight to survive the winter, even though several of us do because of the plentiful holiday meals. However, birds do have to add fat to their bodies. This fat layer acts as an insulator and an energy source. This winter season, consider taking time out of your busy schedule and observe the birds eating at the feeders all day long. Beefing up their fat resources during the day to help them survive through the cold frosty nights.

Additionally, give our “feathery friends” a helping hand by filling your bird feeders often, providing water baths and supplying a brush pile shelter in your yard. At the end of this season it is MetroParks hope that your reward be some cherished memories to share with family and friends, too.

### **Critter Corner:**

#### **Even Herons Have Bad Hair Days**



Look carefully at the head feathers in the two pictures. As you can tell, there was a strong breeze out of the west (right side of the pictures). While our Ohio blue herons were worried about minor problems like cold, snow, and frozen streams, this Alabama bird was afraid that the ladies would notice his wind-blown locks. Why bother to grow breeding plumage when you're at the mercy of spring zephyrs? It goes without saying that it's a good thing that the bird didn't take a photo of your editor, since my fur was also wind-blown. (On several occasions, I had to run down the beach to retrieve my shadow, which had blown loose!)

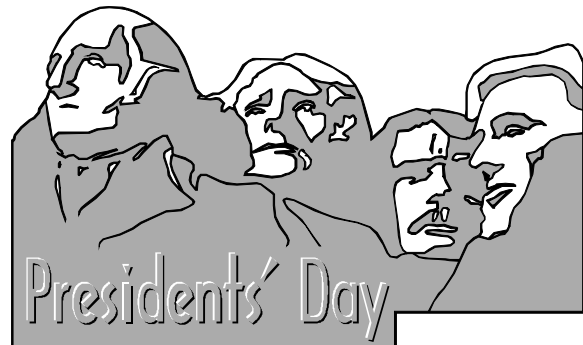
