


Looking Ahead....

MetroParks asks that you begin thinking about any interest you may have in future volunteer opportunities. Some volunteer opportunities to be looking forward to include:

Stepping Forward: Service Days – 2016 Service Days begin on Saturday, March 12 2016. Service Days occur at several different park and offer varying activities throughout the year.

Historical School Programs – Volunteers will be needed beginning in May to help with historical school programs. These programs provide an interpretive experience for students. Critter Corner By Bill Walker



Brown Pelicans

The smaller of two native North American pelican species, the brown pelican still has a wing-span over 78". These two adults are in breeding plumage. Although found on Atlantic, Gulf, and Pacific coasts, the eastern and western populations show differences in breeding coloration. The western brown pelicans have red patches on the neck and throat that are missing on their eastern cousins.

These birds are part of a large flock gathered around several Alabama shrimp-processing plants on the Bon Secour River, which empties into Bon Secour Bay (an offshoot of Mobile Bay). Hope springs eternal when it involves the possibility of free shrimp. Can't say that I blame them, since I did my best last week to help consume a significant part of the local shrimp fisher's bounty.

Birds in this area nest on an island separating the Intracoastal Waterway from Mobile Bay. Since the average depth of the bay is only 10', dredging is a constant activity. The dredging spoils were used to build up several islands that help protect the waterway. Luckily, most alligators don't like salt water, since brown pelicans are ground nesters (unlike white pelicans, which like to nest in trees).

Brown pelicans are largely solitary feeders, unlike the white pelicans, which often cooperate to catch fish. Their 50' dives into the water make me glad not to be the targeted fish.



Bottlenose Dolphin

On the way back to dock, we encountered a small pod of bottlenose dolphins who were engaged in tag-team fishing along the edge of the Intracostal Waterway. After echo-locating a target, the dolphins would change from slow, deep swimming to rapid swimming with the dorsal fin remaining above the water. They reminded me of a flat rock skipping along the top of the water. I suspect that the fish were reminded more of a guided missile hot on their tails.



Common Loon

Another fishing predator spotted during our cruise was the common loon (not to be confused with your editor). Shown here in winter plumage, this diving bird can be identified by its straight, pointed beak, unlike the hooked beak of the double-crested cormorant.




