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Project Complete!

After several years of planning, the joint venture between Friends of Weiser River Trail and the City of Cambridge finally came to fruition this spring. The CTX unit was set in place last fall, and on May 4, 2024, we held the grand opening!

This was one of our most ambitious enhancements to date. The cost of the toilet was \$128,300 (the cost went up substantially between the time we applied for a grant and received grant approval, and we absorbed the cost). Other costs, including plumbing, electrical installation and pouring concrete, brought the total to \$143,948.

The City of Cambridge funded extension of the city sewer 300 feet and hooking to city water. Local vendors were sourced, including Jon Anderson from Council, High Country Electric from Cambridge, Verl Cate (concrete) from Cambridge and Bill Gladhart Excavation from Cambridge. FWRT will pay for cleaning.

In order to mitigate potential vandalism, the toilet is locked at night.



In addition to the trailhead toilet, the sidewalk recently was extended to the fairgrounds, providing curbs and gutters

which further enhance the trailhead. FWRT and the City of Cambridge can be very proud of the trailhead and we anticipate a lot of use, as it is the only readily accessible public toilet for many miles on highway 95.

Earlier this summer, the Eaton Building at the Weiser Trailhead received a


new roof!! We look forward to complete restoration of this historic little building!

Barb McGann and Mike Beavers placed concrete mounting blocks on both sides of all gates, to help out equestrian community who have to dismount to open control gates, as well as key areas at the trailheads.



Tree removal in Weiser: A concerning area of overgrown trees was identified in Weiser, and recently these were removed by a professional service.





Painting projects: Both the Midvale and Weiser trailhead restrooms were painted due to wear and tear as well as vandalism.

In June, in lieu of a monthly director meeting, the directors toured the trail from the Wye to Goodrich. It was very informative, especially as the newer directors are not familiar with some of the history of ongoing trail issues. We plan on touring

the southern half this fall and hopefully we will make this an annual event.

EVENTS RECAP

50K run: On April 27, in conjunction with National Trails Day, the annual 50K run was held. This year the race ran north to south, finishing in the Midvale Park.





Horse Expo: The first weekend in April, we again sponsored a booth at the Horse Expo in Nampa, reaching out to horse lovers from across the Pacific Northwest.

Wagon Train: A hugely successful wagon train was held over Memorial Day weekend, with 40 participants, including three wagons and outriders covering the 60 miles from Weiser to Council. The weather was mostly cooperative and sincere thanks to all who work so hard to make this event happen!



June Bike Event: On June 8, approximately 65 riders gathered to ride the trail from the Wye Campground to Council or Cambridge. It truly takes a village to organize this event and our sincere thank you to all the volunteers and participants.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Greetings from the President!

The spring and summer of 2024 has been a great time in many ways.

We continue to sponsor and put on great events. Beth Ahrend puts on the annual 50K solo and relay race that is a huge favorite. Pam Haynes, Alan Stoneman, Mike Beavers and Pam Lakey put on the ever popular Wagon Train. They have a catered (S&A BBQ Catering in Cambridge) dinner in Midvale on Saturday night, with attendance of around 80 people this year. Everyone gets to view the wagons and horses, enjoy a wonderful meal and buy raffle tickets for the awesome raffle (this year's top item was a hand crafted knife by Leonard Messersmith, as well as two quilts donated by Carrie Pedreira of Indian Valley).

Then we sponsored a bike ride that takes riders and their bikes to the top of the trail at the Wye and they ride down to either Council or Cambridge, depending on how far they want to go.

These events are important fund raisers but even more importantly, they bring in new users and raise awareness of the trail, and bring economic value to the towns along the trail.

Another interesting thing that happened this year is that we have been getting a lot of volunteer help. Early in the spring, a user posted on Facebook that there was a big tree down across the trail. One of our equestrian users said, "hey, no problem, I'll just take my chainsaw and ride my horse down there and get the tree off the trail!" She did just that and since then, volunteers have gotten five trees down.

A chapter of Back Country Horsemen rolled up and hauled out several truckloads of downed barbed

wire. Another volunteer replaced the frost free water riser in Council.

I know I'm missing other examples, but the point is that we are thrilled when our members and users get involved and help us out with small but very important projects.

Upcoming projects include decking the trestles to start doing deferred maintenance. The trestles are now over 25 years old and are beginning to need to be replaced. If we can do 5 to 10 a year, by the time we get to the last one, it will be time to start over.

DID YOU KNOW?



Did you know that the true start of the trail in Weiser is not at the trailhead and not even at highway 95, but at 4th and Washington (off Commercial, near the

fish pond). This short section runs from East 4th Street to where it intersects and crosses highway 95. It is paved and mostly shaded. There is enough parking for a couple of vehicles on the west side of 4th Street and there is a vault toilet at the fish pond. Unfortunately the trail does not extend to the old Depot but maybe some day . . . (hope springs eternal).

WYE CAMPGROUND UPDATE



Effective July 27, 2024, we implemented a no fires ban at the Wye Campground, not even in a fire ring. Due to the extremely high fire danger and poor air quality, we felt this was the responsible thing to do. Obviously this extends to anywhere on the trail, with smoking confined to a safe area.

LANE'S LEGACY

Lane Williams, one of the original directors, was a true visionary and completely invested in seeing the Weiser River Trail become a reality and a destination for users to enjoy. Lane passed away a little over two years ago but his widow, Elsa Freeman, continues to foster Lane's vision and passion for the trail. With that in mind, in 2016, Elsa and Lane purchased a seven acre riverfront property in Midvale, with the intent to turn it into a nature park for not only the local community to enjoy, but trail users, as it is adjacent to the trail on the north end in Midvale.
